Letter From Revd. Zoe

Dear friends

On Saturday 19th May, Prince Harry will marry Meghan Markle. We will be marking this special occasion at St Paulinus Church, New Ollerton, with a special 'Songs of Praise' service at 4pm on Sunday 20th May. All are welcome to come along and join us to mark this special occasion. During the Open Churches Weekend of the 7th & 8th July, our churches will be open and across the Family of churches we have a wedding theme running as we celebrate marriage and the importance of marriage. Various events will be happening across our Family of churches and on Sunday there will be several Songs of Praises. Plans are in progress for this weekend so note the dates and watch this space for more information to follow in the June newsletter/magazine!

During the 10 - 20th May, the Church of England will launch its 3rd annual global prayer movement called 'Thy Kingdom Come'. The words will be familiar to many of you, from the Lord's Prayer: 'Thy Kingdom come, Thy will be done, on earth as it is in Heaven'. Many other Christian churches have partnered the Church of England in this initiative, reminding us of the important of prayer and the difference prayer makes to our lives.

Last year, as part of the initiative, we invited you to tie coloured ribbons to the railings/church gates as a sign and symbol of your prayer. There was a particular outpouring of ribbons tied shortly after the terrorist attack at Manchester. When we are overwhelmed and feel powerless by circumstances beyond our control, there is something within us that desires to reach out to offer help in some form - to make difference and prayer is one such means by which we do this. Prayer is something that anyone can do. You don't have to use complicated words. God hears the simplest cries of our hearts.

Archbishop Welby says, "the moment we start praying 'Thy Kingdom Come' we look outwards....we are compelled to experience the compassion of God for a world caught up in lostness, in suffering and pain, in the oppression of the poor, in cruelty, in all things that go against the Kingdom the God'. When we pray 'Thy Kingdom Come' as part of the Lord's Prayer, we are asking that God's Kingdom of peace, justice, mercy, hope and joy will transform individual lives, transform society and transform the world at large and in the process, we are also re-committing ourselves to be used by God so we can play our part responsibly in this process of transformation.

I wonder what does the Lord's Prayer mean to you? Is this a prayer which you use? Do you know this prayer? This religious prayer, the prayer that Jesus taught us to pray, is used all around the world by millions of people and has been for over 2,000 years. There probably isn't a moment, day or

night, when there isn't someone on earth praying the Lord's Prayer. It is prayed at family events: weddings, christenings and funerals and other church services. We are doing some focused teaching on the Lord's Prayer in schools and we have hosted 2 nurtures groups recently to study the Lord's Prayer in more depth. Comments made by those who have done this study include: 'the words of the Lord Prayer have sunk from my head into my heart, I no longer just trot them off by rote; each verse has real depth and meaning every time I say them. If you want to know more about the nurture groups running in our Family of 12 churches and know what we are studying and even want to be part of them, please get in touch!

An Adventurous Man John 'America' Rose 1843-1918



A Courageous Girl Mary Jane Twidle 1851-1925

My grandmother lost her mother when she was only 12 years old and she had to go out to work. Her employer, Mrs Motley, moved from Messingham to the Dovecote Inn at Laxton in 1868 and grandmother came with her.

She met John Rose and married him when she was only 16 years old. They set off for America straightaway. Mary Jane gave her age as nineteen.

In about 1860 John Rose had moved with his sister Ann and her husband, Mr James White, from Moorhouse to Navenby where Mr White had taken a farm. John had evidently remained there, working for his brother-in law, until his marriage.

John met Mary Jane on one of his visits home and as soon as she was old enough they got married. They spent their first night in Navenby. It must have been a whirlwind courtship!

However they did not leave England straightaway. In 1871 they were in Sheffield, possibly earning enough money to pay for their passage or perhaps making a stop-over on their way to Liverpool. In the 1870s it cost about £4 to buy a ticket in steerage - that is below deck. (The wage for an agricultural labourer at that time was around £30 a year)

Men, women and children were herded together in the hold. You were allocated a space for your mattress and blankets which you had to provide for yourself, along with anything else you might need, including provisions, eating utensils and a pot.

There was little or no privacy. Rats and insects were constant companions. And the stench!

