

From this month we are no longer part of the Group with Ollerton and Boughton. Bilsthorpe and Eakring have been split off from those parishes as well as from us. The new vicar will soon start work in the Ollerton and Boughton parishes, but the situation for us here is not so good.

We have been very grateful to Alistair Littlewood, who has a full time job but who has helped out with a lot of services recently. He is taking some holiday and will not be taking services during August and September. Margaret G is also taking some well earned rest.

The Return of Bell Ringing

After such a long period of silence, you may have thought you were dreaming when the bells of St Michael's sounded twice in 24 hours last month! With the relaxing of coronavirus restrictions, weddings are beginning to take place once again and the happy couple getting married on 21st August had requested that the bells be rung in celebration.



After such a long gap without any ringing, it was felt that a quick practice beforehand was required! The bells had already been checked over for potential hazards (in one bell tower in another part of the country the ropes were found to have been chewed through by squirrels, for example!), so with some trepidation the bells were rung for the first time in at least 18 months.

Despite reservations beforehand, the local ringers soon found their rhythm again, and so were able to ring for the wedding. On the morning after the practice a visiting band of bell ringers from Oxton had arranged to come and ring a 'quarter peal' (which takes about 45 minutes), one of five they rung that day travelling between other local churches, so this is why ringing returned to Laxton all at once.

The silencing of church bells throughout the land is almost without precedent in modern times. The last time that it was forbidden to ring was for security reasons during World War 2. The instruction was that they should only be rung in wartime if there was danger of invasion. At the declaration of peace at the end of the war the bells then rang out everywhere in celebration.

This time it has been a little different – the 'enemy' is unseen and all around us. Bell ringing has been one of the last activities to be

sanctioned again. This is because ringing chambers are often cramped, with little ventilation, and with the possibility of cross contamination because of the handling of the ropes by different ringers during a ringing session. It was illegal to ring for a considerable length of time during the various lockdowns, and even now ringing takes place cautiously with sanitising and face masks and as much fresh air as is possible.

Bell ringing is a very sociable activity, needing concentration, enthusiasm and practice to become proficient. You do not need to be musical, strong or even a churchgoer to become a ringer! The 'Flu Jab Campaign

From this month, the free flu vaccine will be offered to all secondary school students up to Year 11, children aged 2 and 3 on August 31, all primary school children, people aged 50 and over, pregnant women, unpaid carers, and frontline health and adult social care staff.

The enlarged flu drive will build on last year's expanded flu programme, which saw a record 19 million jabs being administered.

With the nation getting closer to normal life, we are having to learn to live with Covid-19 alongside other viruses. It is widely believed that our immunity to other illnesses such as 'flu will have diminished while we were all wearing masks and socially distancing. The big campaign is being mounted to ensure many more people are vaccinated and so protected from another nasty, potentially dangerous, illness.

The Religious Census, 1851, Part 1

In these modern times, it is hard to imagine the influence that religion had on village life just a few generations ago.

Victorian times saw a resurgence of religious practice and devotion that included a drive to restore and repair existing churches and the building of many new chapels.

Along with the devotion, there was a good deal of rivalry, sometimes fierce. This was not just a case of Church versus chapel but there were often two or three competing chapels in each village, each representing its own strand of Protestantism.

Roman Catholicism was, of course, widely considered completely beyond the pale and would routinely be referred to as 'popery'.

Even by the 1930s, when I was a child, religious observance was strong and the rivalries had only partially subsided.

After my mother became Sunday School teacher in Laxton, I found myself being forced to attend one service or another in Laxton or Egmanton up to five times every Sunday. Probably the reason I became an atheist!

Despite my lack of belief, I have retained a life-long love of the old Methodist Hymns and an interest in the buildings. I am pleased that, even if the chapels are no longer used for their original purpose, some have found new uses as lovely homes.

The 1851 religious census detailed the following chapels in Laxton, Egmanton and Moorhouse (with some extra notes from me):

(36) PRIMITIVE METHODIST, Erected about the year 1820, Domestic chapel not used exclusively as a place of worship.



Space: free 16
Present: Morn Aft Eve
Gen. Congregation 4 - 12
Wm. Bartram, Class Leader

I am not sure where the 1820 chapel was located but, in 1856, a new Primitive Chapel was built 'on the common or waste' after Moorhouse was drained in the early 1850s. Some years ago, I found the date stone in a hedge bottom.

