#### **Laxton Harvest Weekend**

We have not managed to hold our traditional Harvest Weekend with all it's events since 2019, so it is with great pleasure that we are bringing it back this year - but a little earlier.

The Harvest celebrations have usually been held in mid October, but this has proved problematic for people wanting to enter home grown produce and flowers in the



competition, as frequently most things have been past their best, if not over. For this reason we will be holding it in mid September this year - over the weekend of 15th - 17th.

As always there will be a service on the Friday evening, although at the time of writing it is unknown whether we will manage to find a vicar. If we cannot, we will go for the DIY approach. This will be followed immediately by a **Harvest Supper** in the Village Hall. Everyone is very welcome, but please do **let Jean know asap** if you want to join in the supper as catering arrangements need to be made in advance. Call her on **870276**.

Saturday 16th sees the **Harvest Competition** being held in church. There are classes for adults and for children, which are all listed in the programme in this edition of the magazine. Please make sure that you take your entries to the church during the registration period, 2–4pm on the Saturday.

The final events take place on Sunday 17th. You will be able to come in to the church to see how your entries have fared from 3.30pm. A service will follow at 4pm after which we will share a cuppa before the competition prizes are presented.

The finale of the weekend will be the familiar **auction of the produce** entries for the competition along with any additional items donated to be auctioned.

This year, being aware of the cost of living crisis and the problems being experienced by so many people, we are introducing a collection of useful non perishable supplies which will be donated to a local Food Bank. This can include cans, jars or packets of staple items such as tea, coffee, fruit and vegetables, cereals, biscuits, etc. Please bring these with you at any time over the weekend when the church is open for a service or for the competition.

## **Change of Printer for Open Field**

Unfortunately after many years of working happily with Rev. Tony Tucker to bring you 'Duen Jield', he has told us that he is unlikely to continue printing beyond the end of this year. His printer is on a 5 year contract and this deal has enabled him to pass on the advantage of the low contract price via his not-for-profit enterprise. The renewal price is prohibitive and Tony has now retired from full time ministry. We send our grateful thanks for all his help and efforts for us.

And so the PCC find themselves looking for alternatives. They felt that readers still enjoy receiving their magazines on paper, rather than as electronic files. This means looking for a new printer, and they have collected a number of estimates to give them an idea of the cost.

To continue with the colour front and back and the potential to take colour advertisements, the cost will be at least 50% higher than now.

The magazine's cost to subscribers has always been slightly less than 50% of the total production cost and the PCC would like to continue this. Unfortunately it will mean an increase from the current £5 a year to £7.50 for the coming year.

The only potential way to avoid such an increase would be for the community to generate a significant increase in advertisers. Most local magazines carry far more adverts than Open Field does, and we have never had a real drive to increase the numbers.

Recently, and especially after covid, some of our smaller advertisers have retired and others have cut their advertising budgets. We remain extremely grateful to the business who advertise, hoping readers will trade with them. It is important to us that you tell them so if you find contacts on our pages .

We are also aware that some local people with their own businesses advertise simply to support the magazine. Their generosity is invaluable and does not go unnoticed. Thank you all.

Now the PCC would like to ask your help over the next month or two to see if we can gain more advertisers and / or find a good printing deal. Do you know anyone who might advertise, or do you know anyone in the printing business who might help us? Meanwhile, we must advise you to expect a subscription increase in January.

# History Group Visit to Brodsworth Hall & Gardens





Our July visit to Brodsworth Hall and Gardens was a great success.

Members travelled in their own cars and everyone was there on time. Amazingly our group of 14 had grown to 18 by the time we gathered for the inevitable group photo.

The weather on the journey and the

forecast had not been good. We drove through lashing rain and heavy spray, but by the time we arrived there were signs of blue sky.

We all went for a cuppa before setting about the serious business of viewing the property. With an interlude between showers most of us decided to go to the gardens first. What a treat lay in store!

The team of about 8 full time gardeners, supported by volunteers, had made a wonderful job of creating manicured lawns with immaculate edges and a mixture of garden types. We saw colourful formal beds, abundant ferns in a small gorge, a rockery, wild areas and even an archery



range; all in a manageable area and with sculpture, different levels and follies to give it character.



