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Letter From Revd. Phil

Going backwards to move forwards.

How often do you wish you were somewhere else? How often do you wish you were someone else?

I imagine for most of us the answer depends on the time of year, the work we do, the place we live and the quality of relationships we are in. It is hard to be content, and our media doesn't help.

At its most gentle, even daytime TV plays into our deep-set dissatisfactions with programmes like 'A Place in the Sun: Home or Away'. At its more uncomfortable, our discontents are hooked by ideas embodied in 'Keeping up with the Kardashians' or yet another round of self-loathing as we attempt to re-gain – if we ever had – our beach-body.

The answer we are given for our longings is to have more, to be somewhere else, or to be someone else.

Yet the media's answers to our longings are like trying to drive to our destination in reverse: slow at best, dangerous at worst, frustrating all the time, and just not what we are built for.

The season of Lent suggests a different approach, one that by some quirk of the divine indicates that reversing in the right direction is the way to the destination.

Lent starts with the ancient ceremony of "Ashing", where people have their foreheads crossed with the ashes of last year's Palm Crosses and are told "Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return. Turn away from sin and be faithful to Christ".

It is then followed by 40 days of "fasting" – of giving up; and is capped off by the Easter celebration, which is the time Christians remember the death and raising-to-life of Jesus.

The "sin" mentioned in the ashing ceremony is a funny word, and worth thinking about. It's not quite the same as "evil" (we know what that looks like). Sin is more like me doing archery – I try and point in the right direction, but the arrows rarely hit the bullseye, and often fall short.

Lent and Easter invite us to aim at a different target and to give up our small ambitions. Its message is that to get there we have to reverse, to give up, and to point in a new direction.

Doing that, just maybe we will come home to who we were always meant to be.

If that's not arriving, I don't know what is.

Dear Catherine

Further to my last update with regard to the sale of the Laxton Estate we invited interested parties to submit formal "Expressions of Interest" by 20th December. We were very encouraged by the number of Eol's received and these are currently being reviewed.

It is the intention now to move forward and ask those interested parties for formal financial bids and more detailed proposals in terms of how they will look to preserve the Open Field System and Court Leet.

Once this information has been received, a short-listing process will take place followed by interviews which will be hosted by The Crown Estate.

Following the interviews it is likely that final bids will be requested. I can confirm that we have also updated DEFRA on progress to date.

Laxton History Group



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The 50th meeting of Laxton History Group coincided with a presentation the TV presenter, Michael Wood, was giving on behalf of the Thoroton Society in Newark Town Hall. He generously donated his fee to us to do something worthwhile to promote history.

Some discussion later the Michael Wood Award was born. We made a link with Kneesall School where most Laxton children go and have historically gone since the closure of the school here. They welcomed our suggestion that they became our pilot school to run a scheme to encourage the children in their top class to research an historical subject of their own choosing and to produce a piece of work in any form to show what they had learned. They were actively encouraged to enlist the help of parents, grandparents, friends, neighbours and others to gather as much first hand knowledge as possible and to test the evidence they gathered to verify it as much as possible.

The school devoted some class time to the project and children worked on it at home in homework time, and from the evidence we saw, in their free time as well. The quality of the work presented to us when we went to the school to see what they had done was astonishing. Everyone received a small prize and three were selected by the school to receive the main Award for effort.

The project was deemed a great success by all concerned and, as there are two age groups in Kneesall's top class, two years later the project was repeated. Last year we extended the scope and worked with Norwell and Normanton Schools which operate under one Head Teacher.

This year it is Kneesall's turn once again and on a bright and sunny, if somewhat chilly, 11th February 31 young people and their teachers gathered in Laxton Visitor Centre to launch this round of the Award.



There was good

representation from the History Group to welcome them and to chat with them during the afternoon. Roger Cottee explained that the idea was for them to become detectives - to discover what they could by looking at the buildings and landscape in the village to read what it told them.

They began by completing a short questionnaire in the Visitor Centre, researching from the displays there then set off across the road to look at Cross Hill and the Victoria Jubilee tree.

The walk continued along High Street, round the yards at Blacksmith's Cottage and Ivy House Farm, the former shop and school and the church down to Corner Farm.

It was interesting for those of us for whom school days are a distant memory to see how the children's minds worked as Roger asked leading questions to get them thinking about what they saw. It was also





encouraging to see the enthusiasm with which they responded and equally encouraging to see the enjoyment the teachers got from the experience.

The funds originally donated by Michael Wood and now supplemented by the History Group not only provide the prizes for

the children, but pay for the coach to get them here which would otherwise be a considerable strain on tight school finances. So at the end of their afternoon in Laxton the children climbed aboard to return to school and to begin this year's projects. We look forward to seeing what they discover and to visiting them in April to see their work.