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

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Drama in Laxton

Jo Godson has come upon some items which tell of the village's dramatic history. Thanks to Jo for providing the information, gleaned from her researches at the Retford Library looking in the old copies of the Retford, Gainsborough and Worksop Times.

17th October 1930

DRAMATIC SOCIETY – This class held a very successful annual meeting last week. The treasurer, in presenting the balance sheet, stated that the society was in an excellent financial condition and the organiser stated that although a few members had left the village, he hoped, with the influx of a few young men to be even more successful this season. It was unanimously decided to join the Notts Drama League, organised by the Rural Community Council.

24th April 1931

The Laxton Players, who are affiliated with the Notts Drama League, gave a concert in the schoolroom on Thursday April 16th to a crowded audience. The programme included two plays, "The Door on t' Chain" and "Thirty Minutes in a Street", the first a village drama and the second an amusing farce.

The characters in "The Door on t' Chain" were well interpreted by Miss B P Willis as "Martha Kirby", the vicarage housekeeper; Miss M Quibell as "Anne Fewston", a village girl; Mrs McDearmid, a village gossip; D Henderson as the village rake; and J Quibell as the constable. "Thirty Minutes in a Street" caused roars of laughter. There were 23 characters in this play and most of the members of the large Laxton group of players had some part to play. The adventures of the Old Lady with her petticoat, the hopeless plight of the Stray Man and the predicament of the Actor were screamingly funny. These parts were well played by Miss E Cocking, Mr O Laughton and Mr C Rayner. Romlea McDearmid as the child, played the perfect part.

The programme was varied by other items contributed by the Players, as follows:- Poem, "The Inventor's Wife", Irene Cocking; song "The Fine Old English Gentleman", J Quibell; poem, "The Highwayman", Harold Sampson; song, "The Farmers Boy", Frank Reed; pianoforte duets by Misses I and E Cocking and Misses D Laughton and S Price; "A Country Dance" by the children; song, "Husbands", Miss Willis; and a poem, "Jolly Farmers" by Miss M Sampson. An amusing dualogue, "Mrs Jawkin's Husband" was effectively rendered by Miss Doris Clark and Miss Majorie Quibell. The audience was most enthusiastic over these efforts and encores were frequent. The whole programme made a most successful evening's entertainment. The proceeds were for the benefit of the Laxton players

Laxton History Group



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Members were saddened to hear of the death of Marian Cooper. Marian was born in Laxton and moved to Edwinstowe in 1967 although she always

thought of Laxton a s home. She was a great help to the History Group in providing information and photographs for the recent booklets. Marian and her sister Sybil appear on the front cover of the volume 'The Variety of Village Life' sitting on a horse.

The March meeting of the Group took place after the April edition of ' \mathfrak{Open} \mathfrak{field} ' had been printed but members arriving saw Cath manning's lovey picture of the church on copies on the reception table and said how lovely it looked. No doubt their appreciation was increased by the night being rather warmer than of late.

Michael Wood Award

Following the great success of the Michael Wood Award project we have run with Kneesall School, the Group allocated additional funds to the project earlier this year and have now engaged two more schools to take part. Because children stay in the top class at Kneesall for 2 years, we run the project alternate years there and hoped another school might be interested in taking part on the years we are not working with Kneesall.

Project leaders Roger and Joan Cottee have been speaking to Norwell School about this. They have learned that this school is linked with Normanton School and between them they have 27 children in the top class. They are both very enthusiastic to join in the project and arrangements have been made for the children to come here in early summer to begin their project. We are delighted to welcome them in this work and look forward to meeting the children and teachers in due course.

Forthcoming Activities

We finalised arrangements for our AGM and supper and gave the recipes to the cooks. We are so fortunate to be blessed with very able and willing cooks who are not put out by being asked to turn their hands to the sometimes strange recipes we find. This time they are all from the 1700s and two are 'Italian style' and another 'in the Dutch Way'. It proved to be a period when it is harder to find recipes which fit our current thoughts of three courses as the order of the day, at least for the wealthy whose recipes have survived, was 'meat and six meat'! Fruit and vegetables did not appear much used although herbs and leaves were, so that saved the day. More of this next time.

