
In June we paid for the commemorative coins gifted to the children of the parish as part of the Coronation celebrations.

As a group we had an amazing visit to Tuxford fire station, where the crew were welcoming and gave an in depth tour around the station.

In mid February we had a visit from a lady named Sue, who came in to talk to us about the 7<sup>th</sup> Heaven Hedgehog Rescue charity. She runs this from her own back garden with the help of volunteers. She has been looking after



hedgehogs for thirteen years, and full time for the last five.

Her patients come from local places and as far afield as Chesterfield, Doncaster, Newark and Nottingham. She said that garden strimmers




are one of the most dangerous things for hedgehogs and she asks people to be careful when they are using them.

Mothering Sunday is almost upon us. One definition of a mother is a selfless loving human who must sacrifice many of their wants and needs, putting those of their children first to equip them with the

knowledge, skills and abilities to make it as a complete human being.

On Mothering Sunday those in service were given a rare day off and travelled back to visit their church and their mothers.



They gathered flowers along the way. The 'Walks of Life Museum' loves seeing the first flowers.



Snowdrops are pushing through, showing us spring is arriving. In Greek mythology the goddess Persephone was forced by her Uncle Hades to inhabit the underworld in autumn and winter. Upon returning to Earth each spring she brought snowdrops.

In the 15<sup>th</sup> to 17<sup>th</sup> centuries, ladies wore white drop shaped earrings known as eardrops. This brings to mind one of the most loved and famous mothers. Princess Diana. She was close to the people and one forgets that she came from a very regal family. The state coachman's uniform from her home, Althorpe, and the crested horse rugs that their carriage horses would have used can be seen at the Museum of the Horse.

The skill that goes into making such things is relevant today, often

originating for practical reasons. In the 15<sup>th</sup> century smocking originated in England as a practical method of expanding and contracting material

Originally a garment for labourers, smocking became a luxury fashion. Even today mothers dress their children in the finest smocked garments on special occasions. The Walks of Life Museum has prams and fine children's outfits. Learning skills from the past can improve our future.

From March we will start running traditional building skills days. They will include using the knowledge of traditional building skills such as lime plastering and repointing to preserving the history of the house at the museum; dealing with issues such as damp and improving the energy efficiency. 

### **Southwell Minster in 2024**



### Southwell Minster celebrates 140 years of being a Cathedral.

2024 is a big year for Southwell Minster. It has been a Cathedral for 140 years and is celebrating this with a special exhibition. The exhibition will explore the story of the Minster and how it became the Cathedral for Nottingham and Nottinghamshire, from the pre-Minster foundations to the present day.

The Cathedral 140 Exhibition will explore 140 objects over 10 months, from February to November 2024. Each object will reveal a unique part of the story and the history of the Cathedral, Gardens and Palace

The objects for February focused on the foundation story. The site where the minster stands today was once the site of an impressive Roman Villa and after that an Anglo-Saxon church.

Visitors can follow the object trail and explore the exhibition. There is something for everyone to do, including a Hunt The Letter game for children and an opportunity to spot a hidden creature in the minster. Everyone is welcome, entry is free.

#### **Museum of the Moon**

After the success of last year's Gaia Earth installation, the Minster has announced that Luke Jerram's 'Museum of the Moon' will be coming to Southwell Minster from 12-22 October 2024.

Measuring seven metres in diameter, the moon features detailed NASA imagery of the lunar surface. At an approximate scale of 1:500,000, each centimetre of the sculpture represents 5km of the moon's surface.

Over its lifetime, the Museum of the Moon will be presented in a number of different ways both indoors and outdoors travelling from place to place.

The installation is a fusion of lunar imagery, moonlight and surround sound composition created by BAFTA and Ivor Novello award winning composer Dan Jones. Each venue also programmes their own series of lunar inspired events beneath the moon.

Ticket details and a full programme of events will be available shortly.

#### Being Shop Aware.

With the rise in popularity of online shopping, it's important to know both your rights and how to keep yourself safe when shopping on

the Web. New research from Citizens Advice has found shoppers were seven times more likely to have an issue with an online purchase compared to those made in store. We are sharing our top tips for shopping online confidently.

#### **Delivery Problems**

The seller must make sure you receive the item. Check the address you gave the seller and contact them to ask where your order is. If the seller claims they've delivered it, or don't know where it is, you can ask for a redelivery. You might be able to get a refund in some circumstances.

