




# Congratulations

The knitted and crocheted poppies were the work of Janet Cooke and her sister-In law, Kath Shipley. Kath is the sister of Janet's late husband Frank, and a keen craftswoman. Janet also attached the poppies to the net drape to create the cascade. They really do look lovely and are a fitting tribute to those we lost in both wars. Many thanks to both of them for all their hard work.

They made red poppies to remember the fallen soldiers, purple poppies to commemorate the horses which served and fell in the wars and a single white one to represent Miss Willis, the schoolmistress who was Laxton's only civilian casualty of WW II.



This act of remembrance was a collaboration. The wooden frame on which it was mounted was made by Roy Haynes (left above) and painted by Eric Heath (right above). As mentioned last month, Roy had made the metal soldier and had also earlier repainted the church notice board. Thank you to both for their help.

#### Dogs in the Churchyard

It is also unpleasant for the volunteers who maintain the churchyard to find dog poo in their equipment when they are working. If your dog is on a lead, it is easier for you manage where it goes and to pick up after it. Thank you.

#### **Storm Babet**



The impact of Storm Babet locally was considerable, but at the time of writing, we have not heard of anyone in the parish whose house was flooded. If this is incorrect we apologise and wish you well in recovering from the damage caused.

Once again it was observed that water streamed down from the direction of West Field, along Town End and also down the main road from Ollerton. The direction of flow puts properties at the top of the village right in the firing line, but lessons have been learned from previous events and drive ways were barricaded to deflect the water along the road.

Mike Manning sent the photo above showing the remarkable spectacle of water gushing out of the ground on the corner opposite The Dovecote. We presume that something underground could not cope with the pressure of the storm water and gave way.

# Laxton History Group

At the October meeting arrangements were made for the Craft Fayre. As History Group funds are in good shape at the moment, members decided that the money raised by the event would be shared between the Lincs & Notts Air Ambulance and Laxton Church.

The speaker at this meeting was Professor Paul Everson, speaking about 'A Different Interpretation of Laxton Castle'. Paul introduced himself as a field archaeologist and explained that his professorship is an honorary one.

He has developed a different view of Laxton Castle, and he acknowledges that this is not universally accepted. Our Honorary President, Professor John Beckett does not agree with him. He hoped his talk would be challenging and thought provoking.

He drew attention to references to the construction at Laxton using the word Hall and not castle. There is no reference to the castle in local Laxton names, e.g. no Castle Lane etc. In fact, the local names are Hall Lane and Hall Grounds.

From the Domesday Book onwards Laxton appears to be a single, large manor. In the 13th century King John spent money on a royal house here. A castle is not mentioned.

The word castle is not mentioned until the 1900s - a time when finding Norman motte and bailey castles was very fashionable.



Other factors he looked at were the distance of the construction from the church and its location relative to the village as well as its appearance, which does not look like a defensive mound. In his opinion it looks more like the site of a large manor house and a pleasure garden. He cited other UK examples of these.

The village layout from the 12th century onward was discussed. Prof Everson had hoped to stimulate discussion and he succeeded. The discussion which followed his talk ranged around whether Paul's view was valid.



Our 15th November meeting took the form of members bringing items relating to Laxton to share with each other and to discuss. In addition, Jean had arranged for her grandson, Jordan, and his parents Mel and Wayne to come with a selection of memorabilia from the war time.

The meeting began with the usual business, during which Jean finalised the arrangements for the Craft Fayre.

After a discussion, it was agreed that with the Group's funds looking healthy at the moment, we should look at hiring a bus to take us on at least one trip next year. We could consider subsidising some outside.

The Nottingham University Library had produced a magazine which included mention of Laxton in a section relating to manorial records. There were copies for those members who wanted them.

Professor John Beckett, is looking into organising an event to bring historians together to consider the evidence for the status of Laxton Castle following our speaker's proposition last month that it had

only ever been a manor house. Members agreed that the Group could





host such an event, which would probably be in 2025 if it all comes together.

John Chambers then invited everyone to look at the photographs of the village and events brought in by Janet Cooke, the war medals brought by Brenda Chambers and the Voce family display and thanked them all for coming.

