Our Grade I listed church has stood there for hundreds of years and our oldest bells date back to the 1500s (see P38). The bells are only rung on special occasions, such as harvest or weddings and when other teams of ringers ask if they can come and ring. I would imagine that in the olden days, when we had three services each Sunday, they would have been rung more. They were also the messaging service of the day, ringing to spread news of special events in the community.

On Friday night, our team came from Lambley, Newark, Retford, Walesby, Weston and Ossington and we are very grateful to them for giving up their time voluntarily. It is a hobby which we all enjoy and we love to hear them rung. It is another tradition of village life.

## The Village Hall to Celebrate the end of the Harvest Season with "Guys and Ghosts"



As you all know our church harvest festival supper is held in the village hall, but perhaps you don't realise that traditionally the end of harvest celebrations went on much longer in the past.

Halloween or "Holy Evening" marks the day in the Christian calendar before All Saints Day. It was celebrated in the past with feasts and prayers for Saints and for members of

family and friends who had recently passed. It was a holy day of rejoicing and celebration, very important in the Christian calendar. It still remains a celebratory day, though in England it is mainly for children these days. On the Continent it is still a Christian celebration day.

In medieval times Christians went from house to house carrying hollowed out turnips to collect provisions or "soul cakes" from the rich, who would ask them to give prayers for their relatives. The tradition was carried over to America, where the turnips became pumpkins and soul cakes became candy. In turn the pumpkin tradition came back over here and the practice of carving funny faces on pumpkins began. Children, quite unconsciously of course, carry on the tradition with trick-or-treat.

We associate Bonfire night with Guy Fawkes, but actually the early Christians, and maybe even earlier folk, lit bonfires at that time of year to symbolise the end of the harvest season and the arrival of winter. Harvest, winter and the return of the sun in spring were of vital importance to the farming community. In Lerwick in Shetland 'Up Helly Aa' (Up Holy Day) is celebrated with bonfires still to mark the end of one year and to look forward to the next.

So, Halloween and Bonfire night are really an extension of our harvest festivities, marking the end of one season, the beginning of winter and



looking forward to the return of the sun in spring, a genuine holy time to be celebrated. The Village Hall Trustees invite you to come to celebrate with us at our own end of harvest knees up **on November 4th**. We plan a children's Halloween picnic party from 4pm until 6pm, lots of fun and games and the chance to meet Winnie the Weird Witch of West Field. £2.50 per child.

Then to follow in the evening from 7pm until it finishes there will be an adult village community party, a 'Stew and a Brew Supper'. Photos of Laxton in the past will be shown and tales will be told. ### **Laxton History Group**



In October we welcomed Dr Richard A. Gaunt to talk about "The women in the lives of the Dukes of Newcastle" He pointed out that the aristocracy of the day had to marry politically and for money in order to preserve their wealth and status.

As a consequence, the 2<sup>nd</sup> Duke, in his will, curtailed the inheritance of the 3rd Duke, (leaving all he could to his grandson), since the 3<sup>rd</sup> Duke had dared to marry Anna Marie Stanhope in secret. The 3<sup>rd</sup> Duke died soon after coming into the title and the 4<sup>th</sup> Duke inherited everything.

The 4<sup>th</sup> Duke was unfortunate enough to be caught up in the French Revolution and 3 years under house arrest in France made him xenophobic. When he returned home, he married Georgiana Elizabeth Mundy, an heiress daughter of a coal magnate. It was a successful marriage and produced 13 children. In 1822 however Georgiana died in childbirth. The 4<sup>th</sup> Duke erected Milton Mausoleum in

her memory. The 4<sup>th</sup> Duke had inherited his mother's dominant and controlling personality and after Georgiana's death Clumber became a cold and soulless household, his children being afraid of him.

The 4<sup>th</sup> Duke arranged for his eldest son, Lord Lincoln, to marry Lady Susan Hamilton, the spoilt only daughter of the Duke of Hamilton. Initially the 4<sup>th</sup> Duke approved of Susan as she quickly produced a male heir. The marriage provided 5 children, but proved to be unhappy due to Susan's promiscuity. The 4<sup>th</sup> Duke came to totally disapprove of Susan after she was discovered in a relationship with another of his sons. After the 4<sup>th</sup> Duke died, Lord Lincoln, now the 5<sup>th</sup> Duke of Newcastle divorced Susan. It was a major scandal at the time.



