#### Michael Ducksbury Memorial Road Run

A popular local event with both spectators and participants is the Michael Ducksbury Memorial Vintage Tractor Road Run.

This annual event is held in memory of Michael Ducksbury of Tuxford and supports Weston Park Hospital's cancer



ward at Sheffield, where Michael was treated. The event is organised by his family who are invariably represented among the drivers. Villagers from Laxton, Egmanton and the surrounding area take part and it is not unknown for there to be over 100 tractors in the convoy. They set off from Tuxford at 10am following a circular route.

Because of the proximity of the villages, it is common for the route to run through Laxton and Egmanton in one direction or the other, so there is often an opportunity for villagers to come out to support them as they drive through. There is usually someone on at least one of the vehicles or their passenger trailers who is in phone contact, so it is a good idea to look out for people coming out to stand at the roadside.

In 2025 it will take place on Sunday 6th July.



# The Longest Yarn 2 - Britain at War

This is a study in 80 1m long knitted panels on what is was like in Britain between September 3rd 1939 to VE Day on 8th May 1945...

Accompanying this will be 'The Gang' - life-size representatives of all the services that saved

Britain in the hour of need - from a Land Girl to a Spitfire Pilot.



This new exhibition will run from 3rd to 27th September 2025. Timed tickets can now be booked on line. They are free, but you should reserve your spot. The easiest way to get them is to Google the name of the exhibition and follow the link to the Eventbrite page. This should overcome the queueing issues at the previous event.

Please note there will be a small number of tickets set aside each day for walk-ups, but when they're gone they're gone, so it is highly recommended to book your ticket to guarantee entry. A maximum of 6 tickets can be reserved per booking. You are politely requested to only book what you need, as the number of tickets is limited.

### **Laxton History Group**



The May meeting of the Group welcomed Denis Hill, who had come to talk about 'Lord Byron of Newstead Abbey'.

Hearing the name of our Hon. President, Prof. John Beckett, mentioned at the beginning of the meeting, Denis said that he had studied for his masters under John and that he had also worked as a volunteer at Newstead Abbey in the 1980s



Summarising Byron's early years, Denis told us that he was born in London on 22nd January 1788. He had a club foot and would limp for the rest of his life. In 1798 on the death of his Great Uncle, he inherited the title and the estates, which sounded wonderful until he explained that the uncle, had deliberately ruined them. As a result, Byron moved with his mother to

Burgage House in Southwell.

Byron attended Harrow School and Trinity College, Cambridge, gaining a Masters degree in English. He spoke 7 languages, including fluent Greek. Whilst at University he became infatuated with Mary Ann Chaworth, his second cousin, but she rejected him, thus inspiring some of his first poetry.

After university he spent 2 years on a Grand Tour of Europe. His



mother died on the day of his return, but he refused to go to her funeral as she had let his pet bear die whilst he was away.

He set about repairing as much as possible at Newstead Abbey, using the rent paid by tenant farmers to fund it. He was known for throwing parties that lasted several weeks. Guests would party all night, sleep until lunch time, go hunting, and then back to partying all night. Guests were expected to join in the sports which Byron so enjoyed, boxing, cricket, shooting, riding, sword fighting and swimming.

The first book of poems, "Fugitive Pieces", written when he was 18 years old, was considered too racy and had to be rewritten as "Hours of Idleness". When he wrote to the press attacking the critics of this book it shot him to fame. "Child Harold" and "Don Juan", two of his most famous poems, are both based on himself. He is considered one of our greatest romantic poets and his poetry achieved significant recognition and acclaim during his lifetime.

Byron loved women and had an affair with Lady Caroline Lamb, the wife of a future prime Minister. She dubbed him "Mad, bad and dangerous to know".

He later married Anne Isabella Millbank, but was three days late to his wedding! They had a child, Ada Lovelace, who is now considered to be the first computer programmer. After Ada was born the marriage split up and Byron left England.

Byron set up home with Shelley, Mary Shelley, Claire Clairmont and Dr. Polidori at Lake Geneva. Mary Shelley wrote "Frankenstein" at this time and Dr Polidori wrote a vampire story based on Byron. Inevitably Byron began an affair with Claire Clairmont and they had a child, Allegra. Unfortunately, she died aged 5, whilst in the care of nuns.

