Letter From Revd Philip

Our April speaker was Wanda Adams who is Charity Secretary for the Police Convoys.

During the Bosnian War the then vicar of Rainworth first organised, with the help of the police, a convoy of 30 lorries of aid to get successfully into the country.

This takes a lot of planning. It is very difficult to get permission for the convoy to enter the country. Local contacts and drivers are essential. The organisation works on the principle of helping local people to help themselves.

In Albania after the war the people had very little. Thanks to the aid convoys they were supplied with redundant fire engines together with uniforms - all from Derbyshire Fire Service. These still have the Derbyshire logo on them!

Schools were repaired, desks supplied that would otherwise have gone to land fill sites, plus paper, pens etc. all donated by local Education Departments.

One of the latest projects in Malawi is teaching locals to sew. One example is converting pillow cases into children's dresses. Aid is now starting to get into Syria.

The organisation is totally voluntary. Only Wanda is a paid member. With having such a well organised network of local contacts, the aid can be got into the country avoiding lots of paperwork and possible corrupt organisations.

Our meeting on 22nd May was our annual outing. This year we are visited the Heritage Museum at Bilsthorpe.

Helipads on hospital premises enable Air Ambulances to land on site, saving patients the delay and discomfort of a transfer by land ambulance from the nearest landing point into the safe hands of doctors awaiting them in the Accident and Emergency departments.

Everyone is warmly welcomed to join in this event and to bring friends or family. If you can't make it (or even if you can) donations of cash or for the cake stall, raffle or tombola would be much appreciated along with simple fund raising ideas suitable for a garden setting. All suggestions welcome to make this a very successful afternoon to help to provide helipads for hospitals.

New Village Signs



The 24th April arrived along with four brand new Laxton village signs ready to be erected. The weather was kind and in a very short space of time 1 and 2 and 3 and 4 were very carefully installed.

We knew what they were to look like but we were surprised how big they looked "in situ". Many comments, complements etc. have been flying around since and many of the comments are that they are one of the best that have been seen in the area! Not too much small detailing, great word style and a very strong visual impact as you drive or walk past. It has also been reported that people are stopping to ask about the meaning of the text 'England's last open field village'.

Lots of people and organisations are due many thanks for their help in getting this long awaited project completed. Firstly, The Crown Estate as we could not have afforded the signs without them funding most of the costs.

Secondly, the Parish Council for organising and overseeing the project progress despite a huge setback during the process when Notts County Council Highways refused planning permission over legal technicalities about wording and fonts. Fortunately common sense prevailed after we made stronger representations!!!

Thirdly to our Parish Council Vice Chairman David Brown for seizing the opportunity to broach the subject with The Crown Estate's latest representative when he was visiting the village on another matter.

Fourthly to everyone in the Parish who, over the years, has donated clothing, shoes etc. into the Police Aid Recycle bin at the Dovecote as the money we get for this has paid for the installation of the signs and will fund the signage that Moorhouse will have.

Fifthly to Martin Lane & Sons for producing such wonderful signs.

AND FINALLY big, big thanks to Jean Hennell who, once we had secured the funding, contacted the suppliers Martin Lane & Sons and started the ball rolling!! Well done Jean.

In case anyone is wondering, the colours used to represent the field strips on the signs were taken from an old Estate map when the designer at Malcolm Lane was deciding how best to show them.

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Laxton Cricket Club Disbanded

We are sorry to have to tell the village that Laxton Cricket Club has been disbanded, as players are on the decline and due to work and family commitments we can no longer field a full side.

The club had its origins back in 1887-88 when the first pitch was laid by the then Earl Manvers and believe that this was in the homestead at New Barn Farm as we know it was there in the 1900's, and then to its present site next to Castle Grounds, although we do not know when it moved.

Over the years the club fielded 2 teams in the Bassetlaw League until the late 1980's and the teams consisted of many village family members including; The Nobles, Sayers and Saxilbys, plus others from surrounding villages. 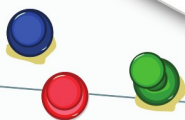

2017 AGM and Tasting Supper

Our successful formula for ensuring a good attendance for our AGM continued with a tasting supper featuring dishes from the period of our HLF study, 1900 - 1920. Recipes later in that period reflected wartime shortages, but overall flavour was not the feature it is today. Our cooks strive for authenticity, but having persuaded people to pay to attend the AGM we do feel they should enjoy it, so on this occasion the addition of herbs and seasonings known to be



available at the time was encouraged where the recipe, as written, was not very exciting.