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#### **Laxton Harvest Celebrations**

Our harvest celebrations started on Friday evening with our usual Harvest Thanksgiving service in the church, which looked lovely once again. In the last few years we have had volunteers to help us decorate it in the traditional way, with the pillars being decorated with harvest grains and seed heads. This old tradition



goes back years and features on a very old post card of the church interior. Thanks to everyone who helped, including the Young Farmers who came and did so much to help.



We are very grateful to our Lay reader, Heather Brown, from Eakring for coming to take a service for us. It was the first service she had taken in four months.

There were over 50 people in church, which was good to see. It was nice to see some new faces and some regulars who had come



quite a distance to be with us again. We were also joined by our church friends from Kirton, Wellow, Walesby and Moorhouse.



Thanks to Graham for playing the organ, so we could sing some good old harvest hymns, and also to Stuart and Simon for reading the lessons for

us. We would also like to thank the six bell ringers who travelled quite a way to ring for us. As always they gave their time voluntarily.

After the service, everyone made their way up to the Village Hall to enjoy a cooked Harvest Supper. Thank you to Anna for cooking the supper for us, and to Margaret P for all her help in the



kitchen. We had a good system going, so soon

everyone got served. I'm sure everyone enjoyed their supper of steak pie, potatoes, carrots and peas. This was followed by a variety of sweets, provided by some good cooks. It was lovely to see everyone sitting down and hearing the chatter coming from the room.

The next part of our weekend celebrations was the harvest competition on Saturday afternoon.



Probably some of you have noticed this year we were early having our harvest celebrations. This was because we thought we would probably catch the best of the fruit and veg in September rather than in October. We usually have our Harvest celebrations over

the nearest weekend to 11th October, which is Laxton's feast day. This is another old tradition which we like to remember.

Not having had a competition since 2019, Jean and I had almost forgotten how to do it, but it all worked out well. There were also some different people taking part in the competition classes, but we were disappointed that we had only one child who submitted entries.

Altogether we had approximately 80 entries. In the years before covid we usually had over 100. In the years since then some of our regular competitors have moved away and newer villagers probably didn't know what it all entailed. Hopefully they came



along and saw that it is all good fun and will feel inspired to have a go next year, especially if we can get the schedule of classes into an earlier magazine. You don't have to live in the village to enter, so if any of our readers from nearby villages want to have a go, they will be very welcome.

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## **Group Oil Order**

Watching the price of oil is not for the faint hearted.
Boilerjuice publish a graph of their average price for 1000 litres across England, which we use as our guide and recently it has looked like a design for a new theme park thrill ride!

It peaked on 24th September at 82.7p/litre inc VAT @5%. Since then it has dropped a little, standing at 77.37p on 8th October, although the new problems in the Middle East are liable to make this politically sensitive price rise again. This compares with the still expensive 56.8p inc VAT which we paid for our last order.

Unfortunately this is not an optional purchase for most of us and so the usual November order will be placed, price permitting, towards the end of the month. If there seems to be a reason to order a little earlier, it would help to have orders to hand so that we can act quickly. Please send in your requirements any time from 1st November.

We try not to order too early to ensure people have plenty in stock for Christmas and New Year and don't run the risk of paying punitively high prices for an emergency delivery if it turns cold. Around 10 years ago a new arrival in Egmanton was charged over £1.40 per litre when he ran out just before Christmas!

There is the inevitable seasonal rise as people place last minute orders, so late November seems to be as good a time as any to try to get the best price for the season. I have been praised for the judicious use of my crystal ball last time, but cannot guarantee to be as successful as it has been at times in the current climate.

It really helps to have orders to hand if there is either a dip in price or signs of an imminent rise. When you receive a message calling for final orders, you can increase your order if you need to, but I will only allow a short, possibly **very** short, time to respond so that I can act quickly to secure the best price at the time for everyone.

Anyone whose order can be placed by email, either by themselves or by a friend or relative with authority to speak for them, is very welcome to join. Please contact me on my personal email if you have it. NB I do not publish it because of the volume of spam that generates. oil@openfield.org.uk is a general address you can use if you don't have mine.

The group currently covers an area of roughly 5 miles radius from Laxton, but one former resident, now 20 miles away, is still involved!

## National Recognition for Tuxford Young Farmers Club

Last month we carried an article about how 20 or so members of Tuxford Young Farmers Club had volunteered to come to our church to prepare it for Harvest, and what a terrific job they did of it. Their cover picture on this edition was chosen as the winner of the Harvest Competition in this category.



At about the time that article was being prepared, the news was announced that the club have been short listed among the top 5 clubs in the YFC National Achiever Awards.

Regular readers will remember that Jessica Rose of Laxton won the first National 'Heart of YFC' award after a public vote between the top five candidates in 2022.