Byron moved to Italy, settling in Venice, Ravenna and Pisa, 1816 - 1823. His next affair was with Countess Guiccioli, who was married to a man 30 years her senior.

Despite never being in the army, Byron gained more military fame than any of his military ancestors. Britain formed a London-Greek Committee to support the Greek fight for Independence against Turkish rulers. They invited Byron to try to unite the Greek tribes against the Turks. He managed to do this but unfortunately did not live to see the Greeks win and gain their independence.

He died in 1824 of syphilis complicated by pneumonia, aged just 36. He is, however, still remembered with great affection in Greece as their "Deliverer".

Byron's body was brought back to England, but he was not laid to rest in Westminster Abbey on the grounds of "questionable morality". He is buried in his family's tomb in St Mary's church at Hucknall.

The Group traditionally has an outing in July. This year we have decided to join forces with Chop & Chat as there is considerable overlap between the groups. We will be visiting the Horological Museum at Upton. This is probably the last chance many will have to go there to see the vast collection of clocks, because they are selling the building. We are meeting there at 10.30am on July 16th.

#### **News from the Museums of Tuxford**

The Museum of the Horse hosted a tea dance in celebration of V.E Day. Jessica Mary Brett got everyone joining in singing and dancing. It was an exciting experience that Sally hopes to repeat. Look out for the next event on the Museum of the Horse Facebook page.

At the Museum of the Horse you can see tributes to many horses and riders from the racing world and military. There are those that belonged to famous riders as well as



the aristocracy, including horses which served the country in various ways.

The humble pit pony is an important part of history. Records show pit ponies were used from 1750. In 1913 there were 70,000 working underground. They had such a hard life, only coming up from underground for the two week colliery holiday. Records show that the last pony to be used was Tony. He finished his days at the Newcastle cat and dog shelter. He was 40 years old when he died in 2011.

At the Walks of Life Museum we are delighted that people who



used to work at Dosco of Tuxford have sponsored a display in the museum, as this is such an important part of Tuxford history. The display includes memories from Hollybank. The company exported worldwide, producing equipment for such projects as the Mersey

Tunnel. Do come along and see the display and chat with former members who have been sharing their memories.

We were really delighted to be present when Norman Birkitt's hard work was rewarded at the BCVS volunteer award ceremony. His dedication in getting the war memorial restored and work to remember those lost in wars as well supporting the community of Tuxford is inspirational. He won the Heritage Volunteer of the Year award and was astounded to be recognised as Bassetlaw Volunteer of the Year.



Norman has kindly

donated the 'Tranquillity' rose awarded to him to be part of our memorial garden. This will be planted along with a 'Peace' rose when we have a rededication of the war memorial ceremony. The event is yet to be organised.

We recently planted roses in memory of Pauline Pottinger, Shelia Francis and Trevor Cook who all connected with many people and gave such a lot to Tuxford over the years. The photo shows a rose called 'Dorothy' planted to remember our founder Dorothy Harrison. Flowers

bring such joy as do lovely photos. Snappers, a photography group from Beckingham near Gainsborough, visited both museums recently. They have shared with us some lovely images displaying their unique skills. Do come along and have a look.



One of these photos was part of the

talk by Brian Horne on his discovery in conserving and researching objects in our collection. This was fascinating and has left us astounded at the skills of people in the past. We feel the same about Brian's care and attention to detail in giving them a new life, enabling us to tell the story. We hope to carry on this work and show more to our visitors in the future.

#### **Tuxford Museum on Channel 4 Show**

The Museum of the Horse, Tuxford has recently appeared on the second series of Channel 4's programme 'Millionaire Hoarders' in a quest to fundraise for its future. Sally Mitchell, the Museum's owner, curator and founder of Sally Mitchell Fine Arts, was approached by the TV production company about a year ago to get involved in the programme which features Antiques Roadshow expert, Ronnie Archer -Morgan. Filming took place last Summer and Autumn.

The programme aired as part of Episode 2 on Friday 9th May and showed Antiques expert, Ronnie rummaging through Sally's vast equestrian collection to unearth something to sell on the show to raise funds. When Sally revealed a painting by George Stubbs, the renowned 18th century English artist famed for his horse portraits, hidden away in a storeroom for more than 50 years, Ronnie couldn't believe his eyes! The painting depicts a grey cob named Rainbow. It



is recorded in the Catalogue Raisonne and experts at Sotheby's confirmed that Stubbs produced the artwork during his twilight years in 1802-1804. Sally agreed to sell the painting in Sotheby's in Bond Street to help raise funds for the future of the Museum and help finance the renovation of the Museum's new Conference room.