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Laxton WI



Our February meeting began well with another big birthday presentation of flowers to Mavis "special" birthday. Judy has decided to take a rest from committee duties and Joyce will take over the Register and the Competition, which will now be scored 1st - 6 points, 2nd - 4 points, 3rd - 2 points, all others 1 point.

Anna reported on the Bingo night she attended and Brenda told that 4 members would attend the Spring Council Meeting on 3rd April with speaker Jonathon Moseley. The Denman Dip will be drawn there. Members should put £1 in a named envelope by the next meeting to take part.

Lesley has sent her poem for the Canada Cup to County for judging. Brenda read out the national winning entry for the Lady Denman Cup, for which Jackie had written our entry.

Our Newark Show entry on the theme Alice in Wonderland is coming on well. Lesley had produced a backdrop and found a very unusual teapot. 4 members will have a go at the individual lemon drizzle cake competition. We have applied for tickets to 'Triple Target' (Archery, slingshot, air pistol) and a new course in embroidered pictures.

Our own party will now be on Friday 5th April at Egmanton Village Hall, cost £16, and a menu choice was circulated. Sandra has booked he entertainment.

Brenda then welcomed back Stephen John, who had previously given us a wonderful talk on masks. This time his subject was 'The Fundamentals of Puppets'.

Stephen said that Hollywood had cast puppets as horrific, which was certainly not the case. Different materials are important in puppet making both in texture and noise. He demonstrated the noise black plastic bags made being pulled through the air and told us a moving story of their use in therapy dealing with demons after the Indonesian tsunami. People expressed



their feelings by hitting bags representing the tsunami with sticks. Stephen emphasised how important imagination is and that the skill of the puppeteer is to disappear so the audience only really see the puppet. Colour creates atmosphere i.e. sad, angry or retiring and showed us this simply using a linen rag folded in a face-like knot. Finger puppets tell a story, and are particularly useful for children. He said that he teaches people to use puppets starting with a rag doll "grounded" e.g. on a table. A sense of "breathing" is important to start to believe in it. Almost anything he said can become a puppet, which he demonstrated. Even with a couple of dusters you can tell a story that is believable and that people can use their imagination watching. English puppetry has existed for centuries. We saw a lovely set of Punch & Judy puppets though Punch himself originated in Italy. Stephen gave us a wonderful demonstration of shadow puppets with many different characters. He said at home a sheet across a doorway could be used as a screen. Stephen started teaching children to make shadow puppets but finds that these days children were less adept at using their hands with scissors etc.,

which was interesting.

His "Tall Lady" has a wonderful headpiece which Stephen put on and some enormous wooden hands. He told us a very moving story of how these hands had let him make a connection with an autistic child and when, after several sessions, he introduced a dance teacher with him, the child was up dancing.

Stephen talked about very large puppets i.e. larger than the village hall. These can develop people's engineering skills and he referred to a well known French group. Many puppeteers are needed to manage these puppets.



Stephen produced a character well known to some of the audience -



Muffin the Mule - who was very old and made of metal. He showed a Mexican version of Little Red Riding Hood called the Maid of Mariposa whose body was a lemonade bottle with a polystyrene head and wooden spoons for arms.

To end his talk, Stephen produced a wonderful puppet dog, which he had moving amongst the audience. This had been the star of the Nottingham Puppet Festival and entranced us all.

Brenda thanked Stephen for a wonderful evening. He then judged the competition and awarded first place to Lesley with a great

display of finger puppets and Anna second place with "Basil Brush". The speaker at the next meeting on 14th March will be Jan Garside with 'Textile Art'. The competition will be for a home made craft item.

Lonely Hearts Romance Fraudster Alert

If you use online dating sites beware the other person may be using a fake ID. They may use the site to gain your trust and ask you for money or enough personal information to steal your identity. A former dating fraudster explained how they would create fake accounts on social media so that their details matched and could be searched. By appearing real their fake persona

prospective partners could corroborate it by searching their background and believe them to be genuine. The fraudster said:

"People like to say it won't happen to me. I make sure all my conversations are bespoke. I will show insecurity myself about trusting people and this helps allude to them that I'm genuine. I use various online directories to find out about the person. Once I have enough, I use it to milk everything I can using their details or sell them on to other fraudsters via the dark web". The fraudster suggested

"Ask them to send you another photo of themselves with their thumbs up or waving. It's hard to do if it's not an original picture" Always be Wary and don't reveal too much personal information on these sites.

Bread and butter or bread and jam. Not both. Or bread and dripping! Or




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bread pudding. I still like them.



Laxton & Moorhouse Parish Council Minutes of the Meeting held 22/1/19

NB the Minutes which appear here are in draft and have not been seen or approved by the Councillors at the time of printing.

- 1. **Apologies for absence:** Apologies for absence were received and accepted from Mr M Hennell and Mr Brown.
- Declarations of interest: The chair declared an interest as a member of the sports field committee in item 10 (Property matters – Sports field) and an interest as member of the village hall committee in item 13 a (Village environment – Village hall refurbishment project).