The Awards recognise and celebrate the good work of YFC members across the country. Katie Gent prepared and submitted Tuxford's entry in for the 'Community Spirit' category. A total of 581 clubs had the opportunity to enter this competition for individual clubs. Tuxford, which is one of the smaller clubs, was chosen for the short list from which the winner will be announced at the Awards Night. For them to reach the top 5 is a terrific achievement. At present they have a lot of



young members within their fairly wide age range, and many of them came along for their evening at Laxton.

The Community Spirit Award recognises clubs that do the most for their communities. In her submission on behalf of the club, Katie spoke of their litter pick for the Coronation of His Majesty the King, Their potato growing scheme, the 'Bangers and Bingo Night', their annual Charity Tractor Run, the Christmas tree collection/recycling campaign and their charity Christmas Wreath Making event.

You will regularly see items about what the club are doing in these pages, and it is certain that they are a huge asset to this community. Once again they turned out to help with the preparations and aftermath of the Southwell Ploughing Match and Show.

The icing on the cake came shortly afterwards, when it was announced that Katie Gent herself, had been short listed for the top five for the public vote for the 'Heart of YFC Award, which Jessica won last year.



Katie grew up in Moorhouse and is a very active member of the Tuxford Club, supporting all the club and county activities. As we saw at Harvest, she is also a talented flower arranger and was responsible for the pedestal arrangements in church for Harvest as well as teaching and guiding the younger ones making the window displays.

The link on which to vote for Katie has been circulated widely locally, so hopefully everyone supported her.

Katie's talents will be put to good use at the Awards Night in Birmingham on 3rd November, where she will be responsible for the table flowers. Jessica, a self-confessed non flower arranger, has been drafted in as her assistant! We wish them all a great night and every success. We look forward to hearing how they got on in the next edition.

Still having contact details from that time, it was possible to put her friend from many years ago and now living in New Zealand in contact with her once the family had been asked for permission to do so. That was a satisfying moment.

#### Sue Gregory wrote from Somerset re The White Family

"My relative was one William White born in Laxton about 1809. He married Dinah Wilton born in Derbyshire in St. Werburghs church in Derby in 1843. On their marriage certificate he is 'a Civil Engineer'. His father, George White was a Tailor who I believe married Ann Kitchen from Laxton in September 1808. I have checked all the churchyard entries at the beautiful St. Michael the Archangel for a 'White' but have only found a grave for Phoebe White who is not my side of the family.

William and Dinah went subsequently to Newark where they took on a coaching inn in Castlegate which they ran together until his death and which she continued to run until her own. She was victualler there for over fifty years.

If anyone can add any thing to these facts I have so far I would be so very grateful. I wondered whether there are any White family members still living in the village or if anyone can remember anything at all."

#### Laura Adkins wrote from Solihull about Joseph Albert Favill:

"My great grandfather was George Favill, the Estate Woodman based at Saywood Cottages and mentioned in 'Village Folk, A Snapshot in Time: Laxton in Peace and War, 1900-1920'.

I am his great granddaughter via his son Joseph Albert Favill's illegitimate daughter Wilma Favill Mackay; my late mother... I visited Laxton in 2023, staying at the Dovecote Inn. I visited the church and Saywood Cottages, where the current owner was friendly and happy for me to take a photo.

If you know of any surviving descendants of George Favill still living in Laxton, or any Favill graves there I'd be most interested to hear, bearing in mind that Joseph's 'legitimate' family possibly never knew anything about my Mum."

Laura also wrote a piece about her search for information, which speaks of local people and a shortened version is reproduced here for interest:

"I began researching family history as my Mum's family background had seemed oddly obscured to me as a child. Her Mum's parents were a mystery. When I was in my twenties, Mum told me and my siblings that her parents never married and she hadn't really known her father, although she did have an idea of who he was.

Like most people of our generation, my siblings and I didn't share the moral ideas surrounding illegitimacy that had affected our Mum so deeply. When Mum showed me an old photograph and said 'I think this was my father', I was very curious. I'd recently had a daughter, and this was her great grandfather and my grandfather. I asked Mum if she'd like me to find out more about her father and she gave me the few details she'd made a note of in 1992.

I used the local history section of the now demolished Birmingham Central Library. When I arrived in the library, I would request microfiche of census, birth, marriage and death records, depending on what I was looking for at the time. Sometimes I would request, in writing, certificates from registry offices, for which I paid a small fee.

