'IT TOOK SIX WEEKS TO GET THERE'

Did John and Mary Jane Rose sail on the last of the sailing ships? By this time 1870 steam ships were replacing sailing ships which could take anything up to three months to get to their destination in America.

More from Madge Quibell and Fred Sampson:



'They sailed to Montreal and then made their way down to Ottawa in Illinois, USA. They settled first in a shack on a farm in the township of Ohio, Illinois, about 120 miles from Chicago.' An advertisement from that time announcing farms for \$8 an acre perhaps explains why John decided to settle in Illinois and why they prospered.

They had to bury everything very deep to prevent frosting and enable them to survive the very cold winters. One day, John set out to walk to Chicago with a sample of the corn he wanted to sell but had to turn back because of the extreme cold and frostbite to his nose.'

There must be some doubt about this journey - walking in winter, from Ohio to Chicago. But the 1880 USA census shows the family is now in Manhattan, Illinois, about 95 miles from Ohio and 50 miles from Chicago, giving credence to the story of John attempting to walk to Chicago in winter, even when it was said to take at least 14 hours on foot in normal conditions.



'They had no family of their own and adopted the daughter of a neighbour whose wife had died, leaving him with 2 young daughters. Her name was Bertha C. Diantha Rose, Diantha probably being her own surname.'

They not only had with them with their daughter, Bertha, but also their 20 year old nephew, William White, son of John's previous employer in Navenby, Lincs. He must have gone with them aged about 11 or 12 years

'They made £100 profit the first year and a profit for ten years thereafter.' 'Then in in 1883 they had a daughter of their own, Rebecca Reeny.' 'They did so well that when she was about 6 months old John and Mary Jane decided to come home for a holiday and visit parents and family in Laxton.'

And William came too!

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Laxton History Group



This year sees a number of events for our members. In April we held our AGM, which was accompanied as usual by our celebration of historic food. This year we welcomed a good crowd to enjoy dishes from the 1700s.

Having decided on the period, choosing a selection to present in the form of a modern day 3 course buffet proved to be a challenge as the majority of the recipes we found from this country were from the wealthy kitchens. Rather than the cliché 'meat and two veg' it was more like 'meat and six meat' as very little fruit or vegetables seemed to be used.

To modern taste the frequent use of currants, referred to as 'currans', and cinnamon in savoury dishes seemed unusual. The pea soup featured cucumber and



lettuce as well as the more expected onions and mint. Most things were served on or with 'sippets' - most closely related to croutons, but inevitably served soggy if placed under a wet dish, which was how they were served.

The event was very well attended and the food was among the most successful selections we have served at these events. Janet's onion soup was a particular favourite, although both soups received requests for the recipes. We decided not to serve the sippets under the



dishes and



they were not unduly popular. We suspect that served wet under the sauced dishes they would have been even less welcome.

The vegetarians managed a good selection from

their own dishes and the vegetable accompaniments and everyone went back to their seats with full plates, although there were still plenty of volunteers for seconds.

The three desserts were not only each delicious, but also went well together. Baked orange tart was a lovely thing, as was a bread pudding with apples under the bread, which apparently made it 'in the Italian style'. The third option was frumenty, which is essentially a rice pudding, although it can also be made with cracked wheat, which would have been rather different.

With the gathering pleasantly full form the meal we turned to our AGM, where we were pleased to welcome John and Julia Smith from Egmanton as our guests. John is the independent inspector for our books and we are very grateful for his services.

Unfortunately we missed Dick and Marian Cooper, and John Chambers offered condolences on Marian's death as we began. Prof. John Beckett was unable to join us as his wife, Christine, was recovering from surgery and we sent her our best wishes for a speedy recovery.

Following John's report as Chairman, during which he thanked everyone for their work on behalf of the Group, he was re-elected for another year as were Jo Godson as Treasurer and Joy Allison as Secretary. The Steering Group were elected again and business will continue as usual.

To prove the point John announced that we will have a display in Mansfield at the great Nottinghamshire History Fair and Jean Hennell gave details of the arrangements for our 100th meeting on 16th May and the June visit to Ryedale Folk Museum

Crop Prospects in the 1900s

Jo Godson has sent some items of interest to the farmers of Laxton. Thanks to Jo for providing the information, gleaned from her researches at the Retford Library looking in the old copies of the Retford, Gainsborough and Worksop Times.

20th July 1900

Wheat here is very fair on the whole, and the dry weather has improved it, although there are parts in the open field which are not up to the usual mark. Barley is doing pretty well, but oats are very short, and unless there is an improvement, will be below the average. Beans and peas are doing well but it is feared that the former will suffer from filth. Tares are about the average quality. Owing to want of rain the turnips and potatoes have suffered severely; in fact, unless rain comes very soon these crops will be almost a failure. The hay crops are light on most of the farms

28th June 1901

The crops here have suffered much from the want of rain. Wheat is much shorter than usual. Spring corn is poor and there is very little grass. Turnips have had to be sown again, as nearly all the first sowing has proved a failure. Recent showers have made some improvements but there has been no quantity of rain at present.

19th July 1901

The agricultural outlook here is really very serious. The hay crops have probably never been worse than this year. This was shown at the annual sale of the Common grass, which took place on July 2nd, when the prices realised were for the most part the lowest on record. In fact, it was stated then that a considerable portion was hardly worth mowing. Even on well cultivated farms, the state of things is not much better. The quantity produced is only equal to about one third of the average. Clover is a little better than the grass. With regard to the corn, nothing very encouraging can be said. Wheat has certainly improved during the last fortnight and there will be more straw than was expected in June, though of course, the crops are considerably below the average. Barley is very poor indeed, and oats are even worse. Peas are doing well and in all probability will be quite up to the average, whilst beans are almost a complete failure, owing to the filth. Fields which a short time ago looked promising have been quite ruined. The farmers have had a trying time too, with the turnips and most fields have had to be sown twice, but it is still hoped to have a fair crop. The fruit varies very much. In some orchards there is a medium show of apples and plums, whilst in others very little fruit is to be found. On the whole, the present season is one of the most discouraging that the farmers have had to face
