The Last Letter from the Revd. Chris Levy

Dear Friends,

What can I say? This will be my last letter to you all before I reach my retirement at the end of July. For Denise and myself it is both an exciting time as we look towards our future in our new home and also a time for nostalgia as we look back over the time spent in these wonderful Parishes. For those of vou who will continue to worship here there is I know some uncertainty as to what the future holds and I know that Zoe will be working alongside you to help in that transition which sees one Priest exit stage left and another enter stage right.

Let me leave you to ponder the following: -

"Who am I, O Lord God, and what is my house that you have brought me thus far?"

These are the words of King David after he had built himself a house and settled in Jerusalem. He is looking back over his life, seeing his humble beginnings and all that has been achieved since. These words have often resonated with me over the vears. Far be it that I should seek to compare myself with King David but in those days when I was considering whether or not God was calling me to offer myself for Ordination it did seem that this passage cropped up at different times in different places. I often contemplated what is it saying to me?

I think we have all met people in our lives who have influenced us in one way or another. I used to look at the clergy I knew or read about and think am I able to do what these people are doing? Surely God does not want me to follow in their footsteps? However, the decision ultimately was not mine as we can only offer ourselves to the Church for Ordination and it is up to others who discern whether or not we do have a calling to the sacred ministry. Obviously the fact that I am now about to retire from this role as Incumbent of these Parishes would seem to testify that the Church decided that I did have a calling. Over the years there have been times when it has been necessary to review where am I and if it was time to move elsewhere.

At each stage of change this text again would come back into my mind. There is a sense that David is saying to God, as we all do, you have brought me thus far, is that it? Or do you want me to go onwards doing even more for you? David wanted to build a dwelling place for God. However, God decided that this would be carried out by Solomon. So as we progress in life we are all faced with the realisation that we have achieved so much and there may well be a time for others to continue what has been started. Most Clergy will tell you that there is always something else that they would like to do but realise that on occasions it is best if they move


aside and let someone else take that task on board. For all of you in these Parishes there is a sense that yes we have made this journey together. We have reached a particular point along the road and the journey will continue. More importantly, though, it is God who is at the centre of all our journeying. He leads us all to this place in this moment of time. Hopefully all of us at time will ponder the question "Who am I?" We might see ourselves as not worthy of serving God but the lesson I

learnt all those years ago was if God wants you however much we might try to fight him he will win in the end.

So enjoy serving God. I wish all you well in the future and look forward to seeing you from time to time. Besides Mansfield is not too far away.

As mentioned in the last magazine, our outing was to Hayton and Clayworth churches on 23rd May.

Due to illness our numbers were down. Those attending had a lovely afternoon being made very welcome by the people who met us and showed us around.

Hayton was the first church on our trip. We all found it difficult to find! It was down a lane away from the village. The present village seems to have developed away from the original settlement and church.



The second church at Clayworth held a wonderful surprise inside. We had been expecting to see one or two painted panels, but we discovered that fine murals covered all the chancel walls. These were the work of Edinburgh artist Phoebe Anna Traquair and were painted in 1904 - 5, commissioned by the

Lady of the Manor in thanksgiving for the safe return of her son from the Boer War.

Our guide, Ellis, gave us a very interesting talk on the church, pointing out several interesting features. These included a lovely stone screen entrance into the side chapel and a stone carving at the base of one of the pillars, thought to be a memorial to the stone mason's child.





Very bizarre were the stone carved heads on the pillars etc., which had had their noses cut off! This was thought to have been done by Oliver Cromwell's men who were billeted in the church as they passed through.

There was a very fine tomb in memory of a

judge. The only other example of this is in a church in London. This is due to be restored. It is so big I don't know how they will get it through the screen and out of the church!

A lovely afternoon ended with tea and cakes supplied by the ladies of the church.

Laxton History Group



Group members' attention has been firmly focussed on the finishing line of the HLF funded project for the past couple of months.

At the time of writing, the first two booklets are complete and have been collected from the printers. They are awaiting the big day of our Launch on 24th June, when they will be revealed to our guests and visitors to our exhibition. There will be a report on the event next month as it is too late for the July edition.

Andy Columbine, designer of our new logo which now appears with our articles, has been burning the midnight oil to get the final two booklets set out and ready to go to the printers. They are being printed locally in Nottingham.

By the time Open Field is distributed, villagers should be receiving their deliveries of a free set of booklets with the compliments of Laxton History Group, paid for within the grant of £31,400 which we received from the HLF.