I started by looking for Albert Joseph Favill, but soon realised I was barking up the wrong tree. Favill is an unusual surname and there weren't many of them in the records. No Alberts were coming up. Then I found a Joseph Albert Favill – on a death register. This was a strangely spooky moment. My Mum didn't know that her father had died.

I discovered that he'd eventually married and had her two half-siblings. She was relieved to hear this as she'd always worried he'd spent the rest of his life alone.

In 2023, with access to records easily available via Ancestry.co.uk, I've been able to find out a lot more, and much more quickly, about Joseph's family and the areas where the Favills lived. Joseph had four children with the woman he finally married (Doris Saddington), one of whom was conceived before he married her and before he went to Manchester and met my grandmother Jemima. Ultimately, he went back to Doris.

I've had my DNA tested for Ancestry.co.uk, and know that the DNA I inherited from my Mum covers the area of Laxton.

My siblings and I never met Jemima, Mum's mother. Mum rarely spoke of her and when she did, referred to her as a friend.

This summer my husband and I visited areas of Nottinghamshire where the Favills lived, including Laxton, Edwinstowe and Southwell. We both enjoyed exploring Nottinghamshire for the first time. We stayed in Laxton where Joseph and his siblings were born and visited the church where they were baptised. I liked peaceful Laxton, with its tall hedgerows alive with twittering birds and its ancient grassy graveyard."

Laura attached a copy of Joseph's birth certificate which shows George and Mary as his father, and a family tree.

#### **News from the Museums of Tuxford**

With the approach of November we are preparing to remember the sacrifices made in War. Unfortunately the effects of war are still being experienced today.

The Walks of Life Museum has tributes to those who made sacrifices in World War I and II as well as various artefacts. Come and see our collection. Life post war is harsh in any country both on the individual and society as a whole. To support the Royal British Legion's Poppy Appeal we have been clearing the Nissen Hut on our site for a fund raiser. We are most grateful that two young people, Shani and Victoria, are willing to spend a night in the Nissen Hut, reflecting on how easy life is today in comparison to how it was for those affected by war and the lives of the post war squatters. They hope people will support them and donate to the British Legion appeal.

On Saturday 11th November at 2 pm there will be a talk on the life of the squatters

post World War II. who had to live in Nissen huts due to the mass housing shortage created by bombing and the shortage of building materials and skilled labour. Many of those people were in paid employment



or ex service personnel. Life was harsh for many years.

It isn't just humans that make great sacrifices in war. See how horses were affected by visiting **The Museum of the Horse**. One of the horrors

of WWI was chlorine gas, first put to use by the Germans in Ypres in 1915. It caused great harm and distress to humans, but one forgets that horses were just as vulnerable. The English gas mask for horses was not very effective. It was little more than a hessian nose bag soaked in a chemical to neutralise the gas

Unfortunately the horses thought they were feed bags so immediately put their head to the ground to try to find the food at the bottom of the bag. It is said that many bags didn't survive for long. It would seem most European countries and America had more advanced gas masks with breathing apparatus attached. It is thought that the Museum of the Horse



has the largest collection of horse gas masks in Europe. There is only enough room to display a couple at a time.

The most disturbing horror is post WWII Eastern European. One wonders what chemicals they planned to use! The illustration shows this mask currently on show in the military room. The horses also wore goggles to protect their eyes. These are even more rare and the museum is still waiting to acquire one.

place to place. In some areas it appeared heavy and clay-like, while quite close by it was fine and sandy. It is a dark, rich colour, due to deposits of silt from the Trent flooding.

From the first the tractors pulling passenger trailers were in demand to enable everyone to simply enjoy the ride or to see the further-flung activities.

In addition to the main ring, animals were competing in the showing classes and horses were competing in a host of events. There was also the usual mix of trade stands, both connected to the rural world and of a more artistic or culinary nature.

The main attraction in the main ring this year were the Paul Hannan

Quad Bike Stunt Riders. They amazed with their mastery of their bikes.

The show will take place next year at Oxton on the last Saturday of September, so why not make a note of the date now?



### **Egmanton Full Fibre Broadband Project**

The project to supply super fast broadband via fibre direct to the property is now complete. A big thank you goes to the group who worked on the project, and in particular to Steve Bunnell, who has shown the patience of a saint dealing with the correspondence it has generated, both with the powers that be and informing the potential customers in the village.

The group are to be particularly commended because most projects of this type have been set up to serve businesses and populations in the 1000s or tens of 1000s, so we are very fortunate that the suppliers have been persuaded to supply our small community.

The core group of villagers who, through the project, applied for the government vouchers which paid for the scheme, must now order a package from the supplier of their choice. All infrastructure costs are covered and first experiences are showing that only a small cost increase for the monthly service will result, while the speed of connection will increase greatly.