We have now booked our 100th Meeting celebration at Thoresby hall for

May 16th, where we will be enjoying afternoon tea in the Blue Room.

Last month we told how Norwell Parish History group had invited us to join them for a meeting in May. Unfortunately this had to be moved forward to April, but as Prof. John Beckett became unavoidably unavailable the meeting was then cancelled. We hope it is just a postponement and that it may go ahead as a joint meeting of our two groups next year.

We are booking a coach to take us to Ryedale Folk Museum on Saturday 23rd June. There are a small number of seats available for any non-members who would care to join us. Please contact Jean Hennell on 870276 if you would like to come. The cost to non-members for the bus will be £5 per person and admission as charged, £5 + £7.95 age 15+, concession and age 4 - 15 £6.95

'Rural Britain'

The entertainment for the evening was a film entitled 'Rural Britain' - a compilation of about a dozen short films, ranging in date from 1904 to 1981 and covering all parts of the kingdom. It was presented as a journey through the seasons and we began with a look at an upland sheep farmer at lambing time on the hillsides around his farm. Dating from 1932, this showed him walking everywhere and bringing chilly lambs home to his wife to warm up in the range.

A day in the 1904 hayfields was nostalgic and in many ways reminiscent of the 1935 film of Laxton. No doubt the scene in the 1941 blacksmith's shop was much the same as happened here as well. The later films looked at the threat of closure facing a village school, which felt it would 'become a geriatric ward' if a conservation order stopped housing being built for young families and how early warning of invasion would have been spread in Derbyshire in 1981 by the publican on his bicycle! It was a good job it never happened. The most bizarre film showed a seal, caught in The Wash in 1930, which was being kept as a pet in a village pond in Norfolk. Certainly on the day the film was made, he fed very well on fish brought by young and old alike. Everyone enjoyed the charm of this look back in time.

Laxton's Historic Open Field Farming System - Latest News

Very little to report at this stage and no contact from the Crown. However Sir John Starkey has been in touch to say The Crown have agreed to inform us first when the Estate is put up for sale and secondly he said that the Vice Chancellor at Trent University/Brackenhurst was compiling a submission in readiness for when The Crown release details.

Be sure to report your faults to your service provider as well.

County Chairman, Jane Jefferson, had baked a cake decorated in the colours of the Suffragettes -**G**reen, **W**hite and **V**iolet, representing 'Give Women Votes' as this year is also the centenary of the first women getting the right to vote in this country.

Our annual party was held in Egmanton Village Hall on Wednesday 4th April.

Brenda welcomed everyone including members from Weston, Egmanton, Sutton and East Markham. We were served a lovely meal by Sally Adamson. Prizes were presented to the people with most points in our competitions over the year. He began by explaining that the mask takes away the ability to read emotions in the face so we have to rely on reading body language. This allows the actor to be creative in how they express themselves. Steven observed that those who have most difficulty with mask work are the most beautiful who rely heavily on their faces.

John trained in ceramics and as well as a mask maker, he is a puppet maker. He took us on a whirlwind word tour with the masks he had brought to show us. We went from an ancient African example to an Indian tiger then a vengeful Buddah from Tibet. Peking Opera has dispensed with masks in favour of make up but Chinese masks have influenced those in Japan. Here the fascination with the big noses of Europeans is reflected in masks.




In Bali mask making is quite an ordinary part of cultural life and they tend to represent perfection and be beautifully painted as in this example which we saw.

The next stop was across the Atlantic where a North American Indian mask was made of papier maché representing a very expensive

wooden style carved from fresh cedar with hair made from cedar bark.

Much further south, Mexican, Peruvian and Chilean masks showed Aztec, Mayan and Inca influences mixed with Spanish. A Mexican wrestler's mask had an interesting story. The mask was only removed when a wrestler was defeated. When a famous wrestler was defeated only after 10 years he was revealed to be a priest fighting to make money for an orphanage.





The talk ended with a





series of examples from closer to home and a brief description of the many processes in making a custom mask

Maypole Celebrations at Wellow

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Telephone Preference Service: False Claims

Fraudsters are cold-calling victims, falsely claiming to provide a 'Telephone Preference Service' - an enhanced call-barring service, which includes barring international call cent



barring international call centres.

