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Laxton History Group has been part of the annual Local History event at Mansfield Library from the beginning ten years ago. This year things had to be scaled down as they moved the displays into the main Library to be in front of more people, but with consequently less space for everyone exhibiting.

May Day at Laxton Castle



It was one of those rare occasions when 1st May falls on the early May Bank Holiday, so it was an ideal opportunity for people who wanted to go and watch

Rattlejag Morris from Retford dancing to welcome the May Day sunrise on top of Laxton Castle. Rattlejag had mustered a good team of dancers as well as their musicians. They also needed some cooks



because bacon cobs were produced from a barbecue accompanied by



beer or hot drinks. There was such a good crowd - around 150 according to one estimate - that they sold out and the dancers were rationed to half a cob each at the end.

The crowd included a good representation from the village, made up of some for whom work commitments make it difficult to attend

regularly; newer villagers for whom it was their first time and visitors. Everyone had a good time despite the rain, which decided to fall at just about the time everyone was making their way up to the castle. Maybe the faint rainbow which appeared behind the dancers was some compensation, but luckily it stopped, allowing the sun to beam



through the clouds at about 6.30am, just as the dancing finished.

There was no shortage of volunteers to join in the public dancing after the Rattlejag dancers showed the way.

Dawn Chorus Walk

Lynda Milner and Chris Gunn, regular attenders who are also skilled at identifying bird song, came to join Stuart Rose to lead the Dawn Chorus walk after the dancing was over. Reinforced with best quality bacon cobs and the lively,



traditional tunes and steps of the Morris dancers, 15 people, including 6 year old Louis in sturdy boots, and his 3 year old sister Lucy on her dad's shoulders, cautiously made the slippery descent from the Castle Hill, eager to follow Stuart along the paths and byways to look out and listen for birds.

By now the sun had burned through the cloud and the birds responded. A skylark ascended beside our path, singing all the way up into the blue and a whitethroat, with

its distinctive song, bounced up from a nearby hedge before descending parachutelike back to its territory.

Fields were alive with more skylarks while overhead 3 buzzards glided and flapped in an elaborate display. On the ground grey partridge and pheasant made an unmusical accompaniment. But it was the hedges and nearby Kirton Wood that provided the cover and song posts for

yellowhammer, blackcap, robin, chiffchaff, wren, bluetit and song thrush. Closer to the village greenfinch, blackbird, dunnock, house sparrow, pied wagtail and chaffinch augmented the chorus with swallows overhead. No cuckoo this time but two had been heard locally in previous days. 24 species were recorded by 9 am. What a start to the Merry Month of May.



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A Moorhouse Departure

Those who pass up and down the road from Moorhouse towards Egmanton and Tuxford will have noticed a large shelter which appeared a while ago. Those passing slowly enough

had a chance to spot James and Kimberly's barge standing inside being prepared for a life on the water. At the end of May it

Laxton History Group



Laxton History Group has uncovered references to celebrations of earlier coronations. During the work undertaken to produce the Lottery funded booklets, we discovered this reference to the arrangements in 1902.

"In 1902 a meeting of parishioners was called in the schoolroom to discuss what might be done to celebrate the forthcoming Coronation of King Edward VII and Queen Alexandra. This was to take place in Westminster Abbey in June, but having been postponed due to the Kina's illness, did not take place until 9th August that year.



It was agreed to make a collection to pay for the celebration and William Bennett, together with Samuel Peatfield from the cottages at Ide Farm willingly offered to canvas house to house. The Newark Herald of 3rd May 1902 reported that the villagers 'contributed liberally' and 20/- [£1] had already been collected."

Since the publication of our booklets, Stuart Rose has discovered the ticket (above) for the Dinner which was held.

Also in the files we discovered this quote about the origins of her enterprise from Florrie Bennett, the popular shopkeeper who ran her business from the building which was still the shop until relatively recently.

'It was King George V's coronation that got me going. There was a big tea for everyone in the village and I got the order for the food. I laid in a good stock of biscuits, cakes and minerals. There was a dance at night and it was so crowded that a lot of people came into my shop for refreshments. The shop, the store room, the living room and the kitchen were all full of people until one o'clock in the morning. This gave me a bit of cash with which to speculate.' In 1953, the celebration took the form of a Coronation Tea, with so many people interested that two sittings were needed. It seems it was the norm to bring your own cutlery. Own crockery and glasses were specified in 1953,

so the idea of bringing your own is certainly not new.

