

#### **Lockdown Wildlife**

Goats, wild pigs, sheep and many country dwellers have appeared in urban towns during the pandemic in numerous countries.

We in Laxton cannot boast such exotica, but have we seen the similar sort of thing here? What effect have the quieter, cleaner roads perambulating natives clearing the rubbish, hedgerows left to do their own thing had? A quick straw poll was needed, a look at the garden indicated.

Blackbirds must be the worst in the road sense league. In Spring the roads are often littered with bundles of black feathers. Not this year, and we have a very healthy population of young blackbirds raised in the hedges. Their song rings from as many vantage points as can be provided. Is it their clarion alarm calls that have helped the beautiful thrushes at the bottom of our garden raise a good brood in safety this year?



Hares are more numerous and have

been seen where they haven't been seen for some years. Toads and frogs, again missing from our garden for two or three years, are back –



not to forget Norma the Newt, a new arrival.

Where did that very small baby rabbit who decided to have a Peter Rabbit moment in the netting in the

garden come from? We have never seen a rabbit in the garden in 10 years since we moved here (he/she hopped it safely into the potato patch after release).

Predator numbers are down and this seems to have resulted in more broods of various garden birds, and far more healthy young chicks are



flocking to the bird feeders and feeding well on the more numerous insects which have benefitted from the cleaner air near the roads.


Pheasant and partridge chicks have

(though the injured badger we found in the conservatory raiding the birds' fat balls was a less than welcome guest).




flowers once commoncowslips, orchids and cranesbill with their fresh colours.

#### Cycling to Rome with Rotary

As with all the groups within Laxton, the Rotary club is not currently meeting in person. Each Wednesday we have a Zoom meeting which often culminates in a quiz. It has become very apparent over the weeks that quiz writing is an interesting art. Quite often the quizmaster believes they have questions set to represent all interests and abilities - how wrong some of them have been.

Our most recent quiz was fascinating in that the lowest score won. There were five categories, Politicians, Sportsmen, TV People, Entertainers and a catch all section. In each we were given the names of eight people representing that category. All we had to do was write down their current age.

Scoring was quite straightforward in that the number of years you were wrong represented your score. For instance I thought Monty Don was about 52 but unfortunately he's about 64. Scored 12! At the end of Round One's Politicians, Pat and I were in the lead with only 15 points. From there on we plummeted. There was an assumption that my knowledge of footballers, cricketers and TV personnel, current and retired, was adequate. Woefully not. It's amazing how many points one can accrue when you think a name belongs to a retired cricketer only to find he's the youngest player in the Liverpool football team. Also our knowledge of Love Island contestants was woefully inadequate too, a meaningless name being very difficult to age. Interestingly the younger members did much better.



The Cycle-To-Rome event was suggested by our two youngest members as currently raising money for charities and local organisations is virtually impossible, we only hope we are able to hold our Christmas Collection at Tesco in December.

Some members are cycling on exercise bikes, some are out on the road and one member is on his rowing machine. After the first month and fourteen rides out and about round Laxton I've now accrued 220

miles which in the scheme of things takes me as far as Dover.

During the course of this month I've ridden one 15 mile circuit without seeing another person (it was relatively early one Sunday), and on

one circuit I was going flat out with the assistance of gravity down a hill and was outrun very easily by a hare.

All cash or donations go through our Just Giving page and will go to Prostate Cancer Research. Anyone who would care to join our challenge would be most welcome. All we ask is that each rider agrees to donate £20.

All rides are recorded on the free Strava App and, once you've signed up, all rides are automatically added to your total. While 1220 miles to Rome is our furthest challenge shorter distances are also catered for. If you are interested just give me a call.

Please continue to wave if you see me out and about with my yellow Rotary tabard on. Its a long way to Rome over the remainder of the Rotary year. I might wave back, just nod or be so tired I didn't see you in the first place.

#### **Down Memory Lane**

We received this unexpected contribution from someone whose roots go way back in Laxton and Moorhouse. A big thank you to Leaphia Darko for writing it and sending a photo to illustrate it and to her daughter Janet for getting it to us with this comment:

"There was a story in the July 20 issue about Leaphia Hill's father, my grandad.

Margaret Saxelby asked my Mum to write another piece of her memories when she and her family lived in the cottage on the Saxelby farm."

We hope you enjoy her trip down memory Lane.