As the project comes to a conclusion we have to report back on what we did, how well we met the objectives we stated in our bid and how much effort we put into it. This is almost impossible to calculate, and for quite a few people at times it has felt like a full time job. We have done our best to tot up the hours expended on the project and up to the date of the launch we estimate that

Over 50 volunteers have spent in excess of 5,500 hours (685 working days) contributing to the project



The HLF uses a figure of £50 a day to put a monetary value on volunteer input for general tasks and £100 a day for professional services. Using the lower figure our efforts equate to over

£120,000.

We think we have given very good value for their money.

In addition to our booklets we have prepared teaching and Learning Packs for use in primary schools, which will be made available to them via the internet.

We are now working on a presentation to take out to community groups

to tell them about what we have discovered and how we have gone about it. If you know a group which might like to book us, please let any History Group member have details. We also have a free-standing display which can be used in libraries, schools and public

Behind the Archive Doors



This month we are having another look inside the University of Nottingham's Manvers Collection, held with their Manuscripts & Special Collections.

The correspondence between tenants, vicar and the Estate agent reveal many references to health concerns and treatments. The Estate took an interest in these problems and offered help as when in 1921 Mr Argles wrote to the then vicar, Revd. S B Bleau, saying 'I hope that Walter Moody and Lacey will soon be much better. In future, if you have concerns that any of your parishioners connected with the Thoresby Estate require any special treatment, I hope you will not hesitate to send me a line, then it may be possible to arrange something for their benefit.'

With the cold and draughty houses as well as the hard life most of the villagers led, rheumatism seems to have been something which concerned many. Askern, a village seven miles north of Doncaster and nine miles south of Pontefract was known for it's waters and villagers were sent there for treatment.

A Bath Charity was established in 1825 to enable 'poor persons to avail themselves of the benefit of the waters.' The water is described as having a sulphurous smell and drinking the water and using it in baths was deemed 'very efficacious' in rheumatism, gout, and a range of other conditions.

Soon after this letter, Mr Argles wrote to Dr P B Whittington in Tuxford 'My dear Whittington'. 'Lord Manvers has got some tickets for the

Askern Bath Charity, and I hope to hear tomorrow of suitable lodgings for Lacey. He will then be able to go immediately to Askern on Monday or Friday. I see the following rule, "Patients must come provided with a medical certificate stating condition of heart and kidneys". Will you kindly provide Lacey with this certificate. I think it may be possible to get him away on Monday next.'

Taking responsibility for arranging the visit, he writes first to Mrs Birtwhistle, Lacey's sister in Belton, Doncaster, saying 'I have arranged for your brother W Lacey to go to Askern on Friday next. He will leave Tuxford at 9.40 and will arrive Doncaster Station at 10.26. You will no doubt meet him there or write and tell him at what time you arrive at Doncaster and he will then look out for you. I suppose you will go to Askern with him, and as I told you before, I have arranged lodgings for him at Mrs Bradley's. Mrs Cree, Laxton, informs me that she also stayed at Mrs Bradley's and I hope he will be very comfortable there. I will pay for the lodging direct from the Thoresby Estate Office and I gave your brother money yesterday for railway expenses and something towards the cost of his board.'

He also informs Mrs Cree of the arrangements: 'Will you kindly tell Lacey that the arrangements have been made for him to go to Askern on Friday next, and I have obtained suitable rooms for him at Mrs Bradley's, Matlock House, High St., Askern. I have just written to Mrs Birtwistle to say that he is going to Askern on Friday, and I hope to call and see Lacey next week.' Contacting neighbours and friends seems the norm as other examples in coming months will show.

Finally Mr Argles writes to 'The Secretary, Askern Bath Charity, High Street, Askern. 'Mr W Lacey, Laxton, Newark, who is being sent by Lord Manvers for treatment, will come to Askern on Friday next and will bring with him the three tickets you kindly sent me a short time ago, and for which I enclose the sum of 20/-. Lacey will bring a medical certificate with him which I have just received from Dr Whitington, Tuxford. I enclose copy of this certificate.'

It was not only the tenants who suffered. In 1906 Mr Wordsworth concludes a letter to Rev. Collinson 'very trying weather for rheumatism, but I hope you are better'.

Mr Willis, the village schoolmaster, and someone the estate liaised with frequently in relation to the school and on village affairs, found himself out of favour when negotiating alterations to School House. In favour of his case he wrote 'I feel very strongly about this because my wife suffers from rheumatism and bronchial asthma and this doorway would save the carrying of things out of doors into the wash house....I shall be much obliged if you can have the work started immediately after Whit-week', signing deferentially 'Yours obediently'. Unfortunately his plans put him out of favour with the Agent.