Starting the weekend was The Dovecote Inn Party.

As we all recall, Saturday 6th May broke to overcast skies and rain showers. Despite this, the afternoon and evening of Coronation Day

















was a great success at The Dovecote, where Sam and Sophie Harrison hosted a family fun day which was organised by manager Alice Stanley.

Villagers, families and friends from Laxton, Moorhouse and further afield came together. Children enjoyed the helter-skelter despite the chill in the air, whilst families partook of the delicious hog roast, ice cream barrow and the spoils of the Victoria sandwich cake competition.

The competition certainly produced some delicious looking entries, though maybe the strict definition of 'Victoria Sponge' was stretched a little. Congratulations to Lucy Hamilton, Ben and Arlo who were declared the winners.

Laxton Street Party

On Sunday 7th May it was time for the village street party. It could not have been more different with blue skies and glorious spring sunshine.

Preparation for the event began some weeks ago, and thanks should go to the special 'Coronation Committee' brought together for the purpose: in alphabetical order Joan and Roger Cottee, Rebecca Creighton, Sam Harrison, Mark Hennell, Frankie, Jem and Simon Hill, Graham Laughton, Mike Manning, Anna Moorhouse, Ivan Rayner, Stuart Rose, David and Helen Sheard.

The event was funded by the Parish Council and a grant from the District Council. Staging of the event started very early that morning. Obtaining a road closure is no simple affair, so the wide pavement and verge near the Village Hall (Plan B in case of wet weather) were fenced off using farm fencing with very handy gates.

Just to make sure that any passing motorists realised they should give the area a wide berth, four vintage tractors were parked alongside, giving the whole thing a very Laxton atmosphere. Many thanks to Linda and to Jon for offering use of their drives.

Later on tables, bunting and sound system were set up ready for the guests. Unlike previous Coronations, everyone was invited to bring their own picnic to eat at the long street table.

Some had gone to town with table decorations and crowns; union flags and patriotic hats appeared. Joan Cottee was given the responsibility of judging them for special prizes. The well deserved winners were John Shepherd with his imaginative wooden crown table decoration and Sylvia Rose with her crown. Grandson Ralph came a close second with his crown

Everything was relaxed and informal with plenty of bubbly to toast the



occasion. A jolly time was enjoyed by all. With everyone sated and enjoying the companionship on a sunny afternoon, the younger generation in the form of Helen Sheard and Rebecca Creighton galvanised everyone to tackle a surprisingly competitive game of bingo or two.

Much laughter was heard as chocolate bars were handed out as prizes. The original idea was that they rewarded the first line, but with a bursting bag to distribute and good fun being had, it seemed that any raised hand was rewarded.

A full house earned a bigger reward with boxes of chocolates of bottles or prosecco going to the lucky winners of the three games. Many thanks to the brilliant hosts for their efforts.

Helen also made sure that the afternoon was recorded in photos and took advantage of a tractor to get an elevated viewpoint.

These were gifted to all the village children up to and including 16 years of age and were funded by the Parish Council with a contribution from the Community Coffee Morning.

The Coronation Concert

The National Federation of Young Farmers Clubs were allocated 20 of the 10,000 tickets for seats at the Coronation Concert at Windsor Castle.

Jessica Rose was invited to put her name forward for the ballot for these tickets because this year she is the Chair of the Nottinghamshire Young Farmers Clubs. She was thrilled to be one of the lucky winners.

Another local person who found herself in London, and actually in Westminster Abbey, was Paula Routledge from Floral Media at Caunton. She was rewarded for her volunteering efforts as well as being one of the 'Flowers From the Farm' group of artisan growers of local, seasonal cut flowers whose gift of more than 4,500 blooms decorated the Quire and the Tomb of the Unknown Warrior.

Paula is a gardening expert on BBC Radio Nottingham, making regular broadcasts and answering listeners' questions. In an interview with one of the presenters after the event she said that it was a wonderful occasion, possibly made more friendly and sociable since everyone was invited individually, without their 'plus ones'. 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Laxton & Moorhouse Parish Council: Draft Minutes of the Meeting on 28/3/23

Present: Councillors: S. Hill (chair), R. Hennell, M.Hennell, J.Hill S.Rose, J. Godson

In attendance at parish council meeting;

- C. Wilson (Clerk), S. Michael, M. Pringle, Members of the public (x3)
- 1. **Apologies for absence:** There were no absences.
- 2. Declarations of interest: The chair declared an interest in the sports field and Mr Rose in the village hall. There were no other declarations of interest, direct or indirect, in any items of business on the agenda.
- 3. Dispensations: None required.
- 4. **10 Minutes public speaking:** The following were raised and discussed:
 - a. The safety of Toad Lane corner where a resident had been involved in a road traffic incident. The view was expressed that traffic calming measures in addition to the existing chevrons would be of benefit. Frustration was expressed that NCC Highways/Via had refused the request to bring the 30 mph speed limit out beyond its existing position when the speed limit was extended at the other three entrances to the village. Mr Pringle informed the meeting that a new area manager had been appointed so a fresh approach would be worthwhile. The possibility of a 40 mph limits was discussed. Mr Pringle will raise the relocation of the 30 mph sign with officers.
 - b. Savannah Rags has ceased operations for now although the chair had encouraged the village to continue to leave donations as the bin was no to full as yet.
 - c. The possibility of a Neighbourhood Plan was discussed to manage potential construction in Laxton. The limitations on its effect because such a plan would be subordinate to NSDC's planning policy were noted. It weas also noted that the conservation area had recently been reviewed to address potential construction risks to the locality because of its special importance. The matter to be considered at a future meeting.
- 5. **Thoresby Estate report (if any):** The clerk reported that Mr Pierrepont had advised that currently no one is available to attend meetings. Councillors asked the clerk to request an update on progress with the information boards.

- 6. **Minutes of the Parish Council meetings held on 24 January 2023:** The minutes of the Parish Council meetings held on 24 January 2023 were agreed as a true record and signed by the chair.
- 7. **Matters arising:** There were no matters arising which were not otherwise on the agenda.
- 8. **Reports from district and county councillors:** Mrs Michael reported on the following:
 - a. A kerbside glass collection scheme being introduced elsewhere in the county
 - b. As a result of new government regulations, soft furnishings and bedding must be collected separately at additional cost to residents giving rise to concerns at the potential for an increase in fly tipping
 - c. Enforcement in relation to fly tipping, litter, waste transfer, dog fouling, and fly posting through penalty notices and fly tipping prosecutions.
 - d. Mr Pringle reported on:
 - e. New NCC Highways/Via personnel
 - f. £3.3 million in a designated highways budget
 - g. 30 March 2023 is a devolution vote day

Lamp no. 18 has finally been repaired.

- 9. Reports from councillors: Mr S Hill reported that the:
 - a. last meeting had discussed fly tipping and speeding
 - b. next SNG meeting was on 13 April 2023 and asked councillors to let him know of any incidents or issues to be raised.
 - c. The clerk will report a loose manhole outside 1 & 2 Main Street.
 - d. Councillors noted a serious incident of fly tipping at the bottom of Brockilow Hill which had included asbestos. NSDC had cleared the site as it was on common land. The use of gates was considered but it was recognised that these bring their own issues.
- 10. **Review code of conduct:** Councillors considered the revised code of conduct recommended by NALC and **decided** to adopt the new code with effect from 1 May 2023.
- 11. 2023 election: The chair reminded all present that nominations must be submitted by 4 pm on 4 April 2023. It was noted that there had been some interest in the village. Councillors listened with sadness to the chair's announcement that, after 32 years, he would not be standing again and would cease to be a councillor from 10 May 2023. They thanked him for

all that he had done for the village. Mr Pringle and Mrs Michael echoed their sentiments.

- Annual Parish Meeting 2023 Arrangements: Councillors 12. discussed the statutory timing constraints in an election year and decided to hold the:
 - a. Parish Council annual meeting at 6.30 pm on Tuesday 9 May 2023
 - b. Annual Parish Meeting at 7.30 pm on Tuesday 9 May 2023 both in the village hall. The clerk will invite Notts Bus representatives, the NCC Local Area Co-ordinator, Mr Pierrepont and NCC Highways/ Via officers to attend.
- Property matters including sports field and Glebe Field matters (if 13. any): Councillors noted that trees had been planted up the side of the footpath. The Glebe field quicks damaged by the summer's unseasonable hot weather are to be replaced by a local resident volunteer. Councillors expressed their thanks.