There were no other declarations of interest, direct or indirect, in any items of business on the agenda

- 3. Dispensations: None required.
- 4. **10 Minutes public speaking:** No public present. Reports to councillors of dog mess in the churchyard and Chapel Lane vicinity were noted. Councillors **agreed** to discuss the matter under item 13 (Village environment).
- 5. **Minutes of the parish council meeting held on 27 November 2018:** The minutes of the meeting held on 27 November 2018 were agreed as a true record and signed by the chair.
- 6. Matters arising: *LMPC/103/18 Public speaking* Councillor Michael reported that the NSDC officer needed access to the property adjoining Bar Farmhouse to be able to assess its condition. She will contact the adjoining landowner.

All other action points having been completed, being in hand or appearing elsewhere on the agenda, there were no matters arising

- 7. **Reports from district and county councillors:** Councillor Pringle:
 - a. Reported that the 50 mph speed limit on A616 was being effected. He will make enquiries regarding the siting of the 30 mph speed limit signs in Laxton first raised by the clerk with NCC in January 2018.
 - b. Expressed concern regarding the appropriateness of NCC as a landowner of the Laxton estate.
 - c. Reported that £18.6m was being made available to improve the six junctions on A614 between Ollerton and Lowdham. Mrs Michael reported that:
 - i) NSDC's fiftieth council house had been built.
 - ii) A £2.1m care facility is to be built in Ollerton
 - iii) The unitary council proposal had been suspended for the time being.
- 8. Reports from councillors: Mr Hill reported on the matters discussed at the recent SNG meeting which included a spate of rural burglaries in the surrounding area. Property owners were reminded of the importance of securing their premises and buildings. It was also noted that diesel was being stolen from lorries parked on A1 in the course of which the bordering land is being damage. It was noted that landowners are taking steps to reinforce the boundaries with the road.

An incident of fly tipping at the entrance to the sewage works on Moorhouse Road. The clerk will report the matter to NSDC.

Councillors discussed the issue of crime and local policing strategy. They **decided** that the new police inspector, Heather Sutton, should be invited to the March 2019 meeting

Councillors unanimously decided to retain the precept at £4600.
- d. **2019-20 insurance arrangements:** Councillors reviewed the renewal documentation. Councillors **decided** to enter into the 2019-20 insurance contract with Zurich
- 10) Property matters including sports field: Nothing to report.
- 11) Planning matters:
 - a. Applications: None
 - b. To note planning decisions by NSDC: None.
 - c. Compliance: No issues raised
- 12) Village development including The Crown's long term strategy: Councillors noted the contents of the Crown Estate's update dated 17 January 2019, in particular that:
 - a. An encouraging number of Expressions of Interest had been received
 - b. Interested parties will be asked to submit formal financial bids and more detailed proposals in terms of how they will look to preserve the Open Field System and Court Leet.
 - c. Once this information has been received, a short-listing process will take place followed by interviews which will be hosted by The Crown Estate.
 - d. Following the interviews it is likely that final bids will be requested.
 - **e.** It was confirmed that tenants had also received update letters from the Crown Estate.
- 13) Village environment and appearance, including:

- a. Village Hall refurbishment project: The chair reported that the Lottery Fund had approved the revised plans. A contractor is due to commence the revised works within the next two weeks which should be completed within five months.
- b. Moorhouse Village fingerpost including LIS funding application: Councillors noted the contents of Mr Keeling of NCC's email dated 21 January 2019. Mr Hill confirmed his understanding from his discussions with Mr Keeling that, in view of the traditional design of the fingerpost, unlike a village entrance sign, no consents are required and the only outstanding matter is the siting of the brown cycle way signs. In that regard, it has been decided to leave the current post where it is with the brown signs remaining to avoid spoiling the traditional appearance of the new post with modern metal signs. .
- c. Permissive access Land surrounding cricket pitch: No developments.
- **d.** Fibre broadband for Moorhouse: Mr Pringle reported that he is pressing for Moorhouse to be included in a £1m bid for funding to upgrade non-fibre areas.

Councillors referred to their discussions at LMPC/121/19 above (Public speaking). They **agreed** that, in the interests of the village environment, a new dog bin should be installed at the west end of the twitchell at the churchyard. The clerk will place an order.

- 14) Service faults including landline telephone service and issues: The clerk will report that the drain outside phone box on High Street is sunken and not clearing properly.
- 15) Correspondence: Item b Newark Community First Aid First aid training – The clerk will accept the offer of training but deferred to autumn 2019 when the village hall will be open again. All other items of correspondence noted.
- 16) **10 Minutes public speaking time:** The May 2019 elections were noted. The clerk will produce an explanatory note for the March 2019 meeting. Elections to be an agenda item for the March meeting.
