The Kohima Epitaph

This is a form of words which will be familiar to all adults, but how many of us know its origins?

The words form the epitaph engraved on the Memorial of the 2nd British Division in the cemetery of Kohima (North-East India). It reads:

'When You Go Home, Tell Them Of Us And Say, For Your Tomorrow, We Gave Our Today.'

The verse is attributed to John Maxwell Edmonds (1875-1958), and is thought to have been inspired by the epitaph written by Simonides of Ceos to honour the Greeks who fell at the Battle of Thermopylae in 480BC.

The Burma Star Association (BEF) [Far East Veterans] use the Kohima; therefore, it would not be part of the dedication for a Royal British Legion Standard.

The Kohima is only said if there are no Burma Star Veterans present at church services. It is only fairly recently that the Royal British Legion has incorporated the Kohima into its activities due to the advanced age of Burma Star Veterans.

Laxton History Group



In October we started to get into the festive spirit with a visit from Danny Wells, to tell us about "The Victorian Christmas"

Danny put a display of Christmas books and London Illustrated News magazines at the back of the room to further illustrate his talk.

He then gave an outline of Christmas through the ages. In pagan times before the fourth century in England there was a mid-winter festival which celebrated the harvest and looked forward to the new year.

The Roman Saturnalia held in mid-winter encouraged feasting, generosity and spending. The world was turned upside down during the festival, servants becoming masters, men dressing as women etc. Remnants of this festival are still seen in pantomime today, men playing the parts of women and vice versa.

In the 5th and 6th centuries, New Year is more important than Christmas, celebrating the harvest of last season and the new growth to come. In 17th and 18th centuries Christmas becomes even less important and between 1790 and 1835 Christmas is not mentioned once in The Times newspaper.

It was the Victorians who influenced and changed how we celebrate Christmas. With the coming of the Industrial Revolution, the gap between rich and poor widened. Philanthropists promoted a strong moral code and anchored it in the celebration of Christ's birth. Charles Dickens, horrified by poverty and child labour, helped to shape our modern Christmas with his view of what Christmas should be in his novel, "A Christmas Carol."

The coming of the railways meant folk could travel to see their families, especially as a Christmas holiday was promoted for the working classes. Then Queen Victoria and Prince Albert embraced the idea of a "Family Christmas". The London Illustrated News published a picture of the Royal couple with their children decorating a Christmas tree. They sent Christmas cards to family and friends. It very quickly became the fashion and it spread to America.

Because there was a fear that English rural life and traditions were being lost during the Industrial Revolution, Christmas cards often depicted a romanticised view of English village life. During the years before the First World War the association of Christmas with old England grew stronger and Christmas traditions began to be seen as ancient English customs.

In fact, however, this is far from the case. Christmas pudding for instance relates back to Saturnalia and is a Celtic tradition imported from Ireland. Christmas decorations date back to decking the halls for New Year in Tudor times, with boughs from the sacred trees of pagan religion.

The Christmas tree tradition comes from Germany. Christmas stockings come from the tradition of Dutch children putting out their shoes on December 5th for St. Nicholas to fill with gifts. Santa Claus goes back to a 4th century Saint Nicholas who was from Turkey. The reindeer are a comparatively modern addition, 1823, from a poem in the New York times written by Clement C. Moore.

The Victorians embraced and combined these traditions from all over the Western world to bring about our modern Christmas.

We helped to start the village to get into the festive spirit when once again we held our popular Craft Fayre in November, this year on Saturday 16th.



The event was very well supported with a good number of attractive stalls, lots of customers from near and far and the ever tasty treats from the tea bar.

We do not meet in December because our date would fall too close to Christmas and neither is there a January meting as we learned that members are not keen to come our on such cold, dark nights. Speakers are no keener to face a potentially difficult journey either.

A Special Start to the New Year

We will start our new year of meetings with a very special speaker. Thanks to a chance conversation, we became aware that John Millin, the son of Piper Bill Millin, who played his bagpipes during the D-Day landings, lives quite locally.

A very pleasant visit to him and his wife resulted in him readily agreeing to come to speak at our meeting on **February 19th 2025**. As with all our meetings, this event is open to anyone and we are hoping that members of some of our neighbouring Historical groups will be able to join us. If you are not a regular attender, we just ask that you let us know if you plan to come so that we can organise sufficient seats and refreshments.

Citizens Advice give advice on banking security and identity

Banking security and fraud.

Contact your bank or building society straight away if you're worried someone might have access to your account. For example, if your:

- card or security details have been lost or stolen
- statement shows payments you don't recognise
- card has reached its limit or account has gone into overdraft and you weren't expecting it

Check your bank statement or the bank's website for the phone number to call for reporting security issues - or go to their branch in person. If you haven't had money taken from your account, your bank or building society will still take action to protect your account, for example by cancelling your card or changing your security details.

If money has been taken from your account this is known as fraud and is illegal.

When you contact your bank, they'll take action straight away to protect your account so no more money can be taken. For example, they might cancel your cards or cheque book and send you a replacement.

You should also report the crime to the police through Action Fraud. They'll log it and give you a crime reference number.

This is called 'identity theft'. If you start getting bank letters, bills or letters from debt collectors that you know nothing about, this might have happened to you.

Action Fraud:

Tel: 0300 1232040, Textphone: 0300 1232050 Mon - Fri, 8am - 8pm If you've received a scam email, text or phone call you can also report a scam to action fraud.

If someone used your name to open new accounts, get credit or buy services.

This is called 'identity theft'. If you start getting bank letters, bills or letters from debt collectors that you know nothing about, this might have happened to you.

You should contact your bank straight away and let them know. Keep a record of all conversations you have with the bank and copies of

letters to do with the fraud. The bank will investigate, take action to protect your accounts and refer the crime to the police.

If you think someone has applied for credit in your name, for example because you've had letters about loans or credit cards you didn't apply for, you should also contact the main credit reference agencies. Explain you've been a victim of identity theft and ask them what credit accounts or services are on your file. Tell them which ones you didn't apply for and ask for the information to be removed.

The credit reference agency will contact those companies listed on your file to sort out the accounts that were wrongly opened in your name.

You should contact all 3 agencies as each one might only have part of your file. You can contact the following:

- TransUnion
- Equifax
- Experian

You can also ask the credit reference agency to add a password to your file - this is called a 'notice of correction' password. The credit reference agency will ask you for the password if you apply for credit. If you require assistance in speaking with these organizations please contact us.

If you think someone has got your details by stealing your post, or by getting mail redirected, you contact the Royal Mail Customer Enquiry Number on 03457 740 740.


