



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
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Free to Good Home



Green Winged Orchids in Laxton



Local people enjoy going to see the small cluster of green winged orchids which grow in South Field and bloom any time around the beginning of May.

The cluster is so small that they can usually be easily counted. Since the turn of the century the numbers have peaked at around 35 - 40 flower spikes. Local folklore has it that there are never many more and often fewer.

It was a rare sight then to see not only around 100 flowers in the original cluster, but a second cluster some 75m away with 8 blooms. The very wet spring must have suited them! Let's hope the second cluster becomes established.



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Laxton as a Surname

Some years ago I had a colleague at the University of Nottingham by the name of Bob Laxton. He was a scientist who brought his skills to bear on archaeological questions particularly tree ring dating.

Just occasionally it struck me as interesting that he had the surname 'Laxton'. Bob retired and subsequently died, and I never did get around to asking him about his name. Recently the link between places and people through names came up again.

I live in the parish of Chilwell, a single name settlement (west of Nottingham) so anyone called 'Chilwell' is likely to have origins locally stretching back to the 12th or even 13th centuries. So it was interesting to me to note that playing football for Chelsea FC and England is a young man named Ben Chilwell.

Where did he get that surname? The general view today is that a place name used as a family name is a reasonably good indicator of probable place of residence (or recent residence) in the 12th-13th centuries, but thereafter much more problematic. Since Chilwell is a single place name - there are no other examples - it seems likely that one of Ben's family lived in the village as long ago as the 12th or 13th centuries. Of course, we have no confirmatory evidence, and Chilwell is so rare that it does not even make it into a modern place names dictionary.

Then another example appeared on my horizon. On the first day of the 2021 cricket County Championship this year I noticed that Warwickshire had a bowler named Norwell.

As readers will know, Norwell is only a short distance from Laxton where Michael and Elizabeth Jones have been studying every aspect of the history of the village. I asked them about the Norwell family, and this was Michael's response:

The most notable family of Norwells I know occur extensively in the White Book [of Southwell] when at least four also held Norwell prebends but where we also have the evidence for their presence in and around Norwell and for holding land here and in neighbouring villages. Since they were clerics they should not have had direct legitimate descendants but they clearly also had lay relatives as well and a number of families of Norwells also flourished here and elsewhere. It would indeed be an interesting exercise to try to get as far back in the genealogies of modern Norwell. Michael is not intending to start on his own suggestion just yet, but he does suggest a competition: 'Perhaps you could put together a fantasy XI of place-named sports personalities in an idle moment?

Meantime I wonder how widespread is the use of Laxton as a surname rather than purely as a place name? So I turned to an index of names and found it did not qualify. So it must be quite rare, a little like Chilwell. Does any reader happen to know of a 'Laxton' family with roots back into the Middle Ages?

Following last month's picture feature on the bee swarm in Timothy Road, a second, smaller swarm was seen - and heard - a few days later on the ground beside a trough outside the church.



Stuart Rose, who is our local collector of swarms provided the following information about why swarms happen.

In the spring lots of eggs produce a hive full of young bees. The better the foraging, the higher the numbers. The queen gives off a pheromone which worker bees detect. Overcrowding and a drop in pheromone level signal it is time to swarm. Disease or disturbance can also cause the bees to swarm.

The old queen lays some eggs which turn into males, which are drones. Their only role is to mate with an unfertilised queen.

The bees build some bigger, queen cells. The queen lays eggs in all the cells, and the eggs laid in the queen cells are no different. They turn into queens because they are fed on royal jelly. This is a rich substance which is exclusively fed to developing queens. If more than one queen bee larva matures, the first to hatch will usually kill any others.

The new queen will fly just once, to be mated in flight by a drone from the same hive. This enables her to keep laying eggs throughout her life.

When the old queen is happy that there is a well provided hive with a good stock of food and a new queen developing she will leave in a swarm with all the mature bees. As we showed last month, the swarm can be gathered up and encouraged into an empty hive to continue their lives there.

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


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Group Oil Order

Current Covid Restrictions at 17th July

On 14th June, the delay Step 4 of the Roadmap for four weeks from 21 June to at least 19 July was announced. This resulted from Covid-19 infection rates and hospital admissions on the rise. The Government will review the data in two weeks to see if the risks have reduced.

weddings and civil partnership ceremonies and wedding receptions or civil partnership celebrations, commemorative events following a death such as a wake, stone setting or ash scattering, large events pilots, care home visits, domestic residential visits for children. In Nottinghamshire, as elsewhere in England, there is a rise in Delta variant cases. The variant spreads more quickly, so it remains crucial to do what we can do to prevent the virus from spreading further.

- (e) Resilience store keyholder Mr Roy Hennell (unanimous)

- Apologies for absence: Apologies were accepted from Mr M Hennell. Mr Godson was also absent. Councillors Michael and Pringle had not attended due to Covid 19 restrictions on numbers.
- **Declarations of interest:** The chair declared an interest as a member of the sports field committee in item 11 (Property matters including sports field and Glebe Field and sub-tenancy and associated legal services). <u>There were no other declarations of interest, direct or indirect, in any items of business on the agenda.</u>

Dispensations: None required.