Top marks for flavour went to Pat's delicious macaroni cheese, which was made by mixing all together and cooking the pasta in the sauce in the oven rather than the more usual modern method of adding sauce to cooked pasta, and to Bridget's potted crab. Both very tasty.

Maybe one year we should opt for 'Through the Ages' and have the best recipes we have found so far?

The serious issue of the evening was the AGM, when John Chambers was re-elected as Chairman and Jo Godson and Joy Allison were reappointed as treasurer and secretary respectively.

Thanks go to John Smith of Egmonton for inspecting the books, which passed with flying colours thanks to Jo's meticulous accounting for both our own funds and the much larger sums involved in the HLF project. This year significant sums had been spent on 'professional fees', which covered graphic design, printing and secondment of teachers.

We have now received reimbursement of £2685 - the final 10% of funds spent to complete our HLF project now it is all successfully signed off.



Michael Wood Award

The children of Class 3 at Kneesall School excelled themselves in this second round of our joint project with them which is funded by Michael Wood's kind donation. They gave a presentation to History Group members and their families on 20th April at the school, when many members of the Group who have no direct connection with the school through current pupils were able to go along and chat to them about their projects.



Their work showed the tremendous interest the children and their families had taken in their research and presentation. How the class teacher will ever be able to sort out which children deserve the three awards is beyond Group members, who are so glad they don't have to make the decision.



There was a wide variety of subjects including a famous clockmaker who was the 6 times great grandfather of a student, Mansfield Brewery, Mansfield Woodhouse, Newark Castle, Newstead Abbey, Southwell, Wellow and places in Kneesall. Closer to home was a project on Blacksmiths Cottage, Laxton, Egmonton Castle and the Stone House in Egmonton and the jail in Tuxford.

This time there were a great selection of models made of everything from Lego through cardboard to cake. Yes, really cake! We didn't ever dream we might see Laxton castle in cake, but we did, although sadly we didn't get to eat it!

Mrs Hodgkinson, Class 3's teacher spoke about how delighted she was with the way the children and their families had responded to the idea and how hard they had worked. During the time devoted to the project in school they had come in and spoken about the places they had visited, the things they had discovered and the help they had received from other people.

One young man had taken part in a video speaking to a lady who told him all about the history of his home, and he was clearly fascinated. A



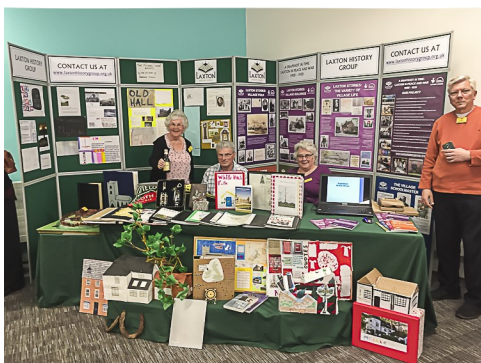
young lady had made a video of her research into Southwell and we also had PowerPoint presentations as well as more traditional books, posters and cleverly designed fold out presentations. All a very far cry from anything members could remember producing in their own school days.

The quote shown here sums up what we had hoped to achieve better than any words from us could have done:

My project isn't finished I've discovered that it takes a lot of digging to uncover early maps and deeds so I'd like to have a go in the future.

Great Nottinghamshire Local History Fair, Sunday 7th May 2017

We once again secured our preferred corner position in the Library in Mansfield to stage our display, and with so much material from Kneesall School we had to make a little space go a long way. With a bit of creative thinking we managed to use an extra table or two and some crates to stage the display and also to feature our new HLF booklets.



It was a very good and well attended event where we were able to talk to a lot of people about our work and the Michael Wood Award. Everyone was impressed with the results and with the positive work we are doing to promote to children the truth that history is an interesting subject to be found all around us and not just in dusty text books.

We did also acquire a dusty text book from the many volumes the Library were selling off. This was a bound collection of reports from the Thoroton Society from 1902 featuring a report of their visit to Laxton, which is often quoted by others writing on the village, including our own authors in the recent works.