Because the infrastructure has been installed throughout the village, anyone who wishes to is now in a position to order their full fibre package, regardless of whether they originally committed to the project.

One of Steve's on-going frustrations is that modern privacy rules mean he has never been told which villagers have signed up for the government's vouchers! As a result, there are a large number of villagers who have not received his regular information bulletins and who will not know that they can now take advantage of the opportunity. He is asking anyone who has received the information to share it.

The final stage for those wishing to move to the new service is to make an arrangement with the supplier of their choice. Once this is done, they will come and connect the fibre cable to the property and they will normally supply a new router. Calls will then be fully digital.

The existing cable will remain, but the land line connection will be cut off. If you want to keep your land line you can keep your number but might need to buy and install an ATA adapter depending on your router. You could also buy new, digital, handsets to make and receive calls. Alternatively you can work with a supplier who is able to direct calls via the fibre so that you pick land line calls up using your mobile phone wherever you are without incurring forwarding charges. You need to do your research!

Anyone with a phone line which is critical for medical services should take expert advice as these services are not automatically able to transfer to the new system. Digital services will be rolled out nationally in the next few years.

#### Laxton

We had a very enthusiastic and successful team of hand bell ringers in Laxton a number of years ago. Janet Cooke and her late husband, Frank, were heavily involved in ringing both the tower bells and the hand bells. Janet provided the following information and photos for



one of Laxton History Group's big displays some years ago and it seemed fitting to include it here, especially with so many new residents in the village who will know nothing of yet another old tradition.

The text on the LHG display said:

"The team was formed by Frank Cooke in 1983. The next three years

were a period of intense activity when the team developed its skills and reputation.

When the team started, bell ringer Frank, assisted by his wife Janet, initially taught the team of girls from the village to ring using the bells, which until then had been kept in the church tower. There were then twelve bells, all in poor condition.





The bells are played from music presented as a series of numbers (and examples were shown in the display.) Some were bought in this form, but where it had to be transposed from the more familiar notes, Frank undertook this task as well As the girls improved, they began to play concerts and received donations to their

bell fund. They were also fortunate to obtain a grant from the County Council, and the funds raised enabled them to augment the collection of bells to a total of 28.

The Team was much in demand and played in a Christmas concert at Kneesall which was broadcast on the radio as well as at Newark Palace Theatre and numerous other venues. They found themselves so much in demand that they could not manage to play all the events which tried to book them."

There are some of the girls who rang who are still in the area and who will recognise themselves from the photos.

As you can see from these photos, they had smart uniforms for the

team and really looked good when they went out to perform. The uniforms and the bells are still in Laxton in safe keeping.

Janet has kindly provided details of the Laxton church bells and the inscriptions on them. There are six in total, with the treble being the smallest.

Tenor + GOD SAVE OUR CHVRCH OVR QVEENE AND REALME AND SEND VS PEACE IN CHRIST AMEN 1599 We will continue with more about bells and, in particular the Laxton bells, next month. Janet attributes the information she provided to Mr George Dawson, who had a lot to do with the Diocesan Bell repair Fund.

Frank Cooke, mentioned above, was the captain of the Laxton Tower Bell Ringing Team in his day. He was well known in bell ringing circles and after his death, a bell which was being cast for the church in Sutton cum Lound, was dedicated in his memory. The weekly journal for church bell ringers, 'Ringing World' carried an article in similar terms to the information above which told the story of the bells at Sutton. It included reference to the fund raising for the bell which was dedicated in Frank's memory.

"Early 1989 saw the formation of St Bartholomew's campanologists. ... A Committee was formed, ... our objective being the funding of a sixth bell. Various fund raising events were then organised, culminating in a gigantic one day Bric-a-Brac sale at Retford Buttermarket, which raise the outstanding sum in excess of £1,000 on the day.

This spurred us on towards our final goal!

A substantial donation from Mrs Janet Cooke of Laxton, in memory of her husband Frank Cooke, a well known ringer in the Diocese, brought us within reach of our target, thus enabling us to place an order for a treble for six'. (bells in total)

April 1991 saw a part of ringers set off for the foundry in Loughborough to see the casting of the new bell. The new bell to be inscribed 'St. Anne's Church. Lound 1859 - 1987'

St Anne's was a Chapel of Ease, which closed in 1987, the metal from the single bell was donated to be incorporated in the new casting. The new bell was hung on May 26th 1991, by Taylor's of Loughborough, assisted by Local help.

A dedication service took place in August..."