Health Matters - Prescribed Medication

Please note that this item has kindly been supplied by Dr Chris Shearstone-Walker from Tuxford surgery. The principles of not requesting unnecessary medication etc. applies to everyone, but for specific details of times and process patients of any other surgery e.g. at Sutton-on-Trent, Ollerton or elsewhere, should contact their own surgery to check what they prefer or offer. Thank you.

This month focuses on using the surgery dispensary effectively and all trying to reduce medication costs, given overstretched NHS budgets. The surgery dispensary provides repeat printed prescriptions for patients ineligible for medications dispensed from the surgery as they live too close to the local chemist, and it orders and provides medication to the remaining patients. It is open from 9 a.m. to 6.30 p.m. Monday to Friday. However workloads within the dispensary have to be organised to ensure that the staff have protected time to carry out vital behind the scenes activities and avoid errors and incorrect storage of medication items. If a fridge item is delivered the dispensary staff must store it promptly in the fridge. Controlled drugs must be logged in and locked away. The preferred method or ordering repeat medications is via the online facility provided by our clinical system, EMIS Web. To use this service, each service user must register it. This is done by asking reception to generate the relevant password, which is printed out at reception, and is individual to every patient. As this also provides access to health record information, full written consent is required by all adult patients who do not request this in person. Ordering on line generates a request for either a printed prescription, or invokes the fulfilment of the prescription by providing the medication. This work can be performed at times when the dispenser is not being interrupted by either phone requests, or trying to fulfil the prescriptions of surgery patients who have attended with acute problems. This reduces the possible number of errors. We all know that if you are interrupted during a task, sometimes that task is not completed properly as there are a limited number of plates that we can all spin at one time!

The second preferred way for requesting repeat prescriptions is to put them in writing and drop them in the box outside the dispensary hatch. This is emptied on a regular basis and, like electronic ordering, enables staff to process requests at times when they are not subject to interruptions. Telephone requests are still currently taken at Tuxford (although this may not be a service that we are able to provide indefinitely, and indeed some surgeries no longer take telephone requests), but this is the least favoured option as it can interrupt the dispenser mid-task, and is most susceptible to erroneous requests. The dispensary line is now open

between 9 a.m. and 11.30 a.m. and 2 p.m. and 4 p.m. Monday to Thursday, and 9a.m. to 12 p.m. on Friday.

Routine prescriptions will be fulfilled 48 working hours after ordering to enable time for the doctors to check and sign requested printed prescription, and for the dispensary to order any medications from the wholesaler for those patients for whom we provide a dispensing service. We would urge patients to only request medications that they actually need. It is very easy to tick to request everything, or to say over the phone that you need everything, but please think carefully before ordering. Over recent months we have had great hoards of medication returned when someone has passed away and their relatives have cleared their cupboards. In some cases this amounted to several months' worth of medication. If you do not need an 'as required' medication (such as a cramp tablet or a painkiller), or have built up a stock of a regular medication that you have forgotten to take on occasion, then please do not request it. This also applies to patients who have arranged for the chemist to order repeat prescriptions. If the chemist dispenses a drug that you do not need and it then leaves the chemist it cannot be used for another patient, even if you return it unopened. Such an order results in the NHS being charged for the price of the medication and the relevant dispensing fee.

If you notice that you have built up a stock of any medication then please tell either our dispensers or the chemist. It is better to let us all know rather than add to the already escalating NHS drug budget. Your medications are likely to change from time to time so it is not sensible to build up a stock of something that may be rendered useless by a medication change. We would much prefer that everyone was honest with the doctors, dispensing staff and chemist about what they are actually taking. This will avoid excess prescribing of medication and enable your doctor to make management changes on what you are taking, not what they may think you are taking (but requesting to make it look like you are taking. Yes this does happen).

There are good reasons why we request that repeat prescriptions are picked up after 10.30 a.m. and we have noticed an increasing number of patients coming to pick up their repeat scripts or medication before this time. During the morning the dispensers are providing the acutely unwell patients who are booked in to see the doctors in the morning with medications that they should start as soon as possible. They are also checking in stock that comes in first thing in the morning, in particular controlled drugs such as morphine, which needs to be entered with care into the controlled drug registers. Repeated interruptions leaves these processes open to errors. We do realise that sometimes collection earlier than 10.30 a.m. is unavoidable, but would ask that patients request to pick up medication earlier in advance – it can then be put aside in a separate holding area (and will make any interruption much less intrusive).
