At the end of last year we shared the news that Jessica Rose of Laxton had reached the final five in the selection process for the National Federation of Young Farmers' Clubs' Heart of YFC Achiever Award.

Recently Jessica and her family attended the awards ceremony at the NEC along with more than 400 others.

NFYFC presents the annual Achiever Awards to recognise the achievements of members during the previous membership year in a number of categories.

To her delight, and that of all her many supporters, Jessica was announced as the winner for her dedication to developing rural young people involved in Young Farmers' Clubs.

Jessica's nomination was based on her support for the young people in-

volved in her club as well as her tireless efforts in organising county-wide events such as the County Show, participation in Southwell Ploughing Match, the Christmas tractor run and for her work on county and national YFC committees. She is the current Chair of Nottinghamshire YFC and has been on BBC Radio Nottingham a number of times in recent times promoting their events.

After the event, Jessica said "It is the greatest honour to win this award. Something I only dreamt of winning is now somehow my reality. Mill Field has always been the largest of the open fields at Lavton. In 1655, the field contained 833 acres, 24 acres of which were strips of common grazing called sykes. Most of the rest was divided into 778 arable strips. Today, the open field area is 196 acres, divided into

Mill Field takes its name from one of the windmills of Laxton, which stood here until 1916 when the was blown down in a gale and not restored. Today, its site is marked by a stand of trees behind you. A second windmill is shown on Mark. Pierce's map of 1635, standing in South Field. There are also two more earthwork mounds, one in the former East Field and one beside Eel Lane, which look very like the mounds used to support a post mill.

Under an open field system, rotation of crops is used to rest each field in turm. Here at Laxton, a simple three-course rotation is followed. In any year, one field is under a whiter-sown wheat crop, the second has a spring-sown crop, such as barley, and the third field is fallow. The fallow field used to be grazed, so it could be manured by the sheep feeding on the weeds and grass. Now it is used to encourage groundnesting birds, and sheep grazing is restricted to certain parts of the open fields and sykes.

In the spring-sown field, farmers have a choice over what crop to grow on their own strips. This is the field where you may be able to see the differences between neighbouring strips, if you are here at the right time. Also look out for the wooden stakes indicating the boundaries between strips.

PASTURE AND GRAZING

The need for animal feed was a vital part of the open field farming system. As the area of land being used for arable crops increased, there was less and less common and waste land left for grazing. But animals were essential for meat, mills and wool, for pulling ploughs and also for their manure to fertilise the fields.

Strict grazing rules were needed to make the best use of the land. Sowing and horvesting of crops were synchronised so that animals could be safely left in to graze on stubble and the fallow field. There were also rules for the use of the sykes, and how many animals a farmer could have on the commons.










Along the valley floor are nine fishponds. They were made by digging out earth from the hillside and then banking it up on the stream side and at each end. Some banks were stone-faced for extra strength.

To keep the water fresh, and to prevent flooding and erosion, a gentle flow of water through the ponds was maintained by using sluice gates. You can see where the sluice gate used to be in the stonework at the end of pond 7.

Using these gates, each pond could be isolated from the others. Separate ponds could be used to store different ages or types of fish. Bream, pike, perch, tench and eels are likely to have been kept in these ponds (carp were introduced in the mid-15th century). The ponds could also be emptied of water and cleaned out.

There are many fishpond earthworks across Notthighamshire. The keeping of fish was very important for medieval people as a useful source of food, and also because no meat could be eaten on Fidays (Because the Crucifixion took place on a Fridays) or on other fast days, but fish was allowed. Fishponds were status symbol because they were expensive to create, and the fish were highly valuable. The ponds also came to be valued as ornamental features in their own right.

These ponds probably belonged to the Lexington family. A new manor was made for them some time before 132, and it is thought that the manor house stood between here and the church, on land still known as Hall Grounds or Hall Orchard. There is another set of fishponds to the north of the castle, associated with the manor there.

Southwell Treasure Voted No.1

Recently senior clergy at Church of England Cathedrals all across England and six in Wales identified their own 'Treasures' in a competition organised by the Association of English Cathedrals (AEC). From these a list of the nation's top 50 was compiled. To add to the anticipation of the final vote an entry was announced daily for 50 days during Advent.



The treasures on the list date from Ripon Cathedral's crypt of St Wilfrid, dating from 672AD to the Newport Cathedral Rood, a modern work of art installed in 2020.



Our local entry was 'The Leaves of Southwell', the intricate natural carvings in the Chapter House at the Minster. The carvings date from the 1290s and depict plants animals, birds and green men. They are regarded as the best example of 13th century naturalistic carving in the United Kingdom and are globally important. The craftsmanship is truly

something to behold and there are all manner of creatures, both real

and mythical to be found hidden among the leaves.