# Court Day, 7th December 2023

The Jury which will have inspected the wheat field on 30th November was elected at the meeting of Laxton's Court Leet last December. The public are welcome to attend the Court Leet as observers. To make this more possible and comfortable, the venue moved to the Village Hall a couple of years ago.

During their inspection, the Jury examine where each farmer who has strips in the wheat field has ploughed. If this is found to be incorrect, the infringement is noted. A team also goes round to inspect the dykes and watercourses in the field and notes what it finds.

Over a lunch at The Dovecote, the Jury members gather to discuss the findings and to decide on appropriate fines. The results are written on a Presentment Paper by the field Foreman, who then passes it to the Steward of the Court Leet to read on Court Day.

After the reading, there is usually a discussion of anything which is not routine and everyone agrees the fines to be levied. This meeting will elect the Jury members for the 2024 inspection.

Laxton is the only remaining manorial court which retains the power to determine legal proceedings and levy fines in relation to an open field farming system. This, along with the working open field system, is what makes Laxton unique.

One other manorial court retained its powers when the Administration of Justice Act was revised in 1977, but those powers relate to the rounding up of stray sheep.

You have the opportunity to come along on Court Day and see how this ancient court works in the modern day. You need to be at the Village Hall for a 10.30am start.


We held our November meeting on Wednesday 8th. We were pleased to welcome two visitors for the evening.



#### **News from the Museums of Tuxford**

Christmas isn't necessarily about things. It is about being good to one another and showing kindness. Often spending time together can create positive memories as well as family traditions. For children it is the anticipation and excitement of presents.

Little girls often had a pony on their Christmas list. If they couldn't have a pony then a pony book was often treasured. The Pullein-



Thompson sisters' books were some of the most popular, but everyone's favourite was a book written in 1877 by Anna Sewell: Black Beauty - the story of a horse's life, happy at first, then very sad but ending on a happy note. I wonder how many people realise that it was written to highlight the plight of so many horses, and to encourage people to treat horses more kindly.

Some horses were much loved by their owners, but for many were just tools of the trade. It was said on average five horses a day died in harness on the London streets Apart from hard work, poor feed, standing around in the cold and the rain, one of the

cruellest things was the bearing rein. This forced the head and neck into a painful position for little more than appearance. All these are referred to in Black Beauty. The book had the effect of making the

bearing rein gradually go out of fashion. The bearing rein can be seen at the Museum of the Horse.

The Walks of Life
Museum has some
lovely prams in their
collection. Including the
blue cane dolls pram
intricately designed,
and calling on skilled
workers to produce
them, weaving the
cane and making the



turned beech handle.

The excitement of getting your first dolls pram, a gift from your affluent family can only be imagined. Later unwanted, the Museum's example was purchased from Retford sales room in 1993 by the Museum's founder, Dorothy Harrison, to add to her collection.

Traditions of treasured Christmas gifts continue. Do you remember your first Christmas annual? The Dandy first appeared in1938 and has been published every year since. Children and adults still enjoy making gifts. Calendars remain a popular item. Due to the strength of the memory of who made them or the picture they are often kept for many years.



Examples from Dorothy's teaching days in Africa in 1967 are part of her collection. The museums would like to wish everyone peace and happy times in the festive period.

27th January to 4th February is National Storytelling Week. Both Museums would like your stories to be shared and bring the joy of storytelling to others.

We will be having a competition for the best stories. There will be three age groups:

# Laxton & Moorhouse Parish Council, Minutes of the Meeting held on 12/7/2023

These minutes have been reproduced from the Parish Council Web site and it has not been possible to reproduce the numbered table format.

**Present:** Councillors: S. Hill (chair), M. Hennell, J. Hill, S. Rose, A Moorhouse, D. Sheard

In attendance at parish council meeting C. Wilson (Clerk) Members of the public (x 2)

**Apologies for absence:** Apologies for absence due to the change of date were received and accepted from Ms Creighton. Mrs Michael had also sent apologies for the same reason.

**Declarations of interest:** There were no declarations of interest, direct or indirect, in any items of business on the agenda.

Dispensations: None required.