Ronnie Archer-Morgan was extremely moved by the find, commenting: "I've just been handling and talking about a Stubbs. It's been in my hands; it's a wonderful thing - this is why I love my job. Getting the best price for Sally so she can continue her dream. Her dedication to her museum brought me to tears. She's so humble and dismissive of any praise for what she's done, but what she's achieved is monumental."

Sally commented: "It was a very interesting experience being involved in the programme and hearing what Ronnie's expert



opinion was on items like the Japanese saddle which also featured. I am absolutely delighted with the auction result of the Stubbs which is a wonderful start to our fundraising efforts to enable the Museum to continue when I fail to do so. I am eighty this year and sadly none of us live forever!"

"The Museum is the only one of its kind in the UK and the collection is unique; it is the history of all of us, in war, transport, agriculture, the horse powered the world for over 3000 years while the combustion engine has only been around for about 150 years. Hopefully the TV programme will help spread the word and encourage more visitors to the Museum and who knows, maybe some sponsors too."

The Museum is comprised of nine rooms and over 2000 objects. It was created in 2014 and is based in a former Posting House, a coaching inn where the coaches changed their horses, on the side of the old Great North Road.

Sally, the founder of Sally Mitchell Fine Arts, the UK's leading countryside art publishing and gallery business, along with her son, John Mitchell, acquired Tuxford's iconic Newcastle Arms following a long period of dereliction and vandalism. John and Sally spent years bringing the Grade II listed building back to life and moving their existing gallery business to the new larger historic space.

### New Season at Doddington Hall

An exciting new development for this year and on-going is the return of the **Sculpture Exhibition**. Previously this has been on alternate years, but the decision has been made to make it an annual event. This will be the first year when the exhibition will return after just 12 months. As usual there will be plenty of time to see it as it will run from **26th July to 7th September**, and again will include the 'Young Sculptor' Award.



#### Citizens Advice gives advice on Winter Fuel Payments.

In June the government announced a U turn on their decision around winter fuel payments.

The change in criteria will mean approximately 9 million pensioners in the UK will receive the payment. You'll get a payment for winter 2025 to 2026 if:

- you've reached State Pension age
- your income is up to £35,000 a year

If your income is over £35,000 a year, you'll still get the Winter Fuel Payment - but the government will take back the money through your taxes.

The winter field payment is an annual one-off payment to help you pay for heating during the winter.

For winter 2025 to 2026, you'll be eligible if you were born before 22 September 1959.

Your household will get either £200 or £300 - this depends on your age. The money will be paid automatically.

- If you or your partner is under 80 years old, your household will get £200.
- If you or your partner is 80 or over, your household will get £300.
- Each household will only get one payment.

Right now we don't have much more information on how and when the payments will be distributed, we expect more information later on in the year.

# Group Oil Order

The happy news reported last month was that the 1000 litre average price for oil in England published daily by Boilerjuice, has continued to go nicely downwards since we placed our February order,

taking it lower than it has been for three years. It continued to go down reaching a fraction under 50p/litre including VAT on 9th June.

Then trouble worsened in the Middle East and the price went up immediately. On 16th June it had risen to 53.26p / litre. With the warm weather we have had, and in the absence of any messages saying oil is needed, it seems prudent to wait a few weeks to see what happens before thinking about buying.

We normally have a late summer order to stock everyone up before the winter is upon us. It would seem a good idea to delay this until August unless members of the group are needing to buy sooner. Please let me know when you think you will need to order and I will plan with the majority.

The ordering group is simply a way of a number of people placing their order through me at the same time to benefit from a discount. This is given to reflect the simplicity of the process for the supplier and the volume ordered. The more the volume, the better the price, so we encourage people to order with us if they want to.

There is no need to order each time. You just send in your contact details to join the group and then notify your requirements by the date given on each occasion we order if you wish to take part. If you have plenty, or change your mind you simply don't order.

Once the supplier has been chosen, everyone is notified and it is then up to you individually to handle the payment. New members of the group are welcome at any time, and if you are new to the village, please feel free to make yourself known.

The only requirement is that you can notify what you need by email or have someone who can do so on your behalf.

Professor John Beckett has drawn our attention to the following event:


