Letter From Revd. Zoe

Dear friends

Happy New Year!!

New Beginnings is the first thing that springs to mind when I think about January. Last January wasn't just a new month in a New Year for my husband Nigel and myself but also marked other new beginnings: a new adventure to a country we had never visited before, this being China. As we turned the New



Year, last year, I knew it wouldn't be too long before I saw my daughter Nikki. We were also fortunate enough to be in China for the Chinese New Year celebrations. The streets of Shanghai were adorned with these beautiful lanterns that you can see in the photo above.

It was during this visit that my eyes were opened to how challenging it had been for my daughter when she had first arrived in China some 4 months before – the challenge of so many new beginnings: a new country, new language, new culture, new way of life, new job, new home, new expectations and new friendships to form. My daughter is someone who readily embraces change, seeing the new opportunities, potential and possibilities of all that can be rather than change as a threat. Perhaps she has age on her side too that helps when we are navigating change in life.

How do you view change? Are new beginnings something that you look forward to or dread?! I suppose it might depend upon what the new beginning is and what it entails!

The last couple of years have been challenging times for our Family of 12 churches – building new working relationships; creating and building a team of ministers to work across the group – a new way of working to the traditional mode of one vicar with one/few churches. As a team we work across a diverse group of communities from ex-mining to rural with 9 schools from community schools to church schools, primary to secondary, academy to private school. Defining the reality of each community and each church community has taken time. There has also been some confusion about my role. As part of our review it was agreed that we will move forward from the informal arrangement we had been working with. On Tuesday 13th February 2018 at 7.30pm at St Andrew's Eakring, as well as being Priest in Charge of Ollerton with

Boughton, Bishop Paul will license me as Priest in Charge of Bilsthorpe, Eakring, Egmanton, Kirton, Kneesall, Laxton with Moorhouse, Walesby and Wellow with Rufford. This marks a new beginning and chapter in our life together as I move on from being granted pastoral oversight informally to being formally 'in Charge' with the authority and responsibility that comes with this role. It is hoped that this will give clarity and stability to our Family of churches and communities in the way we relate to each other, understand each other and move forward together. I look forward to serving our communities in this new capacity.

Laxton's Historic Farming System

As mentioned in last month's Dpen Jielo, Sir John Starkey Chair of the Visitor Centre Trust met with Mr Ken Jones the Rural Director for The Crown on 16/11/17. Sir John has reported back that several ideas/suggestions were discussed and did not meet with any objections. He wishes for the Visitor Centre Trust to discuss these options and to this end he called a meeting of the Trustees on 18/12/17.

The result of that meeting and the recommendations are not known as the magazine goes to press, but they will be reported in the next **Open Itel** in February 2018.

Additionally the Crown met again with all the tenants on 7/12/17 and we await to hear any news/ feedback from that.

The Parish Council have also received reply letters from Ian Mills and our MP Robert Jenrick who have met, both expressing huge support for the preservation of the Open Field Farming system.



Jury Day and Court Day at Laxton

Following on from the recent promise that we would describe the key elements of the historic farming practices of Laxton for the benefit of newer residents, two of the most important occurred recently.

Laxton is well know nationally and internationally for its open fields and strip farming system. This is captured on the beautiful new signs which welcome visitors to the village. What is not seen is the Court Leet, the manorial court which manages the system and which really sets Laxton apart from anywhere else.

Jury Day

On the last Thursday of November the Jury members who were sworn into post the previous year set off to inspect the wheat field. This is the field which has been fallow through the summer and has to be sown with wheat for the coming season. This year the wheat field is West Field (also known as Top Field).



The Jury travel all together in a trailer pulled by a tractor and lined with straw bales for their comfort. They carry a supply of wooden stakes and a hammer. They walk around the field examining in detail where the strips join the grassy areas between them, known as sykes - pronounced 'six' here in Laxton. They knock in a stake where the double furrow between each pair of strips should meet the syke. If the farmer either side has ploughed too far this is noted by the field Foreman. The Foreman for West Field is Johnny Godson. If they have encroached onto the syke or failed to shovel back in any soil which has fallen on the syke this is also noted.

The correct positions of the junctions are learned through experience and maintained 'by custom and tradition'. Checks are also made to ensure that the water courses are unobstructed.

When the whole field has been inspected the Jury return to The Dovecote for the traditional lunch which follows. They certainly needed something to warm them up this year as it was one of the coldest Jury Days for years with a cold wind whipping around on the exposed field.