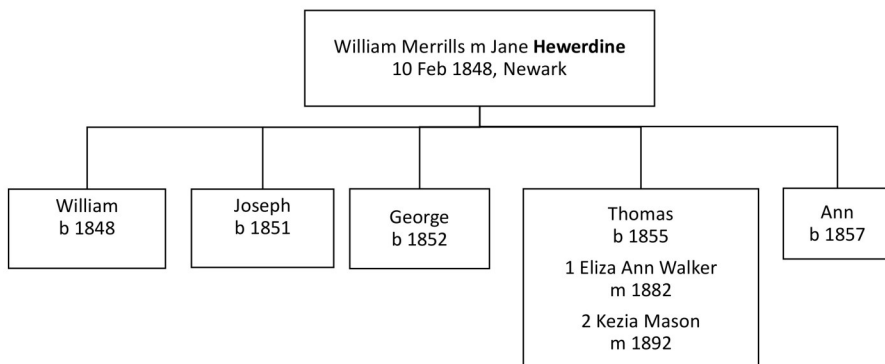
Meetings

We shall next meet in the Village Hall on **19th July at 7.30pm** when Carol Bannister will be speaking about the Archdeaconry Courts. We have heard some snippets in the past about how certain Laxton characters' names appeared in these reports so it should be an interesting evening. All welcome.

The Hewerdines of Laxton - Hewerdine / Merrills Sons

This episode covers William Merrills and Jane neé Hewerdine's second eldest son, Joseph, who also remained living in Laxton.



He was baptised on 17th August 1851 and remained living with his parents, presumably working the farm with his father after his elder brother had married and set up farming himself. Joseph therefore possibly continued as tenant of his parent's farm following his father's death in 1886. He appeared in the 1891 census, still listed next to Frank Willis at the School House, in what is now known as School Farm.

His future bride, Mary Johnson, was born in 1857 and was the granddaughter of Laxton blacksmith Richard Johnson. 'Johnson' is another surname widely found in Newark and the surrounding area. Richard was born on 16th December 1786 and baptised on 27th January 1787 at Marnham, the son of George Johnson, himself a blacksmith, and Martha.

Richard and his wife Sarah already lived in Laxton by 1819 when their daughter, Mary, was baptised. She was followed by John, baptised in April 1821 but later buried in October 1821; Elizabeth, baptised 1827 and buried 1829; John, baptised May 1829, (the future father of Mary who married Joseph Merrills), and George, baptised November 1831.

The 1861 census for 'West St', Laxton on 'ancestry' mistakenly records Mary, aged 4, and her elder sister, Elizabeth, as the children of George. Fortunately the 1871 census, which shows John as blacksmith, makes clear they are his daughters with his wife Elizabeth. Their household includes Thomas Hilton, a 17 year old apprentice. In 1881 Thomas Hilton subsequently appears as husband of Mary's elder sister, Elizabeth, along with his mother-in-law, widowed Elizabeth senior, whilst

Mary is a domestic servant in the household of a retired G.P. at Old Malton, Yorkshire.

By spring 1891, Mary is back in Laxton, living in the household of Thomas Hilton, her widowed blacksmith brother-in-law, with her widowed mother, Elizabeth, next to Mary's uncle, George Johnson. Joseph was about 40 years old when he married Mary on 13th October 1891 at Laxton, but until taking over the farm, was probably unable to support a wife himself. This couple appear to have no surviving offspring. The 1911 census for them included two farm servants sharing a 10 room property, the present-day Ivy House Farm.

Mary died on 18th January 1913 and was buried on 22nd January 1913, aged 56. Joseph died 1st Oct 1929 and was buried on 3rd October 1929, aged 79. The NPC records that probate was granted in London to two men, one of whom was Fred Merrills, who is presumed to be the second son of Joseph's elder brother, William.

Photo Follow Up

Many thanks to Marian Cooper for sending a comprehensive answer to the mystery, posed last month, of who the people in this photo are. Marian says:

The lady is Frances Bennett, neé Foster, the widow of Thomas Bennett. They were my great grandparents. The gentleman seated is Richard Foster and the one standing is Thomas Foster, her brothers. Frances was born at Ragnall, Notts in 1841 and married Thomas Bennett in Laxton in 1865. They had two sons and four daughters - Thomas jnr.,

George (died aged 5 in 1879), my grandmother Mary Charlotte, Annie, Florence and Fanny, all born at Laxton.

Thomas Snr. was born in 1837 at Normbey-on-the-Hill, Lincs. On his marriage certificate he was described as a labourer in Laxton. He later became the tenant of High Street Farm at Laxton until his death in 1918, aged 81. Thomas and Frances have a headstone in the church yard as do three of their daughters.