#### The Pantry

The pantry was a wonderful place. It was lined with shelves groaning under the weight of home-made jam, bottled fruit and pickled onions and shallots. There were salted runner beans, eggs in buckets of isinglass and hams and more sides of bacon hanging from the ceiling.



There were socks of onions and plenty of plums in season.

There might be apple pies, plum pies, blancmange, Victoria jam sandwich cakes (Mam never made small fancy cakes) and Christmas and birthday cakes and jam tarts. Mam made forty pork pies from the pig killing and at Christmas, fourteen Christmas puds. She didn't like the number 13.

Mr Cragg, the baker, cooked the pork pies and was a recipient as well as friends and relatives. We ate the last Christmas pudding at Easter.

As you opened the pantry door, lined against the wall, alongside buckets of preserved eggs, would be pancheons of pig dripping and brawn. Sylvia liked brawn sandwiches for school but I threw the brawn in the hedge and ate the bread.

Cloves, peppercorns and other seasonings for pickling were on the shelves along with dried peas, pearl barley, vermicelli, sago, ground rice, cornflour, plain and self-raising flour, black treacle, golden syrup, dried fruit (unpitted) and demerara and white sugar. There was even a block of saltpetre for preserving the hams and sides of bacon.

Fruit and vegetables were picked as necessary and put in the cool pantry.

There might be a piece of cheese and the remains of Sunday meat and boiled ham.

Jam jars and bottling jars plus the heavy pan for jam making along with other cooking utensils had their place in the pantry.

How I miss Mam's egg custard and mince pies and would often say 'Oh Alice can cook!"


Never mind I'll just look in the cupboard. There might be a packet or tin of something that hasn't passed its sell by date.





# From the Family Photo Album



I am lucky enough to have a family photo album with about 50 photos going back well into the 19th century. The album was begun about 1855, the oldest photo being of my great, great grandfather, who was born in 1789 - he was already about 26 by the time of the Battle of Waterloo!

I think it was first put together

by my great granny, Sarah Saxelby, nee Birkett, and was carried on by my aunty Mary, who was brought up at Egmanton Hill Farm and who wrote in many names. Many of



the people in the album are my ancestors or wider family members but some are family friends and many have a Laxton connection.

Some I can place in Laxton, some I can't. Here are a few people I think might be connected with the village and I thought someone might recognise the name of an

ancestor and be able to place them here or know their dates.



1(R) Mrs Harpham. I think the Harphams were at New House Farm

3,(R) Mr William Quibell. He was from Manor Farm, I think, but there were a few William Quibells. Some Quibells lived at Copthorne when I was young in the 1930s.



4,(L) Fred Dalby (or Dolby),

5 and 6, (Below) Mr and Mrs Richardson. The name sounds familiar but I can't place them.

# A New Crop in the Area

People have been talking about the appearance of a very pretty addition to the landscape this summer. The Common has been covered with a mix of buckwheat and phacelia (aka purple tansy). Behind the road to Egmanton the mix has included mustard, adding yellow to the mix. It is clearly very popular with the bees, which have been seen on it in large numbers.

All these species are fast growing and can be left in the ground for 2 - 3 months. One field photographed with the first sign of emerging shoots on 21st June was in full bloom by the first week of August.

Collectively, and with various other plant species not specifically seen locally, they are used as green manures. The roots fix nitrogen from the air and they make use of nutrients in the soil which might be washed away by heavy rain such as we seem to get most summers nowadays.

At the end of the growth period they can be cut and left to wilt before being worked into the soil to return the nutrients and provide organic matter for the following crop.

They also have the merit of covering the ground with thick growth which smothers other plants which try to grow, which leads them to be known as a cover crop.

A recent article in Farmers' Guide featured a farmer who has started to use this crop as part of a changed rotation which is now winter wheat, summer cover crop, winter wheat, spring wheat, spring barley, summer cover crop.

The farmer featured claimed that he was noticing a reduction of black grass of between 80 and 90%. This has been a problem in local fields and now that the spray used to control it has been withdrawn, this effect could be very helpful.

For once something seems to have been found which benefits everything and everyone. The farmers growing it see the benefit in much reduced black grass infestations and increased yields from their first year wheat after growing it, the bees absolutely love it and it is a very attractive addition to the rural scene during the flowering period.

The fields on the Common were topped at the beginning of August, but wild poppies have sprung up in the margins where some of the crop remained creating an even more attractive mix. See back page for photo.