Suitably refreshed the men of the Jury discuss the infringements of the system which had been recorded and they are written on the 'Presentment Paper', which will report them at the Court Leet the

following week. Unlike the more familiar court system, the Jury recommend the penalties to be imposed on the people responsible.

Laxton Court Leet

Laxton has the unique distinction of still having a Court Leet with full powers to determine legal proceedings and levy fines. The revision of the Administration of Justice Act (1977) removed these powers from all the other similar courts. Only one other, the Estray Court in Denbeigh, retains powers, but there they relate to rounding up stray sheep.

He sits with the Bailiff. Robert

The Court receives legal advice and direction from the Steward, a solicitor appointed by the Lord of the Manor. At the present time the Steward is Alistair Millar of Tallents on Southwell. It is a personal appointment and he continues a long association between the Lords of Laxton and his firm.

Haigh, and the Clerk to the Gaits and Commons, Stuart Rose. The Bailiff issues a legal summons to the court in advance and he opens the court with a formal pronouncement. The first part of the proceedings involves calling the Manor Suit

Roll - a list or people with property in Laxton. Those present answer to their name and for each person not present a 2p 'essoign' is payable. No longer does the Bailiff go out to collect this.

but rather

brings a bag of 2p pieces and pays on their behalf. This year he left 18p the poorer.

Next the Jury, also called the Homage, is sworn in for the following year. First the Foreman of the year currently in fallow takes the oath on behalf of the Jury. This year this fell to Roy Hennell, Foreman of Mill Field. Each of the Jurors are then called up in groups to take their oath and to kiss the Bible. This is an historic volume, but with the modern eye to



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This year there were some new faces on the Jury elected. Keith Morton, a retired farmer from Brockilow farm who farmed in Laxton at one time and now lives in the village was elected along



with the publican David Brown and Tony Farrelly, a new resident of Laxton with farming experience.

This year following the sad death of Bill Haigh, it was necessary to elect a new Foreman for South (Bottom) Field. Robert Haigh proposed Ivan Rayner and he was elected unopposed. His field will be the wheat field in 2019.

The Steward reads the minutes of the court held the previous year and then moves on to reading the Presentment paper and the proposed penalties. These are invariably fines or warnings and anyone can raise an objection. It is not unheard of for someone to



object on behalf of another and have their fine reduced. Fines are due to be paid by the following Court Day.

When the penalties are agreed and any other matters raised are dealt with, the Bailiff closes the Court with another formal pronouncement.

A general discussion is then opened to deal with matters of interest to all those present. Following on from the correspondence reported in these pages in recent months, there are some weighty issues being looked at. Also present at the Court as observers were representatives of the Crown Estate and their agents, Carter Jonas and Professor John Beckett. They were all able to offer their knowledge and insight to the following discussion and the occasion provide a chance for all concerned to chat informally.

Laxton Helps Historians

Two Oxford University historians, Prof. Helena Hamerow and Prof. Amy Bogaard, recently contacted Kathryn Summerwill at Nottingham University about the exhibition on Laxton which she curated in 2008. Kathryn directed them to local contacts and as a result both were able to visit on Jury Day and go around the fields to see the Jury at work.

They are involved in a four year project looking at 'Feeding Saxon Britain'. They are interested in what the plant life of Laxton's open fields may be able to tell them about the species which may have been present all that time ago.

They found their visit fascinating and will be back again during their project to make some detailed studies. We will follow their research with interest.

The Bennett Family of Laxton

The History Group took a look at the Bennett family with help from a number of descendants living in the area. This has helped to uncover further links not known at the time our booklets were written. Our regular contributor and family historian, Jenni Dobson is currently researching the Bennett family members who were associated with Laxton and to some of whom she is related.

She has written the article which follows as an introduction and would like very much to hear from anyone who has any further information about this family which they would be willing to share with a view to it being included in the coming series. Jenni is still researching and the series will begin later this year.

A Tale of Two Georges

Recorded in the census for Laxton in 1841, residing in the home of John Keyworth, farmer, is George Bennett, a 10 year old 'Ag M S' – meaning an 'agricultural man servant'. This is the same John Keyworth referred to by MWS earlier in this edition. Also in the house, listed after him, is Frances Bennett, employed as housekeeper. One of several limitations of this census is that it did not ask for the relationships of the people in the household, but it may seem reasonable, from their names and ages, to guess that Frances and George may be mother and son. Certainly this interpretation has appeared in print elsewhere. George has also been described as 'nephew' of John Keyworth, a term to which I'll return later.