Activities resume shortly at the sports field. The dog bin will be fitted.

- 14. Planning matters:
 - a. Applications: None
 - b. To note planning decisions by NSDC: None
 - c. Compliance: No matters raised
- Defibrillator inspection report: Mr J Hill confirmed that the 15. defibrillator had been inspected and there were no issues save that the new set of pads were awaited.
- 16. Archive of parish records: Councillors noted the outcome of the clerk's enquiries of NCC. The clerk will invite the office to visit to determine which records were of value and should be held in the NCC archive.

Village environment and appearance, including Bar Farmhouse: 17.

- a. Community network group: Councillors noted that the chair's publicity had not generated many volunteers. They also noted that the fire service had offered to undertake a village safety check visiting the homes of more isolated residents. The resident who had raised this possibility will be able to speak to the village at annual parish meeting.
- b. Bar Farmhouse: Mrs Michael reported that the work necessary to satisfy the notice had been completed. NSDC is aware that the doors and windows are in poor repair and is looking into the issue. NSDC is also concerned about the interior. She noted a report of issues at the rear which are not visible from the road. She will notify the officer.
- c. Parish roads and pavements: NCC Highways/Via officers being invited to the annual parish meeting (LMPC/146/23) above.
- d. Bench for Moorhouse: Mr S Hill reported that he had researched benches and consulted Moorhouse residents. A wood effect bench

was the favoured option and he had looked at a couple of designs with the preferred design being one called Wirksworth at a cost of $\pounds 650$ including VAT. Councillors looked at the model on line and **agreed** with the choice.

e. 2022 Coronation Committee – Event arrangements: Councillors noted the muted interest in the village compared with previous events. The Dovecote is holding an event on Saturday 6 May 2023. It was noted that a litter pick had been organised for Monday 8 May 2023 for which refreshments would be required. The parish council considered and approved the arrangements. Mr S Hill will approve the risk assessment on the parish council's behalf and Mr Rose and Mr J Hill will support with the briefing and collecting the rubbish.

There was discussion of the possibility of a street party. Councillors **decided** to support a street part on Sunday 7 May 2023 with a road closure between 9 am and 5 pm. The clerk will make the application. Mr S Hill will approve the risk assessment for the party on the parish council's behalf.

The clerk will apply to Mr Pringle for a $\pounds 200$ donation towards the street party. A grant would also be available in the sum of $\pounds 150$ for the litter pick refreshment costs. The clerk will apply.

- f. **NottsBus On Demand:** NCC officers being invited to the annual parish meeting (LMPC/146/23) above. The chair reported that a combined system of on demand and timetabled buses had been requested.
- g. **2023-24 dog bin contract:** Councillors considered and **approved** the contract. Mr J Hill will let the clerk know when the new bin has been installed. She will then inform NSDC.
- 18. **Financial position as at 28 February 2023:** Councillors considered and noted the clerk's report showing the precise financial position at 28 February 2023 (incorporating the 2022-23 budget figures). The chair verified the stated balances against bank statements
 - **a.** Donation to flower festival: Councillors approved a donation in the sum of £50.
 - **b.** Accounts for payment: Councillors unanimously approved ten payments totalling £989.42 together with advance approval of expenditure up to £650 on the bench to enable the clerk to place the order once confirmed by Mr S Hill.
 - **c.** The need for a new signatory following the chair's announcement was noted.

- d. Community Infrastructure Levy £1,178.89 Proposals for use: Councillors will continue to consider how the funds might appropriately be applied.
- e. Lady Rozelle donation: The chair confirmed that a grant had been made to fund additional Christmas lights.
- <u>f.</u> Change of banking provider: Councillors discussed the market and issues with ID procedures and **agreed** that there appeared to be little viable alternative to the current provider.

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- 21. 5 minutes public speaking time: Concern at the infrequency of postal deliveries was raised. Delivery dates will be shared with the clerk by way of evidence to take up with Royal Mail.