There was also a delightful view of the little estate church which gave the impression of being older than it was.

A shower timed its arrival to coincide with most of us being back at the café. After having lunch sitting outside under some huge and effective umbrellas, which kept us dry, we set off into the house.

A very well informed

volunteer described how the estate had been inherited in the 1850s. Deciding that the huge Georgian house was too big, the new landowner

asked the architect to design 'a small, comfortable family home'. The result was the current Hall! See the picture on the right.

The construction reused many of the materials and also created some estate houses and the church. The grounds were laid out and the house furnished for around £48,000 at



exactly the time that Laxton church was remodelled for a cost of £2,000.

Unfortunately the family suffered four deaths in approximately 50 years, and the death duties paid depleted the family funds to the point that the remaining family gradually had to close rooms. They were eventually reduced to using just four. The widow of the final owner lived there with just one servant until she died.

At this point the Hall passed to English Heritage, who are keeping it as she would have known it. The leaking roof has been repaired, but the decor is being retained as it was, shabby as that is in places and with some rooms used for storage. It was good to see some of the glorious furnishings in better orderdownstairs rooms as well as a family exhibition and the servants quarters.- Many thanks to Jean for organising the visit.

#### A Long Ago Birthday Party

Janet Cooke has kindly sent in this item from the August 1922 edition of the Parish magazine. It lists a number of the clergy and officers of the church here at that time, and then goes on to tell of an exciting day for the children:



"A very happy and memorable event took place on June 26th when teacher and scholars met at Westwood at the invitation of Mr Marrison on the occasion of his attaining his 86th birthday.

A large number of relatives and friends were present including Mr H D Argles (the Agent for the Thoresby Estate). After the scholars had done justice to the sumptuous tea that had been provided, speeches of congratulations were made by the vicar and Mr Willis (the Headmaster of Laxton School as well as the organist) and earnest wishes were expressed for his future happiness and longer

A very pleasing part of the proceedings followed when, on behalf of the school children, the headmaster presented Mr Marrison, with a walking stick of ebony wood, mounted with silver and explained that the gift was a spontaneous thought of the children.

continuance with us.

Mr Marrison expressed, with much feeling, his appreciation of the kind thoughts and gift. Hearty cheers were then given by the children, who proceeded to the field where many games and competitions occupied the rest of the afternoon and evening. Towards the close of the day, our hospitable host entertained us further by singing in fine style two songs of the older times, after which the cheers of the children were still more rapturous. Thus ended a very pleasant day, which we sincerely trust will be not be the last of its kind."

#### Not for the First Time ...

It would appear that, by this time. Mr Marrison's birthday parties had possibly become something of a tradition. Joan Cottee noted in 'The Village Schoolmaster' written as part of Laxton History Group's Lottery funded project covering 1900 - 1920\*, that in 1916 the event nearly cost the school dearly.

On Friday, June 30th, HM Inspector of Schools had called and found Laxton school closed without notification having been given to Shire Hall, either from the school managers or the head teacher.

The following was included in a message was received from Mr Bramley at the Education

Board, "... in the event of HM Inspector visiting a school, and finding it closed without notice, he may advise the Board of Education to make a deduction from the grant payable to the Education Committee."

"I shall be glad therefore to know why no notification of this closure was sent to the office and also how long the school was closed."

The vicar at the time was the Rev. Collinson, who wrote an abject apology in which he stated "a large farmer came down to the school at the end of the week before and said he was having a party for his 80th birthday and would like to entertain the school children but did not fix a day. ... I was out of the way when Friday was decided on and we forgot to send the notice. ... The school was only closed for half the dav."

Mr Marrison is identified in the school log book as the generous "large" farmer from Westwood Farm who invited the children to his 80th birthday party.

It apparently all ended happily with Rev Collinson's word being accepted that he had not known which day had been chosen for the party, and had fully intended to let the Board of Education know of the closure.

Joan quotes this incident to demonstrate "the close relationship which had developed between the village and school, and the respect that the farming community now had for education, and for Frank Willis."