The fraudsters ask victims to confirm/provide their bank account details, informing them that there is a one-off charge for the service. Victims instead see unauthorised monthly debits deducted from their accounts. The fraudsters often target elderly victims.

In all instances, direct debits are set up without following proper procedure. The victim is not sent written confirmation of the direct debit instruction, which is supposed to be sent within three days.

On occasions when victims attempted to call back, the telephone number provided by the fraudster was either unable to be reached or the victim's direct debit cancellation request was refused.

During 2017, there were 493 Action Fraud Reports relating to this fraud.

Protect yourself:

- There is only one Telephone Preference Service (TPS). The TPS is the only official UK 'do-not-call' register for opting out of live telesales calls. It is FREE to sign-up to the register. TPS never charge for registration. You can register for this service at <u>http://www.tpsonline.org.uk.</u>
- You will receive postal confirmation of genuine direct debits. If you notice unauthorised payments leaving your account, you should contact your bank promptly.
- Always be wary of providing personal information, or confirming that personal information the caller already claims to hold is correct. Always be certain that you know who you talking to. If in doubt hang up immediately.

- 1. **Apologies for absence:** There were no absences. It was noted that a prior commitment had prevented Sir John Starkey's attendance but that he had provided an update.
- Declarations of interest: The chair declared an interest as a member of the sports field committee in item 11 (Property matters – Sports field) and an interest as member of the village hall committee in item 14 b (Village environment – Village hall refurbishment project). Mr Brown also declared an interest as a member of the sports field committee in item 11 (Property matters – Sports field).

There were no other declarations of interest, direct or indirect, in any items of business on the agenda.

- 3. Dispensations: None required.
- 4. **10 Minutes public speaking:** A member of the public enquired about a letter received from NSDC planning department regarding a structure which NSDC described as unauthorised and for which retrospective application for planning permission was required. Councillor Michael offered to discuss the planning requirements and necessary steps with the resident outside the meeting.

The chair referred to a written request from the landowner for the removal of the defunct cricket pavilion and mower shed and restoration of the cricket pitch. Councillors **agreed** that this was a matter for the cricket club rather than the council but understood that the cricket club was aware of the need to remove the pavilion and would be doing so in due course. The clerk will write to let the landowner know.

- 5. **Minutes of the parish council meeting held on 23 January 2018:** The minutes of the meeting held on 23 January 2018 were agreed as a true record and signed by the chair.
- 6. Matters arising: LMPC/4/18 10 minutes public speaking time: It was noted that the new LED streetlights had been adjusted but that unlit spots remained. It was also noted that the lights mimic car headlights which can be confusing. The clerk will write formally to councillor Pringle to ask that the angle of the lights be changed to improve the spread of light emitted.

There were no other matters arising.

t was **agreed** that, for the benefit of a member of the public in attendance, item 14 e (Village environment – Parish footpaths) and then item 13 (Village development and future) should be considered next.

Councillors thanked councillor Pringle for his Moorhouse finger post grant.

- 9. 2018 Annual Parish meeting arrangements and speaker: Annual parish council meeting to commence at 7.00 pm followed by the Annual Parish Meeting at 8.00 pm. The clerk will invite Mr P Tipping, the Police and Crime Commissioner, and The Crown Estate. The chair will provisionally book the Village Hall for the meetings, with the location to be decided once it is clear which speakers if any will be attending.

10. Financial Matters:

- a. Financial position as at 28 February 2018: Councillors considered and noted the clerk's report showing the precise financial position at 28 February 2018 (incorporating the 2017-18 budget figures).
- **b.** Accounts for payment: The council unanimously approved ten payments totalling £752.35.
- c. Appointment of internal auditor: The chair suggested a suitably qualified resident whom he will approach. Councillors agreed, by a majority of 6 with 1 abstention, that a payment of £100 should be made. After discussion, it was **agreed**, by a majority of 4:3, that, subject to NCC approval, the council should purchase four flower boxes for the base of each village sign at a cost in the region of \pounds 50 +VAT. Mr R Hennell will forward a

picture of the proposed design to the clerk. She will then seek NCC Highway's guidance.
