### At Southwell Minster September 3<sup>rd</sup> - 27<sup>th</sup>

The Longest Yarn 2 is an exhibition made up of 80 panels of "wool art", each 1m long. The focus will be on what it was like in Britain between the declaration of war on September 3rd 1939 to VE Day on May 8th 1945.

Accompanying this will be 'The Gang' - life-size representatives of all the services that saved

Britain in its hour of need - from a Land Girl to a Spitfire Pilot.

Timed tickets are available on line now from the Minster web site. A maximum of 6 tickets can be reserved per booking. More can be reserved with multiple bookings. Laxton's Jessica Rose was recently honoured to be included in a Young Farmers Group which was invited to the traditional venue for the last Royal Garden Party of the year in Scotland. She has sent the following account of her memorable day.

On Tuesday 1st July, as the National Federation of Young Farmers Vice Chair, I had the great honour of being selected to represent our organisation and its 22,000 members at a Royal Garden Party. The event took place at The Palace of Holyrood House, Edinburgh

with around 8,000 others in attendance.

Our new Patron, His Majesty King Charles III, kindly sent NFYFC ten invites to the prestigious event. The last time we received an invitation was in 2017, so I feel very lucky to be in post on a year we received an invite.

# Michael Ducksbury Memorial Road Run



The event took place as usual on the first Sunday of July, setting off from College Farm in Tuxford in a convoy of some 100 tractors and support vehicles. As usual, Michael's family led the way. Laxton and Egmanton were well represented with both drivers and passengers.

After a heatwave, the forecast suggested a wet day, and

unfortunately it proved to be quite correct. At least with rain being in the forecast, the majority of drivers were well prepared with their waterproof clothing, or better still a vehicle with a cab. Over the years, the regular passengers have organised themselves with either their own waterproofs or a canopy. The latter serves to help avoid sunburn as well, should that be needed.

There was moisture in the air as the convoy arrived in Egmanton, but no actual rain and there was a fair smattering of spectators waiting to welcome and photograph them. By this time, as they emerged from Burnmoor Lane, the convoy was already well spread out. It was clear that one tractor was going to struggle to complete the course as it seemed to be stuck in first gear.

Coming into Laxton, they crossed the green and drove along High Street, heading out onto Acre Edge before heading down the first road on the left and into Mill Field. Where possible the route takes the drivers off road, and following this road down through Kneesall Syke, they emerged at the bottom of Brockilow Hill.



It was back on the road as far as Norwell Woodhouse, where they were able to pick up a lane which took them down to Caunton. There was quite a crowd awaiting the spectacle as they drove through the water splash. Local photographers had turned out to make the most of the opportunity. Some even chose to lie down for a low shot and take their chances with any spray!



The next part of the route took the participants in the direction of Southwell, before finding another lane which brought them out in Kelham. Here they provided quite a surprise for residents enjoying a quiet Sunday. Some came out to see what was going on and, as it was raining by then, they were amused at some participants doing their best to shelter under umbrellas. By this time the convoy was taking around half an hour to pass.

From there it was a fairly straightforward run to the lunch stop at Little Carlton. Unfortunately on this stretch of the run they encountered a real storm, which looked like hailstones at times. There was no escape for the drivers on open tractors and umbrellas would have been of questionable use!

Over lunch the sun came out, giving rise to various conversations about the wisdom of shedding waterproofs before setting off again. Some drivers on their hot tractors were finding wearing them almost as damp an experience as braving the rain.

Another lane took the route towards Cromwell, where they found a route



to a bridge over the A1. It must have been quite a sight for the drivers coming along the road, and a number got into the spirit of the event, hooting their horns as they approached the bridge.

The afternoon proved equally wet at times and when the tractors reached Trent Bank soon afterwards, it was quite slippery. As it is also quite narrow there were some jitters among the passengers.

The convoy was still fairly intact, if spread out, as they made their

way to Carlton on Trent, Sutton on Trent, Grassthorpe and Normanton. Following that area's small lanes brought them into Tuxford on the Lincoln Road. It was a fairly short trip home to College Farm from there to the waiting raffle draw and awarding of prizes.