#### **Defective Goods**

If something's gone wrong with an item you've bought, you might be entitled to a refund, repair or replacement. You'll have legal rights if the item you bought is:

- Broken or damaged (not satisfactory quality)
- Unusable (not fit for purpose)
- Not what was advertised or doesn't't match the seller's description.

#### 'What if I change my mind?'

- If you buy in store, you don't have a legal right to return goods if you've simply changed your mind. Many shops have their own policies and do allow this, but time limits can vary.
- If you buy online, you usually get a right to cancel, known as a coolingoff period, but there are exemptions including bespoke or personalized goods, and computer software where the seal is broken.

#### Pay Safe

- Pay by card so you have another form of protection if there's a problem. You may be able to make a chargeback or a Section 75 claim to your card provider.
- Be cautious if you're ask to pay in an unusual way e.g. in iTunes vouchers, cryptocurrency or bank transfer. It could indicate a scam.

#### Making a Return

- Get proof of your return a receipt from a shop or proof of postage. If you pay for return postage, check the service you use covers the value of the goods.
- Using a service that includes tracking means you can prove when a trader received your return.

fill up at the same time and, luckily, there had been a downward trend for a number of days. We were fortunate to hit a small price dip and to pay less than last time at 65.45p/litre ex VAT.

Boilerjuice's graph of their average price for 1000 litres across England, which we use as our guide, was showing the England average price as 68.36p/litre ex VAT on 7th February when our order was placed.

The next order will be later in the year, probably in July or August depending on how many of you get in touch indicating you need some and what the price is doing at the time. If we have a continuing cold snap, an extra order is possible if group members make it clear there is a need. Please get in touch if you think you will need one.

## Laxton & Moorhouse Parish Council, Minutes of the Meeting held on 23/1/24

Present: Councillors: S. Hill (chair), J. Hill, M. Hennell, R.

Creighton. S. Rose, A. Moorhouse, D. Sheard

#### In attendance at parish council meeting

C. Wilson (Clerk), S. Michael (District councillor) Member of the public (x1)

- Apologies for absence: There were no absences. Mr Pringle had sent apologies. Councillors were disappointed that there were no representatives from the solar park developer in attendance. They also noted the new date for the community information session, 31 January 2024.
- Declarations of interest: Mr Sheard declared an interest in item 16 c (Finance – Accounts for payment). There were no other declarations of interest, direct or indirect, in any items of business on the agenda.
- 3. **Dispensations:** None required.
- 4. **10 Minutes public speaking:** The following were raised and discussed:
  - a. The condition of the roads. The chair encouraged all residents to report road issues individually as recommended by Mr Pringle.
  - b. Overgrowth obstructing the footpath outside Smithy Farm and the hedge on the left of Toad Lane at the corner as on exiting the village. The clerk will write a letter to the landowner requesting that it be cut.
  - c. Overgrowth on Moorhouse Road. The clerk will raise with Mr Pringle.
  - d. The condition of and rubbish at Bar Farmhouse. Mrs Michael reported that she had spoken with the conservation officer who was going to inspect the property. The clerk will contact the officer direct for an update.
- 5. Thoresby Estate Report (if any): No report available. Councillors discussed the Court Leet suggestion that there be a village meeting to discuss village matters including flooding. However, the suggestion had been superseded by Village Centre developments, with an invitation to a meeting from the Village Centre to village hall representatives, the Thoresby estate and the chair. The chair referred to some apparent confusion in relation to his position, which was chair of the parish council not a village hall

representative. He will email Mr Pierrepont to request a meeting agenda.

Councillors identified the 2024 Annual Parish Meeting as an appropriate forum for the discussion of village matters including flooding. The clerk will invite Mr Pierrepont.

Councillors **agreed** that they would like to invite the NCC flood officer to the March 2024 meeting.

6. Minutes of the Parish Council meetings held on 28 November 2023: The minutes of the parish council meetings held on 28 November 2023 were agreed as a true record and signed by the chair.

#### 7. Matters arising:

*Item LMPC/316/23 – 10 minutes public speaking –* The clerk reported that no aquasacs are available.

Item LMPC/320/23 – Reports from councillors – The chair had spoken with Rob regarding glass collection in Moorhouse but it may not be viable because of the small number of properties. He is waiting to hear.

There were no other matters arising which were not otherwise on the agenda.

- 8. Reports from councillors: It weas reported that:
  - a. The verge by Toad Lane has been completely eroded
  - b. The tarmac at the gate to Corner Farm was damaged. The clerk will report both to NCC.

The chair reported on the Safer Neighbourhood Group meeting on 18 January 2024, referring to then following in particular:

- The police no longer support with Neighbourhood watch but instead encourage residents to use Neighbourhood Alert which is a notification system. It remains possible to set up a group but there would be no police involvement.
- 2. Police priorities had been identified as:
  - i. Rural crime and education
  - ii. Speeding traffic
  - iii. Inconsiderate parking
- 3. Beat meetings had been held throughout the summer with the police making themselves available to meet the public. However, they are now looking at engaging with communities in a different way by attending existing events where residents will already be in attendance.
- 4. The next meeting is on 18 April 2024. Mr Sheard reported that he is attending the meeting with the Police and Crime Commissioner, Caroline Henry. In addition to her flooding report at LMPC/316/23 10 minutes public speaking, Mrs Michael reported that:

- a. Following the flooding on 6 January 2024, the government had restored all previous flood grant schemes including the farming recovery grant for land which is uninsurable
- b. NSDC is bringing back CCTV cameras at a cost of £500,000
- c. The cabinet meeting had approved a 7.7% rise in council house rents and a council tax increase.
- 9. Property matters including sports field and Glebe Field matters (if any): Mr Sheard reported that the Sports Field Committee meeting had been cancelled. There had however been discussion of a joint litter pick. Councillors approved the suggestion. Mr Sheard will organise the event on a date to be agreed.

The clerk reported that her search through the minutes in the NCC archive confirmed that parish council had received the grant funding and paid for the pavilion's construction. On this basis, the parish council would require insurance but a value would be required for the structure. The clerk will make enquiries. Mrs Moorhouse will obtain a copy of the lease from Thoresby which may contain relevant information.

Councillors noted that the Glebe Field hedge had been cut.

#### 10. Parish council matters:

- a. Aims and objectives: Councillors discussed and shared ideas.
- b. Consider use of social media: Councillors discussed the benefits of a social media platform to disseminate information but also the risks and need for robust safeguards. Mr Sheard, Mrs Creighton and Mr J Hill will form a working party to consider the options and report back at the March meeting.
- c.Report on Christmas event: Councillors agreed that the event had gone well with lots of positive feedback having been received from residents. They regretted that the weather conditions had prevented the vicar and choir from attending. They will await the Young Farmers' invoice for the removal if the trees.
- 11. D Day 80<sup>th</sup> anniversary Discuss beacon: After discussion, it was agreed that the chair would ask the Dovecote if a beacon could be lit in the pub field as in the past.
- 12. Defibrillator inspection report: Mr J Hill reported that, there were no issues. It was noted that the battery date is May 2024. The clerk reported that it had now become clear that the defibrillator model was being phased out. She will look at potential new models and funding.

### 12. Village environment and appearance, including Bar Farmhouse:

- a. Parish roads and pavements, including Moorhouse village sign: The clerk will ask Mr Pringle to visit to look at the roads, pavements and drains. The planned for the location if any new litter bin was confirmed as by the dog bin at the sports ground entrance.
- **b. Bench for Moorhouse:** The bench will be installed when weather conditions are better.
- c. **Flood resilience:** Discussed at LMPC/5/24 (Thoresby Estate report) above. The clerk will ask for volunteers to put out flood signs using the website.
- d. **Neighbourhood watch:** Discussed at LMPC/8/24 (Reports from Councillors) above
- 13. **Financial position as at 31 December 2023:** Councillors considered and noted the clerk's report showing the precise financial position at 31 December 2023 (incorporating the 2023-24 budget figures).
  - a. **2024 25 insurance arrangements:** Councillors unanimously **approved** the 2024-25 insurance arrangements subject to the above amendment.
  - b. Accounts for payment: Councillors unanimously approved eleven payments totalling £1240.34. Councillors noted the importance of submitting expenditure invoices in advance.
  - c. To consider the financial information provided by the Clerk and NSDC's letter regarding 2024/25 precept estimates and to agree the precept for the year ending 31 March 2025: Councillors considered the financial information provided by the clerk. They noted the level of reserves, recognising that these were at a level which provided scope for investment on the parish environment. Councillors unanimously decided to retain the precept at £4600.
- 14. **Service faults:** None reported
- 15. Correspondence: NSDC Anti-social Crime and Policing Act 2024 Public Spaces Protection Orders: Noted
- 16. 5 minutes public speaking time: Nothing raised.
- 17. Agenda items for next meeting: See above
- 18. **Date of next meeting**: 7.30 pm Tuesday 26 March 2024 at Laxton Visitor Centre