Twenty years later, the 1861 Laxton census records a George Bennett, born about 1825 at Marnham and who was a wheelwright, living with his wife Selina and their three children. Again, it may seem a reasonable inference that this was the same George, especially given two more shortcomings of the 1841 census: that it didn't ask for specific birth places, nor for exact ages, which would have allowed comparison with information recorded in 1861. Adults were asked to round their age down to the nearest 5 years and though the ages of children were supposed to be given exactly, heads of household didn't always follow the directions closely.

My own interest in the Bennett surname, via my 3x great-grandmother Ann Bennett led me initially into researching George and Frances. Ann was a daughter of Samuel and Sarah Bennett. She was born in 1809 at Marnham and married William Beedham at Tuxford in 1833. Having noticed that when Frances Bennett married John Keyworth in 1842, she gave her father's name as Samuel, I wondered if she might be Ann's sibling.

Only the promise of adding to my own family story kept me investigating, both at Nottinghamshire Archives and on the internet, an extensive set of family connections that were rarely straightforward to understand.

To keep the research story short, though I found no baptism for a sibling named Frances, I did find a will held at Notts Archives for Samuel Bennett who died in 1826. It is a very professional document, which an archivist considers to be strong evidence for his family. In it, Samuel makes bequests to his daughters: Sarah, Frances, Ann and Mary. All his children except Frances had been baptised at Marnham. The record for the period when Frances was born is poorly kept and more sparse than in preceding or following years.

Moreover, Samuel also mentions his daughter Sarah's illegitimate son, George, saying that he has already made a Bond of Indemnity with the parish officers, so that the boy will not become a charge upon the parish. The will put money in trust to be invested for income on which Sarah and George could live until the boy was old enough to work. A search produced a baptism on 1st June 1823 at Marnham for George, son of Sarah Bennett, servant.

So where was this George in 1841? I believe he was living in Tuxford, as an apprentice wheelwright, aged 15, in the household of John Bowman, age 70 years. For me the clincher to this identification is that I believe John Bowman may be related by marriage to George.

- George's uncle John Bennett, eldest brother of Sarah, married Elizabeth Bowman, daughter of Thomas and Mary Bowman, in 1825.
- Sarah's sister Ann, (my ancestor) had married William Beedham.
- William Beedham's aunt, Mary neé Beedham had married Thomas Bowman and thus was Elizabeth's mother! Both Mary and Thomas are aged 65 in 1841, hence Thomas and John Bowman may be siblings or first cousins.

George married Selina Hopkinson on 5th October 1848 at Marnham – and so they are the couple living at Laxton in 1861. George's occupation as wheelwright fits with his apprenticeship noted in 1841 and though his stated age is a couple of years adrift, his birthplace is given as Marnham, matching the baptism I traced.

So I venture to suggest that in fact this George Bennett was indeed the nephew of John Keyworth, as indicated in some estate records, by the plain fact of John having married George's aunt Frances, the sister of George's mother Sarah Bennett.

I feel this interpretation is further supported by the fact that Sarah Bennett eventually also comes to Laxton, where I believe she was buried on 11th January 1876, aged 75 and described as being 'of Egmanton Hill' - almost certainly the present day Egmanton Hill Farm.

So, what of Frances' son George? He was baptised at Fledborough on 27th December 1829 and from 1861 onwards consistently gave this as his birthplace. On 10th August 1854 at Laxton, he married Sarah Whittington, the daughter of William and Elizabeth, baptised in 1830 at Kneesall.

George and Sarah seem to have settled at Norwell Woodhouse, so were not far from Frances, who had married John Keyworth and remained in Laxton.

And the bottom line of this 'Tale of Two Georges' is that they were first cousins.

Down Memory Lane

This month we have two contributions from readers, recalling memories of Laxton past. Thank you so much to both of them. If you have a recollection you would like us to include, please do let us have it.

The Top and Bottom of It

John and his brother, Thomas Keyworth, were Laxton farmers in the 19th century and it is safe to say they left a lasting mark on the village and its population!

In the family their respective farms were referred to as the top farm and the bottom farm, or locally, as 'Kewuth up top and Kewuth down bottom'. By 1881, Town End Farm (the top farm) had been taken over from John Keyworth by John Bagshaw.