- 10 Minutes public speaking: No public present. Nothing raised.
- Minutes of the parish council meeting held on 23 March 2021: The minutes of the meeting held on 23 March 2021 were agreed as a true record to be signed by the chair at a later date when face to face contact is possible.
- Matters arising: No other matters arising which were not otherwise on the agenda.
- **Reports from district and county councillors:** Mr Pringle's report had been noted at the preceding annual parish meeting.

The chair read Mrs Michael's written report.

Reports from councillors: It was noted that SNG meetings might resume once Covid 19 restrictions were lifted further.

Councillors noted that Laxton Visitor Centre trustees were meeting Mr G Pierrepont of the Thoresby Estate before his presentation to the parish council on 13 July 2021. They also noted that the Thoresby events manager had referred to the possibility of organising a heritage day to mark the new ownership. In this regard, councillors discussed the need for update signage, signage currently referring to the Crown Estate. Councillors will consider at their additional June 2021 meeting the matters to be raised with Mr Pierrepont, Covid 19 risk measures necessitating a swift meeting pending the planned easing of restrictions on 21 June 2021.

Financial Matters:

- a. Financial position as at 30 April 2021: Councillors considered and noted the clerk's report showing the precise financial position at 30 April 2021 (incorporating the 2021-22budget figures).
- b. Accounts for payment: The council unanimously approved eight payments totalling £584.08.
- c. 2021 schedule of fixed assets: The council unanimously approved the schedule valuing fixed assets at £26,990.
- d. To agree the 2020/2021 annual accounts: Agreed.
- e. To certify exemption from limited assurance review under section 9 Local Audit (Smaller Authorities) Regulations 2015: Councillors certified that, as:
 - i. Both the council's annual gross income and expenditure for 2020/21 were less than £25000, and
 - ii. The council had been in existence since before 1 April 2014, and
 - iii. The external auditor had taken no step in relation to 2019/20which precluded exemption and
 - iv. The court had made no declaration under section 28(3) of the Audit and Accountability Act 2014 the council was exempt from a limited assurance review and authorised the clerk and chair to sign the certificate of exemption.
- f. To authorise the chair and the clerk to sign Section 1 (Annual Governance Statement) of the Annual Governance and Accountability Return: The Annual Return was presented incorporating the completed internal

auditor's report. Councillors considered the contents together with the internal auditor's comments. They unanimously **authorised** the chair and clerk to sign Section 1 (Annual governance statement) which they will arrange, socially distantly, councillors' approval having been obtained.

To authorise the chair and the clerk to sign Section 2 (Accounting Statements) of the Annual Governance and Accountability Return Having considered the contents, schedule of fixed assets and variances, councillors unanimously authorised the chair and clerk to sign Section 2 (Accounting Statements)
- h. Review system of internal control and internal audit system effectiveness: Councillors discussed the operation of the system of internal control and agreed that it remained adequate and continued to operate effectively. Councillors also reviewed the effectiveness of the internal audit system and agreed that, taking account of the straightforward nature of the council's transactions this year, it operated effectively on an annual basis.

Barn Owls Nesting in Laxton



These barn owl chicks were photographed in a nest in Laxton recently. One is quite a bit bigger than its siblings which is quite common. It probably hatched out a week earlier than the others.

If the vole population is good, as it seems to be this year, then all three may well fledge (fly away). If food is scarce then the big one eats his brothers and sisters. A brilliant bit of Darwinism so that the survival of the species is ensured.

The adults only produce fertile eggs if the food supply is good, which means that there are plenty of bank voles about.

Laxton farming is ideal for owls as there are a lot of grass margins and sykes,

which the owls like to use for hunting.

There are quite a number of owl boxes in the Parish and so far three boxes have young owls in them. Barn owls, unlike tawny owls, can produce a second brood if food is plentiful.

Adrian Blackburn from Retford will be coming to put identification rings on their legs so that we can trace them in the future. If you do find a dead owl, please have a look at its leg to see if it has been ringed. The ring will have a number on it and it would help to make a careful note of this, or even better, take a photo and let me have a copy.

Barn owls are very vulnerable when hunting in daylight and we have had them taken by Buzzard and Peregrine. Barn owls normally only hunt in daylight when food is scarce. Last year they were seen in various locations in daylight and there was not a single successful nest in the Parish

I reared a young tawny owl when I was at school in Yorkshire. It had fallen out of a nest in a chimney pot and it wasn't possible to get it back to its parents. When Oswald was big enough to fly away I thought that I wouldn't see it again. However it used to come to my whistle in the morning for a feed. I made artificial mice by mixing meat with the bones and fur that one finds in regurgitated owl pellets . They won't survive on meat alone as they need bones and fur to aid their digestion.
