

The Hoes and Barrows of Outrageous

It's a new year and time for all gardeners to look towards the growing season. Those long evenings plotting over the seed catalogues will soon be over. Whether you have spacious ground, pots, window





The catalogues have worked their magic, your ground, pots etc. (henceforth referred to as 'the garden') mentally lie before you – a cornucopia burgeoning with luscious veg, flowers and fruit, every nook and cranny stuffed to the gunnels. Tomatoes as big as grapefruit, monster dahlias like dinner plates,

peas as fat as melons, beans bursting out everywhere, jungle-

like growth on the courgettes and exotic fruit hanging like jewels, all basking in the balmy subtropical Laxton air - and not a weed or pest to be seen.

"In this garden, Mr Titchmarsh? Away with you!". But then again, all gardeners are complete fruitcakes and shouldn't be allowed out on their own.





Right! All this means seeds to sow and nurture, seed trays, compost and racking of some sort to support them in luxury while they are tended. Decisions, decisions. Where will they thrive? The garage is not on. The bathroom? Forget it. Along with the kitchen, sitting room and entrance hall. Ditch the paw-paws, mango and pineapple seeds. Let sense prevail.

The Story of the Beckitts



Thomas Beckitt 1829 - 1867 Mary Bagshaw 1835 - 1865

The family came to Laxton from Kneesall c1851. Tom's father John, moved on, leaving Thomas as the tenant of Ivy House Farm He married Mary Bagshaw in 1857 in Leicester.. Mary died aged 29, leaving 3 children.

Thomas remarried but was killed shortly after when he fell from a stack.

Mrs Ellen Beckitt 1830 - 1880

After their father's death, Ellen brought up her three stepchildren, Richard, Sarah Ann and Mathilda. Ellen came from Newark and was unused to the farming world and yet she continued to farm until Richard was old enough to take over. She

looks a very fine lady







Richard became a farmer when he was 21 yeas old. In this photo he looks more like 'a Man about Town'.

In 1884 Richard came into Laxton Hill Farm but only stayed there for 2 or 3 years. His stepmother had left property in Newark and though Richard spent time at 'a big house near the pub', in 1901 he was living in Newark with Mary and a son, Richard. He is described as a


retired farmer at only 42 years old.

Then in 1911 he bought Bell Farm, Weston, where he died. leaving a farm for each of his three sons.

William Beckitt [Bill] 1894 - 1987

.A character! Full of tales. He told me that he was mainly brought up by his grandparents at the Old Vicarage. but also lived with his parents in a house along the Twitchll, which at sometime was near where the Post office was located for a while. In 1911 he was working for his father at Bell Farm, Weston.

Bill came back to Laxton Hill Farm in 1921.amd lived there until his death in 1987, aged 93 years. He sometimes wrote pieces for the magazine and produced a collection of his memories of his life in Laxton.



Edith Beckitt 1904 - 1970

Edith Turner lived at Brecks Farm, Moorhouse. She and Bill used to



meet between East Park and Egmanton Woods. Look at a map and their two farms are not very far apart. They were married in 1924. Here she is with her six children, Joy, Audrey, Rhona, Sheila, Roy and Terry.

Mary Hannah Beckitt 1866 - 1941

Mary, born in Egmanton, was the

Mavis Smith was born at Willoughby House, Laxton. The


family moved to Sutton when Mavis's father found employment on the

COVID-19 Vaccinations

The vaccine is being given in hospital hubs - Queen's Medical Centre, City Hospital and King's Mill Hospital. Local Vaccination Services are also now open in a number of locations including Newark Showground.

The public have an important part to play to help the swift roll out of the vaccine. Health bosses have asked the public to wait for their letter before contacting the NHS, their GP or local hospital hub – the letter will have full details of how to make an appointment. The only way to get an appointment and the jab is to follow the instructions in the letter.

There are a number of different ways you could be contacted:

- 1. As a hospital inpatient or at an outpatient appointment.
- 2. GP practices are working together to contact and offer the vaccine to as many people as possible.
- GP teams are arranging to vaccinate care home residents in their homes.
- 4. A letter from the NHS Covid-19 Vaccination Booking Service
- Please don't contact the NHS to seek a vaccine we will contact you
- When we contact you, please act immediately and make sure you attend your appointments.
- Please continue to follow all the safety guidelines

About the Vaccines

Two vaccines are now available which have been shown to be safe, offer high levels of protection and have been approved by the MHRA, the official UK regulator. 40 million doses of the BioNTech/Pfizer vaccine and 100m doses of the Oxford/AstraZeneca vaccine have been ordered.