In the 1911 census, only the outlying farms were named – apart from Top Farm, the address given for John Bagshaw (really Town End Farm). Thomas Keyworth had previously lived at the bottom farm, which is the present day Step Farm. There is, of course, nowadays and very possibly was then, another Bottom Farm.

Edie How, who was brought up in Laxton and lived at the present Bottom Farm before moving to Tuxford, said the farm was still often known as Rose's Farm in her early days. In my young days, farms were generally known by the name of their occupants and therefore could change as farms changed hands.

Certainly, the Rose family had lived in Bottom Farm for many years. John Rose moved out with his family, leaving his father Joseph behind - but not for long. Joseph died in 1889. and John had 'crossed the road '. By 1911 three generations had moved into School House Farm.

Dorothy Violetta Rose, John's daughter, who died in 1980, referred to these farms as 'our farm up top' and 'our farm down t'bottom'. (She also referred to another farm as 'our farm 'cross the road' but that is another story).

Clear? Still Confused? More confused?

Getting to the 'top and bottom of it' is not always straightforward.

It is interesting that another branch of the Roses - Stuart and his family - now live at Bottom Farm, his father, Reg, having moved there before him in 1953.

I wonder if their common ancestor, Christopher Rose, lived at Bottom Farm in1656.

Tuxford Young Farmers

So for the first week of November we all made Christmas shoe boxes for people who unfortunately don't get Christmas presents or are in less fortunate circumstances than ourselves. 

Group Oil Order

The November order was delivered to 20 households in the Laxton area at a price of 41.95p/litre. One customer sent in the following message with her thanks:



Oil safely delivered very smoothly this morning. My neighbour (not in our group) had oil out of the same tanker and had paid 46.9p! I told him to join our group and I heard someone paid 53p yesterday.

Admittedly the price we pay can depend on the timing of our call, but it does seem bizarre that oil delivered from the same tanker can have been sold at such very different prices.

The bad news is that the price of oil is still edging up at the time of writing, so the next order could cost more per litre. We always negotiate for the best price and readers may be interested to know that since September 2006, the highest we paid was 59.80p per litre in March 2013. The highest quote for that order was 63.75p per litre.

The next order will be placed in approx. February depending on how cold it gets. Please notify the volume you need around the end of January to <u>oil@openfield.org.uk.</u> If it is evident that people need an earlier order, those on the mailing list will be contacted in the usual way and given the chance to order earlier.

Winter Opening at Recycling Centres

Nottinghamshire's recycling centres, operated by Veolia (NCC's waste contractors) are on winter opening hours. The recycling centres will be open from 8am and close at 4pm until Wednesday 28th February. This includes those at Brailwood Road, Bilsthorpe, Brunel Drive, Newark and Hallcroft Road, Retford.



Citizens Advice Sherwood and Newark warns people of getting tied into subscriptions.

Citizens Advice **Sherwood and Newark** is warning people about getting stuck with subscriptions after new research reveals people are wasting hundreds of pounds on them when they're no longer wanted.

Analysis of 500 cases reported to the Citizens Advice consumer service between June and August 2017 finds people lost an average of £160 from subscriptions they wanted to cancel, but weren't able to.

Citizens Advice **Sherwood and Newark** is now sharing tips on how to avoid getting tied into a subscription and campaigning to help people understand their consumer rights. The analysis from national Citizens Advice reveals that companies can make it hard to cancel a subscription with 9 in 10 people prevented from doing so after initially asking. Common reasons for turning down a cancellation include being told to use a specific method, like the phone, or to give more than a month's notice.

People also reported not being made aware they had signed up for a subscription in the first place, or that their contract would continue on an auto renewal basis.

With subscriptions now being offered across a range of goods and services, from beauty products to TV streaming, Citizens Advice **Sherwood and Newark** is urging people to check the small print before they sign up to one.

Under the Consumer Rights Act 2015, businesses can't enforce terms on consumers that are unfair.

Lesley Barrick, Advice Service Manager of Citizens Advice Sherwood and Newark said:

"People can be made to feel like they're going round in circles when trying to cancel a subscription".

"This research shows that companies are continuing to cash in on unwanted subscriptions by blocking people's cancellation on the grounds of a technicality. It's important for people to read any terms and conditions before signing up to a subscription, but they should also be on the lookout for companies who are deliberately throwing obstacles in their way when they try to cancel".

"Anyone who needs advice on how to cancel a subscription, or runs into difficulty doing so, should contact us for further help."