It was a very modern competition, with the entries shared across the AEC's social media platforms and ten treasures made it to the final – determined by the number of likes, shares, and engagements throughout the campaign.



Last month this top 10 was announced and people were invited to vote for their favourite. It has just

been announced that the top three are all in our broader region, with the outright winner being The Leaves of Southwell.

Our winning local entry obtained over a fifth of the 4,477 votes cast.



Second was the Nave Ceiling of Peterborough Cathedral followed in third place by the Bakewell Screen in Derby Cathedral.



If you've never been to visit 'The Leaves', there's never been a better time! Recent conservation works. as

part of a Heritage Fund UK project, have been completed to help preserve these incredible treasures of our past, and a new cantilever lift has been installed to make them fully accessible to all.

For anyone who would like to know more a book is available describing all the entries.

Using Old Stamps - New End Date

The familiar stamps issued by Royal Mail are being replaced by bar coded equivalents. Royal Mail had widely advertised 31st January as the final date for using up your old stamps, but this has now been extended to **July 31st**. Non bar-coded stamps issued as Christmas specials or other pictorial commemorative stamps continue to be valid and need not be swapped.

'Eligible stamps', which must be swapped, are defined as the regular 1st and 2nd class stamps featuring the profile of the Queen and those similar style stamps that show any other value. Any commemorative pictorial stamps, such as those issued for previous Christmases or special events, remain valid for postage and do not need to be swapped out.

There is a form available which simply asks for your name and address plus the number of stamps you want to swap. This has to be completed in capital letters and placed in an envelope with the stamps you want to swap.

Self adhesive stamps must be stuck to their original paper backing or book and any which are not self adhesive need to be stuck to a **sheet of paper. The envelope should them be sent to** 'Freepost SWAP OUT' by **31st July.**

The above instructions apply to a combined stamp value of under £200. For stamps of a combined value of over £200, see **royalmail.com/barcodedstamps** for more information.

Photo ID Now Needed to Vote

On Thursday 4 May 2023, local elections are taking place across England. **To vote at a polling station, you will need to bring photo ID.**



Voter ID requirement

From 4 May 2023, voters in England will need to show photo ID to vote at polling stations in some elections.

This will apply to:

- Local elections
- Police and Crime Commissioner elections
- UK parliamentary by-elections
- Recall petitions

From October 2023 it will also apply to UK General elections.

If you don't have accepted photo ID, you can apply for a free voter ID document, which is known as a Voter Authority Certificate.

Register to vote

If you have not already done so, you need to register in order to be able to vote. All you need to register to vote is 5 minutes and your National Insurance number. The deadline to register to vote in the elections in England on 4 May 2023 is 11:59pm on Monday 17 April.

Accepted forms of photo ID

You can use any of the following accepted forms of photo ID when voting at a polling station.

- Passport
- Driving licence, including a provisional driving licence
- A Blue Badge
- Older Person's or Disabled Person's Bus Pass
- Registered Blind SmartPass
- Identity card with the PASS mark (Proof of Age Standards Scheme hologram)
- Voter Authority Certificate
- Anonymous Elector's Document

You will only need to show one form of photo ID. It needs to be the original version and not a photocopy.

If you don't have an accepted form of photo ID

You can apply for a free voter ID document, known as a Voter Authority Certificate, if:

- you don't have an accepted form of photo ID
- you're not sure whether your photo ID still looks like you
- you're worried about using an existing form of ID for any other reason, such as the use of a gender marker

You need to register to vote before applying for a Voter Authority Certificate.

- Out of date photo ID can still be used as photo ID if it's out of date, as long as it looks like you.
- The name on your ID should be the same name you used to register to vote.

If you're registered to vote anonymously and want to vote in person, you'll need to apply for an Anonymous Elector's Document. More information on this is available on the web site

www.electoralcommission.org.uk/voterID

You can vote in the following ways:

In person

This will be no different to the process in previous elections, except that in addition to asking for your name to check that you are on the electoral register, you will be asked for your ID. The officer will check that it's accepted, and that it looks like you. A private area will be available should you choose to have your photo ID viewed in private. This might be a separate room, or an area separated by a privacy screen, depending on the polling station.

Applying to vote by post

If you will be unable to get to the polling station, you can vote by post by downloading and completing the application form. This process will verify you are eligible before issuing your ballot pack.

Applying to vote by proxy

Your alternative way to vote if you can't get to the polling station is to ask a trusted person to vote on your behalf and to complete an application form for a proxy vote. In this case your proxy will go to the polling station for you and vote as you wish on your behalf. Your proxy will need to show their own ID.