We were pleased to learn that Paula Doyle was announced as the person who had collected the most



sponsorship. It is not the first time she has won the award.

This year was the 20th time the event had been held after the death of Michael Ducksbury from bowel cancer in 2004 and the total raised to date, as shown on the Facebook page for the event, is a staggering £100,950. Huge congratulations to all concerned.

The total for this year, also on this site, was shown as £3,640, with more money still coming in. All funds support the Weston Park (Sheffield) Cancer Charity.

# **Laxton Own Report**

This has been a good year for Owls in Laxton. 5 baby tawny owls fledged in two of our owl boxes and more than 5 barn owl chicks were produced out of 3 boxes. One box was on Corner Farm and the young kept Amanda and Mark Hennell awake calling for more food.

In one of the other barn owl boxes, the two young were heavier than their parents,

showing that the food supply of voles and mice was plentiful. They will have to go on a diet before they will be light enough to fly and catch prey by themselves.

The supply of mice and voles is a credit to the Laxton farmers who have many acres of permanent grass, grass margins and fallows which the owls use to hunt their prey. Well done everyone.

Here in north Nottinghamshire it has generally not been a good season for the owls and many boxes have failed, owing to a shortage of prey. If this occurs the adults will eat their babies to survive.



# **Laxton History Group**



The group met on a lovely June evening and were pleased to welcome Adrian Gray from Pilgrims and Prophets to give the follow up to his talk about the Pilgrim Fathers, which we enjoyed several years ago.

This time Adrian spoke about how the story of the Pilgrim Fathers was changed over the years. He outlined how entrepreneurial vicars and Local Councils changed the real story of the Pilgrims' journey in order to make money from the Americans, who were trying to establish their identity and history as a nation.

As a Group we became very aware of the worth of different types of evidence for historical stories when we worked on our booklets. Direct evidence from witnesses or writings from the time are the best sources, and

are known as 'primary

evidence'.

There is very little primary evidence of the Pilgrim Fathers' journey around the English coast. The earliest text, detailing anything at all about their journey and settlement of New Plymouth in America. "Mourt's Relation" which is an account written between November 1620 and November 1621 by **Edward Winslow with** contributions by William Bradford. They were both passengers on the Mavflower, William Bradford served as governor of the colony intermittently for 30 years. Edward Winslow served as his

assistant governor and then went on to become governor himself for three terms. There is no detailed mention of their journey across England.

This lack of any detailed evidence of the actual journey led to the distortion of genuine historical facts to aid various towns and villages in raising money from America. For example, for many years there was uncertainty about where the Mayflower set sail from. Suggestions include Immingham, Killingholme Haven, Stallingborough, East Halton, Plymouth and Southampton. Modern scholarship has established that it was in fact Stallingborough.

In 1914, however, the vicar of Immingham, Rev. Miller Reid, was one of the first to try to make money from the Anglo-American Centenary Peace Committee. He wanted £2000 for repairs to his church. Consequently, he travelled to New York and claimed that Immingham Church had sheltered the Pilgrims whilst they were being persecuted, and that it was the last place where the Pilgrims worshipped before departing for America.

This is spurious as it was a Church of England church, the very establishment the Pilgrims were rebelling against. This did not prevent Americans, desperate to know their history, from accepting it as fact. In 1924 they erected a monument on Immingham docks. The edifice has their departure date as 1609 instead of 1608. In 1970 it was removed to the town park. So now the monument has the wrong date and is in the wrong place and has managed to alter the Pilgrim's story.

Another notable example of how the story of the journey of the Pilgrims was changed in order to try to make money from American tourism is the monument at Plymouth. The Mayflower Steps in Plymouth are claimed by the town council to be the final place where the Pilgrims embarked for America. A granite block marks the approximate site of the original steps.

In 1934 a large commemorative portico with Doric columns was built on the sea front. The town council had embraced the idea that the Pilgrim Fathers departed for the New World from Plymouth, UK to establish New Plymouth in America. After they left Stallingborough they called in at Southampton, Plymouth and finally Falmouth before setting sail for America. We now know that Plymouth was merely a short stopping place, since they needed took on water at Falmouth. Nevertheless, the Plymouth Guide Book still claims that the Mayflower departed from their town. The Gin Distillery even has a picture of the Mayflower on their label. All of which brings American tourism and money to the town and once more changes the story of the Pilgrim Fathers.