10 Minutes public speaking: The condition of the roads in the parish was raised with concern being expressed, in particular regarding potholes and verges. The chair will take these concerns forward with Mr Pringle on the walk round. In response to the member of the public's concerns, he confirmed that the walk round will encompass Moorhouse and a 30 mph speed limit for the village. Councillors noted that concerns continue in relation to the condition of Bar Farmhouse with a particular focus on rubble and debris lying on the site, the removal of skylights and missing windows. It was confirmed to the public in attendance that the old bench in Moorhouse had been removed with the new bench being delivered

**Thoresby Estate report (if any):** Ms Moorhouse presented a report on behalf of the Estate focusing on the following:

- a. Grass sales had been disappointing
- b. Tenants had been lined up for High Street and Ide, with both properties being registered land
- c. Renovations to Step Farm are underway and are being carried out to a high standard.

Councillors expressed the hope that Mr Pierrepont would be able to attend their meetings in future.

that the replacement interpretation boards had been completed. There were no other matters arising which were not otherwise on the agenda.

**Reports from councillors:** Mrs Michael and Mr Pringle were not in attendance.

The chair reported that the next SNG meeting was later in July and invited councillors or the public to contact him if there were any issues for him to raise. Speeding traffic was discussed. The chair confirmed that this is reported as an issue regularly by all parishes. Councillors noted that the police offer to train volunteers to use a speed gun. There was discussion of how a speed gun might be sourced and the likelihood of any appetite amongst residents to train and use a speed gun. Councillors noted that it was possible to purchase a speed sign. The chair will make enquiries at the next SNG meeting.

Property matters including sports field and Glebe Field matters (if any): Councillors discussed their links with the sports field committee following Mr Manning's withdrawal from parish council affairs. The **decided** that Mr Sheard should be the parish council's representative on the Sports Field Committee.

The chair and Mr J Hill will attend to fencing around the Glebe Field tree.

#### Planning matters:

- a. Applications: None
- b. To note planning decisions by NSDC: None
- c. Compliance: No matters raised

**Defibrillator inspection report:** Mr J Hill is awaiting a new battery but otherwise no issues. The chair had received correspondence from DHSC regarding the registration of the defibrillator. The clerk confirmed that it is registered with EMAS.

# Property manager's report including monthly asset inspection report: Mr Sheard reported that:

- a. Rights and responsibilities for the Glebe Field hedging, post and rail fence and removal of the gate required clarification. Access and boundary ownership would also benefit from clarification. The clerk will check the documentation
- b. The benches on the Laxton grass triangle apart from the one painted by a resident required some repair and re-painting. Mr Rose will look at the benches. The pinfold furniture had been painted.
- c. The noticeboard perspex would benefit from replacement
- d. The glass in the Moorhouse telephone kiosk would also benefit from replacement

The relocation of the defibrillator to the telephone kiosk had been considered previously and the decision taken that, as the pub had high footfall and therefore increased risk of a medical emergency, the

defibrillator should remain at the Visitor Centre.

It was **agreed** that, going forward, Mr Sheard should inspect the council's assets every six months, reporting to the March and November meetings.

**Archive of parish records – Update:** Councillors authorised the clerk to sign the archive storage agreement.

- a. **Community network group:** No longer required as a standing item.
- b. **Bar Farmhouse:** Discussed at LMPC/188/23 (10 Minutes Public Speaking) above.
- c. Parish roads and pavements, including Moorhouse village sign: Discussed at LMPC/188/23 (10 Minutes Public Speaking) above.
- d. Bench for Moorhouse: Discussed at LMPC/188/23 (10 Minutes Public Speaking) above. Councillors will discuss the siting of the bench when delivered.
- e. NottsBus On Demand: No longer required as a standing item.
- f. Flood resilience: Councillors noted that Mr Sheard had:
  - 1. Inspected the resilience stores
  - 2. Contacted the NCC flood officer who is visiting the parish on 27 July 2023 for a walk round with Mr Sheard

Following discussion it was **decided** that Housing, Planning (including neighbourhood plan) and Facilities should be an agenda item fir the September 2023 meeting.

- b. **Accounts for payment:** Councillors unanimously approved ten payments totalling £1338.85. As it had not yet been possible to change signatories, councillors authorised Mr Manning to sign the cheque to the clerk.
- c. **Review fixed assets:** There was discussion of the Sports Pavilion ownership. The clerk will seek to establish the position from the records in her possession.