There is continued monitoring once a vaccine is being used in the wider population. The NHS will only provide approved vaccines which have been tested for safety and effectiveness. People should be assured that whatever vaccine they get, it is worth their while.

Across the country, care home staff, those aged 80 and over, as well as NHS staff considered to be a risk will be offered vaccination first in line with JCVI recommendations. If supplies allow, vaccines should be offered to the most vulnerable 13 million people by the middle of February.

Coronavirus can affect anyone. This is the biggest vaccination programme in UK history and it will take time to vaccinate all the eligible people. COVID-19 vaccines will become available as they are approved for use and as each batch is manufactured. Every dose is needed to protect those at highest risk. You will be called in as soon as there is enough vaccine available.

Some people who can't get to a local vaccination centre may have to wait for the supply of the right type of vaccine because only some vaccines can be transported between people's homes.

The COVID-19 vaccination will reduce the chance of your suffering from COVID-19 disease. Like all medicines, no vaccine is completely effective, so you should continue to take recommended precautions to avoid infection and continue to follow social distancing rules.

Some people may still get COVID-19 despite having a vaccination, but this should be less severe. The COVID-19 vaccine should help reduce the rates of serious illness and save lives and will therefore reduce pressure on the NHS and social care services.

The vaccines do not contain living organisms and are safe for people with immune system disorders. A very small number of people who are at risk of COVID-19 cannot have the vaccine including people who have severe allergies. Women of childbearing age, those who are pregnant, planning a pregnancy or breastfeeding should read the detailed information. People suffering from a fever-type illness should also postpone having the vaccine until they have recovered.

The MHRA have said these vaccines are highly effective, but to get full protection it is really important for people to come back for the second dose. To ensure as many people are vaccinated as quickly as possible, it is now advised that the second dose of both the OxfordAstraZeneca and the Pfizer/BioNtech vaccine should be scheduled up to 12 weeks apart. Full protection kicks in around a week or two after that second dose, which is why it's important that you act on your invitation and get booked in asap.

The vaccine works by making a protein from the virus that is important for creating protection. The protein works by stimulating the immune system to make antibodies and cells to fight the infection.

The vaccine cannot give you COVID-19 infection. Two doses will reduce your chance of becoming seriously ill. We do not yet know whether it will stop you from catching and passing on the virus, so, it is important to follow the up to date guidance to protect those around you. No vaccine is completely effective and it will take a few weeks for your body to build up protection.

The MHRA have looked at whether people who have had Covid-19 should get vaccinated. They have decided that getting vaccinated is just as important for people in a priority group identified by JCVI who have already had Covid-19 as it is for those who haven't.

It is not essential to leave time between the flu and Covid vaccine but it is recommended that there should be a gap of a week.

In the meantime here are four steps you can take to get started:

- Work out how much you owe Make a list of whom you owe money to and add up how much you need to pay each month. If you don't have your most recent statements, contact your creditor to find out what you owe. Some creditors will have special arrangements for people with Covid-related arrears.
- 2. Prioritise your debts Your rent or mortgage, energy and council tax are called priority debts as there can be serious consequences if you don't pay them. Separate these and work out how much you owe. Again, you can ask the companies or council what support might be available during the pandemic.
- 3. Work out how much you can pay Create a budget by adding up your essential living costs, such as food and housing, and taking these away from your income. The Citizens Advice budgeting tool can help.
 - Any money you have spare can be put towards your debts, starting with the priority debts first.
 - If you have any money left after paying priority debts, but not enough to make your usual payments on other debts, consider getting advice on the best way for you to start getting on top of them. Or contact your creditors and offer them what you can afford to pay.
- 4. If you can't pay your debts If you've got little or no money spare to pay your priority debts seek advice from Citizens

Advice straight away. If you're struggling to pay for basics like food, seek help immediately to see what support might be available to you. If you can't pay off other debts, such as credit cards and loans, it would also be worth contacting your nearest Citizens Advice.

There were no other declarations of interest, direct or indirect, in any items of business on the agenda.