Adrian went on to detail various other changes to the story of the Pilgrims. The only primary evidence which we possess still remains

Mourt's Relation and the brief notes recorded by Edward Winslow and William Bradford. It is a lesson to all of us to research primary sources for genuine history and not to rely on stories, myths and legends as true historical fact.

Our annual outing, and joint meeting with Chop & Chat at the Horological Museum at Upton followed by lunch at Maxey's Farm Shop and Café will be over by the time you read this. Our next event is the garden tea party courtesy of the Sheard family on 20th August.

# Young Farmers' Tractor Run

Nottinghamshire Young Farmers staged their summer road run on 22nd June, starting and ending at The Dovecote Inn in Laxton. They must have wondered if they would be sun baked on the tractors without cabs, as the week before had seen record temperatures for June in may places. It would have been a relief when they woke to find a cooling breeze and a very acceptable 23C for their event.

Around 25 tractors took part. The route took them through Eakring, noticing the gathering clouds on the horizon, then towards Kirklington, where they stopped for lunch. The Hill brothers were trying to cook burgers in a gazebo while the drivers tried to shelter from the rain..

The weather really caught up with them around Southwell when they found themselves driving through a cloudburst. Those who were in tractors with cabs were coping, but those without were soaked and struggling to see their way.



Some gave up and headed for home, but those who braved it out were rewarded with bright sunshine soon afterwards. Back in Laxton they were able to compare notes and finish drying out on a pleasant evening in the pub yard over a pint once the raffle had been drawn.

These two moths were seen in Egmanton. With the warm evenings there has been more evidence of moths.

both while out in the garden and coming in through open windows.





The picture above shows a **dingy footman**. While that on the left is a **box tree moth**. It has only recently become a regularly sighted species in this country - much to the dismay of gardeners. Rather like the spindle ermine moths we featured earlier in the year, it lays its eggs in protective webs, but its host is box wood. The larvae feed on the leaves and can destroy topiary and severely weaken box hedges. The RHS is monitoring sightings.

On a more positive note, to coincide with World Environment day on 5th June, it was announced that Forterra, the owners of Kirton

Brickworks, have an active programme for biodiversity. As a result they have nurtured a colony of **dingy skipper moths** on the old railway line running through the site. This species is becoming increasingly rare because it needs to bask on bare earth. Left to its own devices, this will turn to scrubland. Maintenance of their preferred environment has helped the colony recover. Several other species have also benefitted.

### The Last Laugh - Jean Townsend

Jean Townsend's fascination with gravestones started early in her career. As an archaeologist and sociologist, she gained in-depth knowledge and hands-on experience of burial rituals and practices during a project to clear and re-catalogue graveyards.

Before she began to tell us how and why her interest was born, she launched on to what she described as her 'high horse'.

The graveyards of Britain, thanks to the church authorities, are being hammered by bureaucratic diktat after diktat. The size, the stone, the lettering and the written content must now conform to uniform and petty rules. Ornamentation is not allowed, everything must be dull, dull, dull. Character and individuality are trodden under the blanket of bureaucracy.

Jean Townsend is furious about it and brought us examples of the width of human involvement and a world of social history some of the old gravestones have preserved. What wry wit led to the epitaph on a headstone for a head waiter called Guiseppe: "The Lord finally caught his eye." This was Jean's first encounter with gravestone humour.

The grave of David Brown in Skye paints a graphic picture of the man: "Beneath this sod lies another."

Often the older headstones are beautifully carved and decorated. There were all sorts of animals, designs and mementos to the lives and times of these people long ago. Jean tells of a beautifully carved small replica of a gypsy caravan and she was able to follow up the information and discover the life stories of the deceased. The carved gravestone would probably have been due to be smashed up.

Another unusual burial was the discovery of a stone right up against the church wall (obviously consecrated land). This was dedicated to an atheist. The epitaph read: "All dressed up and nowhere to go."

Jean showed us lots of examples of the personal glimpses of the dead through their families' eyes. There was the large imposing

stone to a man who in life had run his business well and successfully. He sold greengrocery. His wife, showing what spirit had moved them both, used the epitaph to tell the world: "\*\*\*\*\*'s stall. Still the best place to buy fresh fruit and veg at the best prices." The address followed.

The cause of death was not often revealed, so it was intriguing to find an epitaph to a small boy aged three or four due to "a fish bone". Jean researched this and uncovered a tragic story that showed clearly what wretched lives some people led. The child had been the last living child of a desperately poor coal heaver, the lowest and meanest of jobs. The family lived in abject poverty and their large family was steadily depleted by infant mortality until only one child survived. He died "of a fish bone". Despite the cost, which was not inconsiderable, the parents erected this stone, and they must have gone without food for some time to find the money.

There were very many more to be giggled at – allusions to someone's chattering abilities and many an epitaph that could be interpreted in more than one way. Dull, lacking in wit, dry and uninteresting – never!

The story that encapsulates all Jean was saying about the social importance of epitaphs happened when a complete gravestone was discovered under tarmac plugging a hole in the road sub-surface. Jean researched it and discovered an incredible tale from the eighteenth century.

The gravestone had belonged to a small-time farmer who raised poultry, and he had died on a hike from Kensington to London. His goal was a wife fair, where women offered themselves along with their skills to get a husband and presumably a home and future. Like a hiring fair. So if you needed a cook, a home maker or a woman capable of weaving, here you came to look. Sort of a cross between a cattle market and a modern day disco. The difference here was the man in question was looking for his sixth wife (poultry raising must be arduous) and he was 94. They don't make 'em like that any more!

All in all, a most enjoyable evening, a splendid talk by a knowledgeable raconteur.

If you see or meet Jean, do not let her get away until she has told you the tale of Doncaster Obelisk. It's delicious!

   In her report, Mrs Michael referred to the following in particular:
- Changes in the political make up and balance of NSDC councillors had had an adverse impact on the efficiency of decision making
- 2) Proposed increases in council tax and council house rents had

- been reduced.
- 3) Issues raised by the local government re-organisation and interim arrangements during the changeover to the new unitary councils.

A member of the public arrived at 7.25 pm.

- 10. **Annual Parish Meeting 2025 Arrangements:** Councillors decided to hold the:
  - a. Annual Parish Meeting at 7.00 pm on Tuesday 27 May 2025
  - b. Parish Council annual meeting at 7.30 pm on Tuesday 27 May 2025.

The clerk will invite a representative from NCC Highways to the Annual Parish Meeting. She will also book the village hall.

Councillors discussed ways of increasing engagement with the Annual Parish Meeting.

11. Property matters including sports field, condition report and Glebe Field matters including extension of licence for a further three years: Having considered the matter, councillors unanimously decided to extend the licence of Glebe Field for three years to end on 31 December 2027 at an increased rent of £20 per annum. The Thoresby Charitable Trust's decision on the funding application was still awaited.

There was discussion of responsibility for the trees in Glebe Field. The clerk will check the licence terms and confirm the position. Councillors discussed the parish council's boundary obligations and **approved** a proposal by the licensees to erect a stock proof fence on the Chapel footpath side.

The chair and Mr Rose will undertake an inspection of the sports field and pavilion.

### 12. Planning matters:

- a. <u>Applications:</u> None. A resident's enquiry with regard to the location of the telephone box in Moorhouse was discussed. As a county council matter, the resident was directed to NCC Highways and Mr Pringle.
- b. <u>To note planning decisions by NSDC: None.</u>
- c. Great North Road Solar Park Update and consider contribution to planning consultant report to be commissioned by the local Joint Parish Council Action Group (JPAG): The chair will attend the next JPAG meeting on 31 March 2025. Councillors discussed GNR Solar's quarterly natural flood management update. The clerk will contact GNR Solar to ask that the parish council be included in those already included for identification by Trent Rivers Trust and GNR Solar's hydrologists of the most effective flood mitigation strategies.

d. <u>Compliance:</u> Councillors noted that, although NSDC regards the fence at Croftways as a breach of planning controls, the breach does not meet its criteria for enforcement action.

#### Defibrillator:

- a. <u>Inspection report:</u> Mr J Hill replace the expired pads and confirmed that there were no issues with the defibrillator.
- b. Replacement defibrillator and implications of listed status of Laxton telephone kiosk: Councillors noted that the kiosk had been listed on 14 December 2010. They **agreed** that the clerk should apply for permission to install a defibrillator.
- 14. **Dates and venue for community first aid training:** Councillors agreed that the best day for a training event was Tuesday. Given the value of training to the whole community, councillors also agreed that the parish council should fund the hire of the village hall as the venue.
- 15. Flood resilience working party Report and any associated decisions: Councillors discussed ditch maintenance responsibilities with particular reference to the verge from Corner farm to Brockilow Hill on the right hand side exiting the village. The clerk will contact NCC Highways to establish whether the land is in NCC's ownership.

### 16. Parish environment and appearance, including:

- a. Parish roads and pavements: The Moorhouse Road pavement from Bottom Farm to Moorgate Farm had still to be cleared. The clerk will chase NCC. She will also report that the footpath up the side of Twitchell Farm to the churchyard was overgrown, muddy and slippery.
  - It was also noted that a hawthorn was blocking visibility at Kneesall crossroads. Mr Rose will send photos to the clerk. Mr Rose will install two brackets to repair damage to the bench by the phone box. It was noted that the bench remans safe in the meantime.
  - Mr Sheard reported that the litter pack had filled twenty bin bags. The litter collected included two tyres and a deep fat fryer.
- b. WWI and WWII remembrance memorial on the Green: The clerk had twice contacted ATTFE to ask if their students would make a community memorial as a project but had yet to receive a response. There was discussion of a VE Day event. Councillors noted that there was a likelihood of NSDC funding. After discussion, councillors **decided** that the parish council would support an event organised by WI or via the coffee

morning if NSDC funding was available. They regretted that council's finances at this time precluded parish council funding otherwise.

#### Financial matters:

- a. Financial position as at 28 February 2025: Councillors considered and noted the clerk's report showing the precise financial position at 28 February 2025 (incorporating the 2024-25 budget figures) which the chair cross referred to the bank statements. They noted that Mr Sheard had received a £20 refund from the expenditure funded by the Thoresby Estate grant.
- b. 2025-26 dg bin contract: Councillors approved the 2025-26 NSDC dog bin contract and authorised the clerk to accept the contract on the council's behalf.
- c. Accounts for payment: Councillors unanimously **approved** eleven payments totalling £1,418.07. Councillors noted that the Dovecote was unable to pay cheques into its bank account. After discussion, they **agreed** that the payment for the 2023 Christmas lights switch on should be made to Sophie Harrison t/ a The Dovecote Inn and a receipt obtained from the pub. The clerk updated councillors with regard to developments in relation to the change of signatories and the complaint made regarding conflicting HSBC communications which had made it impossible to clear security. She is visiting the branch later in the week to try to resolve the matter.
- d. Appointment of internal auditor: Mr Hill had followed up with the prospective appointee.
- e. Review 2025-26 risk assessment: Councillors considered and **approved** the draft 2025-26 risk assessment.
- 18. **Service faults:** None reported
- 19. **Correspondence:** *Item a RCAN invitation to join*Nottinghamshire Building Preservation Trust at no cost Councillors **decided** that the parish council should become a member. *Item c National Grid North Humber to High*Marnham: Notification of statutory consultation launch The clerk will re-circulate.
  - All other items of correspondence noted.
- 20. **5 minutes public speaking time:** Concern was raised regarding damage resulting from the poor drainage from the dyke from Church Farm to Moorhouse Corner. There was also discussion of the speed limit through Moorhouse where there had recently been a fatality. The clerk will follow up with Mr Pringle.

She will also send the chair a draft petition for a reduction. It was also noted that work is underway with Trent Rivers Trust to install a water reduction scheme and with the Internal Drainage Board opposite The Brecks.

It was reported that a feasibility study is being undertaken into a merger of the Visitor Centre and Village Hall.