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# Nottinghamshire welcomes the Tour of Britain

On the day that the July edition of Open Field went for printing, we head that the county would host both the start and the finish of the fourth stage of the Tour of Britain on **Wednesday 6 September 2023**.

The whole stage will be in Nottinghamshire. Since the full map has been published it has become clear that local residents will have much better options to see the riders than early news suggested.

The start will staged at Sherwood Forest Visitor Centre, Edwinstowe with the finish beside Sconce and Devon Park in Newark. Over 100 riders from the world's leading teams are expected to take part.

The peloton and entourage will approach Moorhouse from Ossington, turn right towards Egmanton and on to Tuxford. The timings have now been published and give three times depending on the average speed.

The leaders are due in Ossington between 13.50 and 14.23, which sees them in Moorhouse between 13.54 and 14.27 and turning up past Egmanton church towards Tuxford between 13.59 and 14.33. The full timings can be found on the county council web site

From past experience of seeing the event pass through



our villages, we know that there will be an enormous amount of support vehicles and police motorcycles to see as well as the riders. This time they will be here well into the race, so it is possible there may have been a break away and there could be more than one group to see.

Road closures will be announced nearer the time. They are applied and lifted as the race progresses, so anyone who needs to travel in the area should make a point of checking for the details before the day.

From the timings above, it would seem there will be closures here from some time after 1pm to around 3pm to allow everyone to pass safely.

#### **Visitor Guide Booklets and Walks**

Progress has continued with the revision of the Visitor Guide booklets for the Visitor Centre. The text has been completed and proof read and the photographs prepared and placed to illustrate the text.

The completed document runs to 28 pages with an illustrated cover and it is the same size as Open Jielb. It follows the format of the earlier volume closely, but brings up to date the information it contains.

Those of you who are familiar with the Visitor Centre will have seen the walks around the village and fields described on a display board. The detail of the walks appeared in brief in the current booklet and also in detail in separate, colour coded, leaflets for each walk.

The revision has removed the walks from the booklet entirely as it is far more convenient to have just a foldable sheet of paper when walking. The details in the leaflets is the final element of the project to review and revise the information provided from the Visitor Centre.

The newly updated Village Booklet is currently with the printers and copies will be available in the Visitor Centre shortly. Many, many thanks to Professor John Beckett for all the work with updating the whole booklet and many thanks to Joy and Dik for a number of new and exciting photos which are now included.

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

## **Southwell Ploughing Match and Show**

# This year at South Muskham (NG23 6EB) on Saturday 30th September 2023.

The one thing which goes into diaries from one year to the next in the local farming communities is the Southwell Ploughing Match. It is a friendly local event with everything rural that you could possibly want.

The Southwell Ploughing Match is the largest agricultural one day show in Nottinghamshire, established in 1855 and run by a committee of local business people and rural enthusiasts. The annual show is held at a different venue every year.

The show represents all the really important interests of agriculture from preparing the land to cooking and eating locally produced food; from horse ploughing through the vintage years to the modern day tractor, a variety of livestock, static displays and trade stands to suit all tastes.

There are classes of all types from active participation on horse back and showing farm animals to baking, floral art, eggs, fruit, veg, hay and more. There can hardly be anyone who could not enter at least one class. Entries opened 1st August.

It is also a really big event for Notts Young Farmers who have their competitions, for craft, cookery, produce etc., their contests in the main ring and their opportunity to engage with so many from the local community and share the word about all they do through the year. They even get involved in setting up the event and breaking it all down afterwards.

The event goes ahead regardless of the weather, although it has to be said that a nice day enhances everything. Gates open at 8am and the show closes at 5.30pm. Under 13s are free and dogs are welcome. If you want to see the horse ploughing, that is an early event. There is a tractor and trailer 'bus' service around the show to ensure everyone can get to even the farthest flung corner.

#### Festival of Bird Art at Bakewell

There are classes for novices, intermediates and advanced carvers, who have earned their place by winning at the lower levels in previous years. They are obliged to carve and paint not only their bird(s), but also the props they stand on.

There is a class for innovative carving which was established in memory of the late David Rose, who was born in Laxton. Over the years this has seen some memorable entries, and last year was





no exception, with 'Out for a Duck'.