Need to know tips about subscriptions

Check what your cancellation rights are

Each supplier can set their own cancellation policy and they don't need to offer you a right to cancel your subscription early. Make sure the terms and conditions look reasonable before signing up.

Remember you've got a cooling off period if you buy online

If you bought the subscription online, the law says you usually have 14 days to get your money back if you change your mind. However, you might not be able to get a refund if you start using the service straight away.

Follow the cancellation policy

Make sure you follow the cancellation policy set out in your contract when you're ready to end your subscription. Don't stop your payment without checking what else is required first - otherwise your subscription may not be cancelled and you could be liable for any missed payments.

Challenge unfair T&Cs

There are no strict definitions for what counts as an unfair policy. But if you're finding it tough or have to give a long period of notice to cancel a subscription, contact the supplier's customer services department. If this fails go to the supplier's trade or complaints body or report to Trading Standards via the Citizens Advice consumer service.


Music at the Mausoleum

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Minutes of Laxton & Moorhouse Parish Council Meeting 21/11/2017

The meeting was preceded at 7.00 pm by an open meeting to discuss the installation at key locations of brown signs directing visitors to the village and the design of any such signs.

No members of the public attended.

After discussion, the following locations were identified:

- A6075 At the bottom of Cocking Hill at the brickworks
- The Tuxford junction between Newcastle Street and Newark Road
- A614 island at Ollerton and Ollerton roundabout itself

The clerk will investigate the funding available and how to access those monies. Councillor Pringle will support any funding bid.

6. **Minutes of the parish council meeting held on 26 September 2017:** The minutes of the meeting held on 26 September 2017 were agreed as a true record and signed by the chair.

Mr Godson arrived at 7.40 pm during this item

- 7. Matters arising: There were no matters arising.
 - Reports from district and county councillors: Councillor Michael reported that:
 - 2) She would seek a progress update regarding the two empty properties in the village
 - 3) The next Safer Neighbourhood Group meeting is at South Muskham village hall on 11 January 2018 at 5.30 pm. Mr S Hill will try to attend NSDC has housed six Syrian families, chosen because each has a family member with a disability and a family member with a trade who will be able to make an economic contribution to the district. Councillor Pringle reported that:
 - 1) NCC has a new sky lantern policy to address the fire risk associated with the lanterns
 - 2) The new LIS funding scheme has opened to applications
 - The full council is considering a motion on 22 November 2017 to preserve all county owned land and historic sites from fracking works

He will chase up the restoration of the fingerpost at Westfield

- 8. **Reports from councillors:** Mr R Hennell confirmed that the winter salt had been delivered.
 - Mr Brown reported that streetlights 13, 17 and 19 had been repaired but with LEDs which were incongruous with the remaining lights. He and the chair will undertake an inspection of the condition of all the lights to ensure that they are in full working order for the winter.
- 9. **2018 meeting dates:** Dates as circulated by the clerk approved, save that the January 2018 meeting date should be Tuesday 23 January. The clerk will forward details to the Open Field editor.

10. Financial Matters:

- a. **Financial position as at 31 October 2017:** Councillors considered and noted the clerk's report showing the precise financial position at 31 October 2017 (incorporating the 2017-18 budget figures).
- b. **Accounts for payment:** The council unanimously approved six payments totalling £383.19.
- c. **External auditor's report:** Contents and comments noted. Councillors were pleased to receive an unqualified report. They also noted Mr Butler's letter of thanks.
- d. **Appointment of internal auditor:** Mr S Hill reported that he had been unsuccessful in his approach to a potential candidate. The clerk will make enquiries of a colleague she had met on her NALC CiLCA training.

- e. Review system of internal control: Councillors discussed the operation of the system of internal control and agreed that it was adequate for the size and needs of the council and continued to operate effectively, subject to the appointment of an internal auditor which was in hand.
- f. Consider need for interim internal audit: The clerk advised councillors as to the on-going nature of the internal audit process. Councillors considered their financial affairs for the financial year to date. They decided that, given the thorough nature of the internal audit carried out by Mr Butler and routine nature of the parish council's financial affairs this year, an interim internal audit would be disproportionate and was not justified.
- g. **Review schedule of fixed assets:** Councillors reviewed the schedule of fixed assets. They confirmed that, contrary to the existing schedule, the council owns four benches in Laxton at a value of £400 each. They also decided that the value of Glebe Field was too high and that £10,000 was the appropriate figure. After extensive discussion, it was confirmed that the Wellington bomber memorial belongs to the council and should be recorded in the schedule.
- h. **Donation to Open Field printing costs:** Councillors recognised the contribution the magazine makes to the community and in bringing the council's minutes to residents' attention. They agreed that the council should support the publication by donating £60 per year towards the printing costs. They thanked the editor and her team for producing the much valued Open Field.