The chapel was used until c1916, when, due to WW1, the congregation became too small and there was a shortage of lay preachers.

The seats and pulpit were in place until 1930s (I remember playing in there and 'preaching' from the pulpit), after which it became a cow house and piggery.

It is now a stable and sometime goat or chicken shed



The door would creak open just as we were getting into something interesting and his beaming face would appear. I was mortified. This was mine – he wouldn't let me play with him and John the Cloak, so why should he spoil my scene? Unfortunately, persistence was his middle name.

Dad eventually sorted him by sabotaging his metal pedal car so that it made so much noise he couldn't sneak off. It was a masterly stroke.

Once free of the nuisance, brigade life was good, varied, and exciting. We revelled in the challenges those lively and committed ladies gave us.

The call came when I was eight years old. Places were available in the band – who was interested? Was I just! Big base drum here I come!

Charging into the house I blurted out the news with a clarion call. I would ask to play the big drum. Wouldn't it be wonderful? The mental vision of this sent my then 16-year-old brother Eric into such paroxysms of hysteria my parents feared for his safety.

Perhaps I should explain that my dimensions at this time (confirmed by the order for my new uniform) were 3 feet 9 inches tall and vital statistics of 22", 22", 22". You can see his point. But it stung. Oh, how it stung!

However, to this day the identity of the individual who substituted a pair of little girl's white knickers for his rugby shorts in his next away game kit will not pass my lips.

They gave me a bugle.

I tootled away for some time and thoroughly enjoyed myself. The family were pleased- practice times were not done at home.



Choice was limited, and popular ones like the guitar were soon claimed. The choice for the last few of us was a violin, or a violin. I cannot say my heart was in it. But we were encouraged to 'try our best'.

Reaction at home ranged from encouragement through gritted teeth to downright horror. Who could blame them, for I practised diligently. Eric took to wearing great wodges of cotton wool in his ears which flowed over his shoulders, and lan ostentatiously went and sat in the back garden.

The violin lessons at school became more of a trial, lighted only by Margaret Lewis, who was an inveterate ghoulish storyteller who told us gruesome 'facts' about herself in graphic detail. A particularly horrific one was that if she drank kidney soup her left eye would drop out — I think it was the kidney soup that did it. She was great fun. I often wonder what happened to Margaret.



The end was inevitable. When after three terms we could only manage the most excruciating approximation of 'Air on a G String' the will to 'try our best' was gone. Eric by this time had christened me Yehudi Bloggins.

The joys of rounders, netball, gymnastics and swimming were calling and Saturday mornings were spent at a very lively art group.

With no reluctance on anybody's part, I hung up my violin.

I don't know whether Miss Roberts found any silk purses among the sow's ears, but the plan had a lasting effect. Whoever joined in (and their families) were left with a deep and abiding respect for those people who can, and do, play a musical instrument to the delight and benefit of us all.

Present: Councillors: M. Manning (chair), S. Hill, R. Hennell M. Hennell, J. Hill, S. Rose, J. Godson

In attendance at parish council meeting

C. Wilson (Clerk)

- Apologies for absence: Councillors regretted that at the last minute the intended venue, Moorhouse Church, had been unavailable. They apologised to the public for any inconvenience noting that the meeting had started late to allow anyone attending to drive to the replacement venue.
 - Apologies were accepted from councillors Michael and Pringle.
- Declarations of interest: The chair declared an interest as a member of the sports field committee in item 10 (Property matters – including sports field and Glebe Field and sub-tenancy and associated legal services).
 - There were no other declarations of interest, direct or indirect, in any items of business on the agenda.
- 3. Dispensations: None required.
- **4. 10 Minutes public speaking:** No public present. Nothing raised.
- 5. Minutes of the parish council meeting held on 25 May 2021: The minutes of the meeting held on 25 May 2021 were agreed as a true record to be signed by the chair at a later date when face to face contact is possible.
- **6. Matters arising:** No other matters arising which were not otherwise on the agenda.
- **7. Reports from district and county councillors:** Mr Pringle and Mrs Michael's written reports were noted.
- 8. Reports from councillors: Councillors discussed concerns which had been raised regarding the accumulation of dog waste at Mill Field off Toad Lane. Councillors agreed that there was clearly a need for the means of disposal of dog waste at the site. Having considered the associated one off and ongoing costs and accessibility for the NSDC waste lorry, they authorised the clerk to order a new dog bin to be sited at that location.
 - Councillors discussed the arrangements for the village meeting to be attended by Mr Pierrepont on Wednesday 22 July 2021 and their hopes for a close working relationship in the future. There was discussion of then potential for interpretation boards and potential plans for the fields. The clerk will write to Mr Pierrepont with regard to developing a strong working relationship between the Estate and the village's elected representative body.

A need for 30 mph signs for Woodhouse was identified. The clerk will

make enquiries of Mr Pringle.

A report of overflowing drains at Toad lane was noted. The clerk will report to NCC.

- 9. Financial Matters:
- a. **Financial position as at 30 June 2021:** Councillors considered and noted the clerk's report showing the precise financial position at 30 June 2021 (incorporating the 2021-22 budget figures).
- b. **Accounts for payment:** The council unanimously **approved** ten payments totalling £1899.89.

A request for a contribution to the machine maintenance costs in relation to a resident's cutting of the grass was noted. The chair will request a receipt and the contribution will be discussed at the September 2021 meeting.

Councillors **decided** that the Zoom subscription was no longer required.

- **c. Use of reserves:** Councillors discussed the following potential areas of expenditure:
 - i. Event to celebrate the Queen's 70th Jubilee
 - ii. Potential work to trees and boundaries at Glebe field
 - iii New Christmas lights and decorations and possible event. The clerk will include this as an agenda item for the September 2021 meeting.
- 10. Property matters including sports field and Glebe Field and sub tenancy and associated legal services: Councillors discussed the requirements for the lease. They discussed an informal report on the condition of the trees noting that it had not identified an issue. Given this and that the field was not open to the public, they agreed that any risk was low and a formal report was not necessary.

They asked the clerk to confirm the council's boundary responsibilities with its legal adviser. Subject to that, they **decided**:

- 1. The parish council would make good the boundaries
- 2. The tenant to be responsible for the maintenance of the field (including grass) and boundaries
- 3. The tenant to be responsible for maintaining the health of and protecting the trees in the field from harm but not otherwise responsible for the trees on the land
- 4. The land to be used for grazing only
- 5. The tenant to ensure that no invasive or notifiable plant species is introduced or allowed to grow on the land
- 6. The parish council to be entitled to terminate the lease in the event that the land or any part of it is required for cemetery or burial ground purposes.

The clerk will contact Larken & Co accordingly.

The chair and Mr Rose will make enquiries regarding soil which was currently blocking access to the field.

11. Planning matters:

a. Applications: Councillors noted an application just received, 21/01573/HOUSE - Proposed single-storey principle extension,

replacement of windows, conversion of a section of garage to bedroom, bi-fold doors to replace existing entrance door, replacement of window to entrance door and replacement of garage door to window - Walnut Cottage Toad Lane Laxton. They had no comments.

- b. To note planning decisions by NSDC: None.
- c. Compliance: No matters raised.
- d. Defibrillator inspection report: Mr M Hennell had reported that he had completed the inspection. There were no issues. The new pads had been delivered to the chair.
- 13. Village environment and appearance, including:
 - a. **Relocation** 30 mph speed signs to village entries: Mr Pringle is progressing.
 - b. **Fibre broadband for Moorhouse:** The clerk will invite the NCC broadband officer to the November 2021 meeting, the village meeting with Mr Pierrepont of Thoresby Estate having been rearranged to September 2021..
 - c. Speeding traffic including possible weight limit: Councillors were pleased that the brickyard had confirmed that they would ask drivers to avoid the village where possible but regretted that this would not apply to the increasing number of high sided vehicles attending the site. These would still need to avoid Cocking Hill.
 - d. Bar Farmhouse: Mrs Michael had confirmed that the matter was in hand at NSDC.
 - e. **Electricity for Christmas tree Installation:** Councillors are exploring other sources of electricity. No longer required as an agenda item.
 - f. **Rights of way enquiry:** Councillors asked the clerk to make enquiries direct of NCC in relation to any proposed change to the definitive map, no statutory consultation having been received.
- 14. Service faults: None.
- 15. Correspondence: All items of correspondence noted
- 16. Agenda items for next meeting: As above
- 17. Date of next meeting: Wednesday 29 July 2021 Councillors agreed that their regular meetings should revert to Tuesdays with effect from November 2021