The more traditional styles of carving are painted to look realistic and this is judged by an ornithologist as well as carvers. Other classes are for stylised representations of bird types and miniatures. There is a class for the regional groups who meet regularly to pursue their craft and even a class for decoy ducks. These must be accurate enough to fool a real duck, which means some hardy soul has to wade into the river to float them for the judges. Why not make

My children are starting new schools in September, one is in primary school and the other secondary. Between uniforms, PE kit and knowing they'll need to catch

the bus each day the costs are adding up. I'm already pretty stretched, so I'm not sure how to cover these extra outgoings. Is there any help I can get?

A new school year can put pressure on lots of people's budgets, so you're not alone in your worries. But there is help available.

A good place to start is the Citizens Advice website where you'll find lots of information on the support you might be entitled to for school-related costs. The help you can get to cover school lunches will vary depending on how old your children are and if you claim benefits. Children in Reception, Year 1 and 2 automatically get free school meals. You can apply for free school meals for older children if you claim certain types of benefits, including Universal Credit, Child Tax Credit and Income Support. The full list is available on the **Citizens Advice website**.

You mentioned concerns about travel costs. If your child can't walk to school because of special educational needs or disabilities they should get free school transport. You may be able to get help with transport costs from your Local Education Authority if your children can't walk because it's dangerous or too far. Your Local Education Authority is part of your local council that deals with education in your area, you can find yours on GOV.UK. Contact it directly to find out exactly what support it offers.

If you're on a low income, your Local Education Authority may also be able to help you with activity and school uniform costs. You're likely to be considered to be on a low income if you get meanstested benefits like Universal Credit or Housing Benefit. In some places there are also local charitable schemes that can help. A good place to find out about these is the school itself or Parent Teacher Association (PTA) both will usually know if these kinds of schemes exist.

A lot of people are feeling the squeeze at the moment, but it's important to remember that help is available with starting school costs and you're not alone. For more information visit **Citizens Advice website.**

#### **Vaccinations**

We seem hardly to have had a summer, yet September is the time to be thinking about vaccinations to protect us from 'flu and Covid over the coming winter.

#### Who can have the flu vaccine?

The NHS will give the flu vaccine free to: adults who are 65 and those who will be 65 by 31 March 2024; have certain health conditions; are pregnant; are in long-stay residential care; receive a carer's allowance, or are the main carer for an older or disabled person or live with someone who is more likely to get a severe infection due to a weakened immune system.

You can have the NHS flu vaccine at your GP surgery or a pharmacy offering the service. Ring your surgery for details.

#### **Covid booster vaccinations**

NHS England will soon confirm details on how and when eligible people can access the autumn booster vaccine. Eligibility is similar to previous rounds.

The Joint Committee on Vaccination and Immunisation (JCVI) has advised the autumn programme should aim to complete vaccinations by early December 2023.

# **Egmanton Full Fibre Broadband Project**

Last year we reported, optimistically as it turns out, that the installation of this service to 'distribution points' will be accomplished within 12 months. There should be no need to dig up roads etc. as the fibres will follow the same path as the current wires.'

Since then the project to deliver full fibre broadband to Egmanton has encountered a number of further obstacles on its route to completion. Most of these have literally been obstacles, in the form of blocked or collapsed conduits. Fortunately the necessary works are being carried out at no cost to the households.

Different teams have visited the properties where householders pledged their government vouchers towards the scheme to ensure that the final team laying in the fibre would have a clear run.

The vouchers had a life of one year, which expired at the end of July, so optimism that this deadline meant the work would be completed by then proved unfounded. The current situation is that the properties

whose fibre access has been cleared are having their installations carried out as Open field is being prepared. Others need to wait while solutions are found to difficult situations.

Once Open Reach have completed the installation of the infrastructure, people will be able to sign up with a service provider to get their homes connected and to commit to a full fibre package. From this point people will pay an on-going monthly fee for the service they select, which seems not to be a lot more than present services. Details of companies offering the services will become known soon.

Once the fibre is in place at the distribution points, everyone on a list of 101 properties falling within the scheme will be able to sign up to a package of their choosing.