11. Property matters including:

- a. **Sports field:** Having declared an interest, the chair withdrew from the meeting.
 - Councillors discussed whether there was an agreement that the sports field committee would reimburse the council for the field rent. The clerk will review the council' minutes for any record of an agreement and write formally to the sports field committee asking them to check their minutes for any record of what had been agreed.
 - The chair returned to the meeting.
- b. Cricket pitch: The chair confirmed that the landowner had indicated a willingness to retain the cricket pitch in case the cricket team was ever re-formed in the future. No longer required as an agenda item.
- 12. **New parish council website:** Mr Brown agreed that his editorial access should be withdrawn to comply with the council's risk management arrangements. The chair will supply the photos used in the Visitor Centre display to be used on the website.

Councillors noted that the website is now being updated with council news.

13. Planning matters:

a. Applications:

- 17/01671/FUL | Householder application for the relocation, reconstruction and restoration of a timber and blockwork barrel roofed building. | Twitchill Farm House Cross Hill Laxton: Councillors considered the application and unanimously decided to support the proposal.
- ii. 17/01772/FUL | Householder application for construction of single storey side and rear extension and demolition of a uPVC porch and the construction of an Orangery. | Twitchill Farm House Cross Hill Laxton: Councillors considered the application and, on the understanding that the Orangery is no longer part of the proposal, decided that they had no objection to the proposal.
- a. **To note planning decisions by NSDC:** 17/01814/TWCA The Dovecote, Cross Hill, Laxton Fell sycamore (x1), clear branch tips blue cedar (x1) Approval noted.
- b. Compliance: No issues raised
- 14. Village development including The Crown's long term strategy: Councillors discussed Mr Iain Mills of The Crown's email and Mr R Jenrick MP's letter, both dated 16 November 2017. They were pleased that attention is now being paid to the community's concerns and needs and that plans are being developed to transfer ownership to a body more structurally suited to the stewardship needs of the open field system and community. It was noted that a meeting is taking place on 7 December 2017 between the Director of Rural Estates and the tenants to discuss matters further. Councillors did not wish to pre-empt those discussions. Until matters progress a little further, the council will not, therefore, be in a position to reach an informed view regarding the future.

The councillors agreed that the matter is unlikely to proceed quickly. They were anxious to ensure that they and the village gain the maximum benefit from all the support and interest Mr Jenrick was engaging and would be delighted to welcome Ms Coffey MP, Junior Minister for the Environment, to the community. However, if the full value of that visit is to be realised, its deferral to later in the New Year might be more useful.

The clerk will write a letter of thanks to Mr Mills and seek an indication of The Crown's estimated timescale for the production of a strategy. She will also write a letter of thanks to Mr Jenrick and explain the concern to ensure that Ms Coffey's visit is as

informative as possible.

The chair, Mr Brown and Mr S Rose are meeting with Sir John Temple and the Sherwood Trust to explore possible stewardship options.

There was discussion of the formation of a working group to help maintain the momentum and support active engagement by the community.

15. Village environment and appearance, including:

- a. Location of and access to community resilience container: Mr R Hennell confirmed that the containers are situated at Corner Farm and at Home View. They are left unlocked for swift access. There was discussion as to whether Home View was the best location for the second container. Mr S Hill and Mr J Hill will investigate.
- b. Village Hall refurbishment project and grant: The chair reported that the necessary financial arrangements have been made and funds are being paid. It is hoped that work will begin in spring 2018.
- c. Brown information road signs: See above public meeting preceding this meeting
- d. Moorhouse Village fingerpost: This year's LIS funding has been announced. It was agreed that the council is not in a position to make a strong funding bid at this stage. After discussion, it was decided that the council should begin to accrue a fund to be used for match funding the cost of a fingerpost in the future. The clerk will make a formal request for a donation from councilor Pringle.

Laxton Cricket Club

This month we continue Jo Godson's research into the social side of Laxton Cricket Club as reported in the Retford Gainsborough and Worksop Times. NB spellings shown as published

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12th January 1923