Thomas' parents George and Elizabeth Bennett died in 1892 and 1896 aged 82 and 84 years respectively. My great, great grandparents were labourers and tenant farmers in the village and share a headstone which includes their 5 year old grandson George (see above).

After Frances was widowed in 1918 she lived with her daughter, Florence at the shop until her death in 1933 aged 92. A Bennett through marriage, I remember her well.'

Marian wonders if they were related to George and Ann Bennett, also farming in Laxton in 1881. Can anyone help?

Action Fraud Warning - Ransomware

Following the ransomware cyber attack on Friday 12 May which affected the NHS, the City of London Police's National Fraud Intelligence Bureau has issued an alert urging both individuals and businesses to follow protection advice immediately.

Ransomware is malicious software which enables cyber criminals to remotely lock files on your computer or mobile device. It is used to extort money from you before they restore access to your files. Ransomware can infect your device in many ways e.g. a link to a malicious website in an unsolicited email, or through a security vulnerability in a piece of software you use.

Key Protect advice

- Install system and application updates on all devices as soon as they become available.
- Install anti-virus software on all devices and keep it updated.
- Create regular backups of your important files to e.g. an external hard drive or memory stick that isn't left connected to your computer as any malware infection could spread to that too.

Only install apps from official app stores, such as Google's Play Store, or Apple's App Store as they offer better levels of protection than some 3rd party stores. Jailbreaking, rooting, or disabling any of the default security features of your device will make it more susceptible to malware infections.

Phishing/smishing - make sure all users of your computer are aware

Fraudsters may exploit this high profile incident and use it against you. People should be cautious if they receive anything unsolicited from the NHS. The protect advice for that is the following:

- An email address can be spoofed. Don't open attachments or click on the links within any unsolicited emails you receive, and never respond to emails that ask for your personal or financial details.
- The sender's name and number in a text message can be spoofed, so even if the message appears to be from an organisation you know of, you should still exercise caution, particularly if the texts are asking you to click on a link or call a number.
- Don't disclose your personal or financial details during a cold call, and remember that the police and banks will never ring you and ask you to verify your PIN, withdraw your cash, or transfer your money to another "safe" account.

Police Charity Cycle Ride

In a ride of a lifetime four Nottinghamshire police officers and a control room operator will embark on a 200 mile bike ride on Saturday 20 May to raise money for Cancer Research UK and are due to land back in Nottinghamshire on Sunday 21 May

PCs Dave Dennis, Rich Naylor, Martyn Barber, and Simon Farndale with Control Room Operator Laura Harmer have collectively raised £8,000 since 2013 for various charities and this will be their latest escapade into endurance cycling.



The ride starts at Robin Hood's Bay in North Yorkshire and winds its way over the North Yorkshire Moors down to the Humber Bridge, through Lincolnshire and finishes at the South Forest Leisure Centre in Edwinstowe.

As well as the five riders tackling the 200 miles, another four riders will join the ride at Collingham and ride the final 50 miles. Tim Wildgust, Mark Spencer, Charlotte Naylor and Sophie Dickinson will take on the half century challenge and bring home the group home in style. Police and Crime Commissioner Paddy Tipping will be popping along to a drinks stop in Collingham on Sunday morning making sure the weary riders are well hydrated for the final push.

The cause is particularly close to the group of riders. Rich Naylor, who is hoping to complete the full 200 mile ride, had an operation to remove some cancerous lymph glands in September 2016. Tim Wildgust, President of the Sherwood Forest Rotary Club and completing the 50 mile ride, is supporting his wife, Karen, following her diagnosis in 2016.

PC Dave Dennis said "We all know someone who has been affected by this terrible illness. Some of the riders have lost close family members to cancer and we need to keep plugging away at it!

"200 miles in 24 hours is not going to be easy but it is going to be worth it! It's a huge challenge for all of us and one that we hope will raise some funds for such a worthy cause.

"Finally, a special thanks to TUXFORD's from Calverton who donated so generously and helped enormously in getting the ride off the ground."

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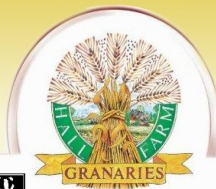

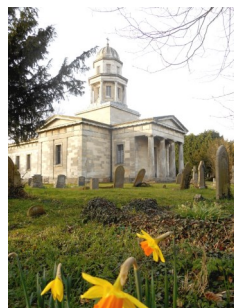
How to protect yourself:
