Letter From Revd. Zoe

Dear friends

As I write this letter, I have just returned from a National Conference on journeying from 'Stranger' to 'Friend'. This raised all interesting questions about what we mean by stranger or friend with lots of different answers and further questions arose and enriched our understanding. When I say the word stranger or friend, what does it mean to you? What makes a friend, a friend?

In our churches, as part of the Holy Habits 'Fellowship' and 'Eating Together' we explored the journey from host/guests to friends. At the beginning of August a Daily Express headline read 'Starved of friendship.....one million pensioners face an entire Summer eating every meal alone'. I thank God for the Friendship Clubs in our local context for bringing people together for 'face to face' conversations over tea/coffee and biscuits which sometimes include bingo and other social activities. As we approach Christmas, we give thanks for all family homes and organisations including churches which reach out and provide a Christmas dinner for those who would spend the day alone and if the opportunity is given, would chose otherwise.

C S Lewis, in his writings, speaks about us living in a world starved for true friendship. This is encapsulated in a world which seeks the perfect profile and success, when friends can be seen as a means to an end and on Facebook, for instance, we can unlike and 'unfriend' people. Friendship in this sense has become a commodity and not a gift.

Let us ponder for a moment and look beyond the commercial Christmas, to family gatherings and organisations bringing people together – being together, face to face conversations, eating together, sharing lives and all that is so life-giving and then to ponder beyond even this to a God who we celebrate at Christmas who loved the world so much that God made his home amongst, the invisible God became visible in his Son and grew up and showed humanity what true friendship is all about – friendship which is available for all people. God calls each person by name, knows each person implicitly, better than we know ourselves and offers friendship which lasts for all eternity. God's greatest desire is that humanity will have friendship with God for all eternity. God is not fickle, does not bear grudges and does not seek our friendship for what God can get out of us – God seeks our friendship because God loves us. God will never de-friend you although people might defriend God and in these instances, God waits patiently and at the right time, if we are willing, will restore this friendship so we can begin again. If you don't know about this amazing God I am talking about, please 'follow the star' to one of our churches in our communities and hear the Christmas story for yourself and discover the difference the person behind the story makes to our lives and the world at large. Our services are in this magazine and posted on our noticeboards, websites and social media. Nobody need ever be lost in a crowd because we are all found together in Christ.

There has been no price rise for a some years and the PCC doesn't want to change the rate this year. The invoiced cost of the magazines shows the true cost is now almost £1 per copy. You will see the cover price change to £1 from January. This is due to increase in the cost of paper in particular and

The Hospital at Wellow Hall

Thomas Bagshaw 1782-1851.

The Bagshaws first appeared in Laxton about 1770, John Bagshaw marrying there in 1773. On checking through records of my ancestors recently, I noticed that Thomas Bagshaw, who was born 7.11.1782 and buried in 20.8.1851, was missing from the Laxton census in 1851. Eventually he was found to be a patient in a hospital, in Wellow!

Thomas, 59, a farmer from Laxton, was being cared for, along with three other patients, by a nurse called Hannah Priest. He died later that year.

There seem to be few records about a hospital in Wellow but it appears it was called Wellow District Hospital and set up about 1840, in part of Wellow Hall. In 1841 Charlotte Buck was a hospital nurse in Wellow.

- In 1851 Hannah Priest was 'nurse to the hospital.' 1n 1861 she was said to be 'A nurse.'
- Wellow Hall was owned by Mr W.S. Ward, fellow of the Royal College of Surgeons.
- There was a dispensary, run by William Wright, Dispenser of Medicines, living in the Hall.
- The patients were often young agricultural workers in need of surgery, often from far afield.
- In 1871 James Bartlett, living in Wellow, was said to be



William S Ward died in 1877.

The hospital seems to have lasted for some 30 odd years.

These are just clues, only one of which directly connects the Hall and Hospital. There are references to a leg amputation carried out there in 1842 with the patient in a 'Mesmeric state'. This appears to have been part of a controversy at the time and two references describe what is reported to have happened:

From Wellow Hall Hospital to Wellow House School. Some 150 years!

John Bagshaw's son, Thomas, was in hospital there in 1851; now in 2019, his 6th great granddaughters go to school there and Thomas' descendants still live in Laxton.

Laxton's Historic Open Field Farming System and Sale of the Laxton Estate

Sorry to say but there has still been no additional information to either the Parish Council or the Visitor Centre Trust to pass on from The Crown or Carter Jonas since the last report in the magazine.

The previously suggested date of the end of the year for completion does not look too hopeful at the moment.

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Laxton History Group



Laxton's famous map by Mark Pierce, which dates from 1635, now owned by the Bodleian Library in Oxford, is normally kept in safe storage. Between July 2019 and March 2020, it is on public display in a major exhibition called 'Talking Maps'.

The History Group have developed a good relationship with Nick Millea, the person responsible for the map's care and co-curator of this exhibition. He is one of the four holders of a decorative stake made from one of the open field stakes which we have presented. In October we visited the exhibition instead of having a meeting at home. Nick joined some of us for lunch and met the group for a guided tour of the exhibition.

We travelled aboard a very smart minibus from Marshalls. Luckily, although we saw evidence of flooded fields en route and it rained virtually all the way there, it did not slow us down greatly and we arrived only shortly after our anticipated time of 11.30am. That gave everyone plenty of time for lunch and a look around before the



rendezvous at the Weston Library where the exhibition is staged.

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Nick's short introduction covered the background to the exhibition, which has been 4 years in the making. People are invited to pitch to stage exhibitions in this space and the relevant committee decides who is to be granted the privilege. It requires someone from the Bodleian and an

outside academic to work together and Nick was fortunate to be able to join forces with Jerry Brotton, a fellow map enthusiast with very different interests, who conveniently lives nearby.

The display is staged in ten large, glass fronted cabinets. They thought long and hard about how to present maps in a cohesive and interesting way, and the theme of maps talking to the reader proved to be the key to bringing it all together. Quite how you narrow the choice down to less than 100 items in total from 1.5 million maps in store is something to puzzle over.

In addition to preparing the actual maps and arranging the loan of some items, the duo had to write the captions and the text to help the

public to understand the displays without the benefit of a guide. There was also the small matter of writing a book. Shortly before the due date this was revealed to be a detailed book and a shorter summary concentrating on just 50 maps! They also commissioned a number of videos from contributors who could add to the story of the maps. Nick had invited Stuart Rose to talk about the Laxton map and it was obvious that he was delighted with the result, which is staged near the map.



Our tour began with a look at a map of Oxford, but actually an Oxford which never existed. It showed a planners view of what could have been done with the city centre but which was never built. Accompanying this was a Civil War map which seems to have been designed to confuse invaders because while east and west are correct, north and south have been transposed.

This display also contains a map which depicts an extraordinary tale of roads from a social housing estate through an affluent area being blocked by spike-topped walls. When the council knocked the walls down the wealthy residents won a court case requiring them to be rebuilt and when a tank driver on a practice repeated the demolition, the military authorities were forced to rebuild. The final removal of the walls did not come until the 1950s.

The Laxton map occupies the next cabinet, mounted vertically and looking rather crinkled, which may be due to the way it has been mounted on its backing, and amplified by the lighting. It is truly an impressive sight. Also in the cabinet is a selection of the correspondence between the Bodleian Library and Mr Argles, Agent for Lord Manvers, negotiating the sale of the map to the Library.



The final item, and good for us to see, is the stake which we had presented to Nick.

The remainder of the exhibition includes some impressive Islamic maps which have been digitally combined to provide a unique view of the known world in their time. Nick pointed out Cornwall and Scotland, but it was as well he did since it is unlikely we would have recognised them. There was originally a silver disc which incorporated these maps, but it was melted down. Working with the Spanish company which made the



digital composite, the curators arranged the recreation of the disc. This is certainly an item with a 'Wow' factor, which was added to by having to step our of the main room to see it.

A Marshall Islands stick chart was one of the more unusual items. A modern map giving his own unique take on maps and Britain today by Grayson Perry was one of the more unexpected.

The Gough Map of Britain is the oldest known single sheet map of the island, which some of us saw during the Bodleian's reopening exhibition following a 5 year refurbishment. This dates from around 1400, although it seems to have been made over a period of time. It is unusual in that it is oriented on its side with Cornwall pointing





down. Scotland

was obviously not studied, but there is great detail in England and Wales.

Nick's team have just been given a big, three year, grant to examine this map. They have already looked at it using Raman spectroscopy and discovered that what now appear to be single colours are in fact a range of shades. Examining their

composition may enable them to be dated. The study has also revealed that this appears to be a copy since it bears pin pricks in the front which do not penetrate to the back and suggest it was marked through from an original.

Our time there ended soon after viewing this map and we had just time to visit the shop and café before our return trip. We bought a copy of the book accompanying the exhibition and which contains a chapter on the Laxton map. This will go into the History Group library and be available for members to borrow.
